Scripture Readings

November 4, 2018

Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: Deuteronomy 6:2-6

Moses commands the people to love and fear God, and always keep the commandments that they were given. He tells them to observe all statutes so that they will continue to grow and prosper, and tells them that they must love God with all their soul and strength.

Second Reading: Hebrews 7:23-28

Under the old covenant there were many priests, but Jesus will now remain high priest forever because he will live forever, and always be available to those who want to be saved. He does not need to offer sacrifice every day for the sins of his people, because he offered himself up in payment for their sins.

Gospel: Mark 12:28b-34

One of the scribes asked Jesus which commandment is the first, and he replied that the first is to love and honor the Lord and no one else. Jesus explained that they must love God with all their heart, and love their neighbor. The scribe agreed that loving God completely and loving one's neighbor is better than any sacrifice they could make.

From the Desk of Fr. Jared

Tradition tells us that St. Joseph was a carpenter in Galilee. In biblical times, a carpenter was not as we understand one today. A carpenter referred to more of a builder. The Greek word *tekton* is used in the gospel to describe both Joseph and Jesus. The role of the *tekton* was not only working with wood, but laying foundations and building cities. Fr. Mallon, in *Divine Renovation*, speaks about no matter how big or beautiful a building is, it is only as strong as its foundation. Jesus speaks in the gospel about building a house on rock rather than sand in order that the house withstands all that is hurled at it. The point that Jesus is making is that the foundation of our faith is found in listening to and acting upon his words. It is not only about believing and trusting, but acting as well.

The foundation of any human organization is the culture of that organization. Thomas Aquinas coined the famous axiom "*grace builds upon nature.*" The foundation of God's grace is human. We cooperate with God's grace. God initiates and we respond. If the human foundation of the Church is not healthy, crumbling is inevitable. What do we value as Catholics? Whereas the liturgy does not ask us to make the sign of the cross after receiving Holy Communion, many people do so. For some, making a sign of the cross is a spiritual reflex for any moment of prayer. For others, it represents an act of faith in the mystery they have received. With that said, it is not a necessary part of the Communion Rite.
