Opening Prayer

O God, who on this day,

Reflecting on Living the Gospel

The Fourth Gospel gives us many takes on the stories about the life and ministry of Jesus. Now with the story of the discovery of the empty tomb we have another story. Though Luke tells us that Mary Magdalene (in the Gospel of John: Mary of Magdala) and other women were the first to encounter the empty tomb, that story also had two men "in dazzling garments" speaking to the women. In John's account Mary seems to be alone, and upon finding the stone turned away, she runs to Simon Peter and the disciple whom Jesus loved. We need to read further in the gospel than what we hear in today's liturgy to find out more about Mary's role on that morning. The gospel reading for today is content to have Mary fetch Peter and the other disciple. We hear no more about her.

And though Luke tells us in one verse, which happens to be missing from many ancient manuscripts, that Peter found the tomb empty, John tells us that he was accompanied by the disciple whom Jesus loved. And it is he, this latter disciple, who is the first to believe, even though neither he nor Peter at that time understood the Scripture about rising from the dead.

So this becomes something of a model of faith. We, like the Beloved Disciple, believe before we understand completely. Upon believing, we spend the rest of our lives contemplating the mystery of faith. And like the Beloved Disciple we are led to faith by another, in this case Mary of Magdala. She is the one who indicates that the stone was rolled away. She points to something that needs to be explored, investigated. And once the Beloved Disciple has that encounter the response is faith.

Closing Prayer

Jesus Christ, risen from the dead, you give us hope of life eternal. When days seem dark and night long, may your Easter spirit animate us with the promise of a new day filled with light and life. With the knowledge that your resurrection conquered death itself, we are confident in our request. Amen.

For Reflection:

• At the empty tomb the Beloved Disciple believes but does not yet understand. What mysteries of faith do you not yet understand?

Suggestions for group and individual use:

1. Pray aloud the "Opening Prayer" (in *The Roman Missal* called the "collect").
2. One person read aloud the gospel.
3. Each read prayerfully "Reflecting on Living the Gospel" and spend some time in personal prayer.
4. Share together responses to "For Reflection."
5. Pray the "Closing Prayer."

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Gospel

John 20:1-9 (or Luke 24:1-12, or Luke 24:13-35)

On the first day of the week,

They both ran, but the other disciple ran
 faster than Peter
 and arrived at the tomb first;
 he bent down and saw the burial cloths
 there, but did not go in.

When Simon Peter arrived after him,
 he went into the tomb and saw the
 burial cloths there,
 and the cloth that had covered his head,
 not with the burial cloths but rolled up
 in a separate place.



Then the other disciple also went in,
 the one who had arrived at the tomb
 first,
 and he saw and believed.
 For they did not yet understand the
 Scripture
 that he had to rise from the dead.
