Sarah and Hagar: The Matriarchal Feud (Part One)

During this early Biblical times, obtaining Hagar's permission to be a surrogate was not required. Hagar's sexuality belonged to her mistress, Sarah. Because Hagar conceives immediately, Sarah becomes increasingly jealous and treats Hagar so poorly that she is forced to flee into the wilderness while she is still pregnant with Abraham's child. An angel appears to Hagar in the desert and gives her instructions to return to Sarah so her son can be named and claimed by Abraham.
