

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



In today's Gospel, a blind beggar calls Jesus the Son of David. Since Jesus' father was Joseph, who is this other person that the blind man is talking about?

David who, according to the Bible, was both the shepherd boy and a skilled harpist, was a very important figure in the history of the Jewish people. He was the same David who used a slingshot to kill Goliath, the Philistine giant, and he later became the greatest king of the Jews.

As king, David first made Jerusalem the capital of the Jewish nation; then ordered the Ark of the Covenant (the chest in which the Jews kept the Ten Commandments) be brought there. At the time, the Jews housed the Ark (a visible sign of God's presence) in a special tent.

One of the things David did after becoming king was to build himself a palace of the finest materials, but it wasn't long before he began feeling a little guilty about living in luxury while the Ark of the covenant was in a tent. So David decided he would build a house for the Lord, the magnificent temple unequalled by any other building in the world. But in the dream God told the prophet Nathan that David should not carry out his plans. Instead, God would build a house (a dynasty) for David and would bless it with peace and prosperity. Also, God said one of David's descendants would occupy the throne forever.

At first, the Jews understood God promises to mean David's son would rule after him and his son's son would rule after that and so on. Historically, that did not prove to be true because one military power after another conquered the Jewish nation and executed the last of the Jewish kings.

Since God would not lie, the Jews reasoned they must have misunderstood what he meant and concluded that God's promises referred to a future descendent of David. They believed this descendent or Son of David would be the long awaited Messiah who would conquer the world and rule forever with peace and justice.

So when Bartimaeus calls Jesus "Son of David" instead of "Son of Joseph," he acknowledges that Jesus is the promised Messiah, the descendant of David through whom God would fulfill his promises.

Being unable to see is only one type of blindness. We can also be spiritually blind when we fail to see how God is working in our lives. Pray this week that we'll recognize the many ways the Lord has shown his love for us everyday.

I am writing this 30,000 feet over Nebraska, on my way to Reagan National Airport in Washington, DC, and then to the FBI Academy at Quantico, Virginia, where I am until November 8th. Twice a year, for two-week intervals, I serve as the visiting resident chaplain for the entire academy. It's work that supports our nation's premier law enforcement and intelligence agency, and a ministry that gives me much fulfillment.

This past Tuesday, lay ecclesial ministers, parish council chairs and parish staffs from throughout Catholic parishes in the East Bay gathered with the priests of the Diocese of Oakland to listen to Father James Mallon, a priest of the Archdiocese of Halifax, Nova Scotia (Canada), former pastor of St. Benedict Parish in Halifax, and the author of "Divine Renovation - From a Maintenance to a Missional Parish". This was part of a clergy mini-convocation held at San Damiano Retreat Center in Danville, although the process with parish staffs was held at St. Isidore parish in Danville.

Representing our St. Benedict parish was Dionne Cola (Pastoral Associate), Dr. Chiquita Tuttle (parish pastoral council chairperson); Ofelia Wanzo (children's faith formation); and Deacon Ron Tutson. Most pastors brought 3-4 parishioners, usually those in leadership positions.

The intent of the day was to listen to the exciting, challenging and transformative

vision of parish ministry presented by Fr. Mallon. He was such and enthusiastic and inspirational speaker, but it was the fruits of his labor at St. Benedict in Halifax that makes his story so compelling. The intent of his work is for a parish to be mission-driven, with a heart for bringing non-Catholics into the fold - essentially inviting a parish to be evangelicalistic in nature by using a program called "Alpha", enabling it to draw others interested in a deeper look at the Christian path to seek the information gained, and plugging folks into a warm and inclusive and faith-filled worshipping community.

The three-day gathering, with the day for parish staffs and their clergy, was definitely eye-opening. Fr. Mallon presented the hard facts of Catholic life these days, not just in the United States but throughout the world - declining church attendance; a shortage of those seeking ordained ministry; the on-going sexual abuse crisis and scandal; a loss of confidence in our society's institutions; the inviting lure of technology; church no longer a valued priority; and numerous other factors.

For Fr. Mallon, it's all about the mission, and how we are invited to transform the comfortable (a maintenance parish), in seeking Jesus' will for us by bringing in the lost and abandoned sheep, to a lived faith experience, however uncomfortable, one that truly becomes missionary in spirit and fact. It's all about our relationship with Jesus and making disciples, sharing our relationship with Jesus to those who would hear, and to become transformative (and being a catalyst of transformation) for the unchurched, those no longer attending (the fallen away), and our communities, and in turn becoming continually transformed by our faith as well.

One thing that I kept pointing out to our St. Benedict team was the uniquely African American identity that characterized our folks. It seemed as if we were the only distinctly African American parish group represented. That bear noting insofar as our parish identity is concerned, and how that element relates to our growing Latino populations within our community and neighborhood.

You'll be hearing more about our experience over the next few weeks. I'm hoping that those who attended from St. Benedict would be open to sharing what last Tuesday meant for them.

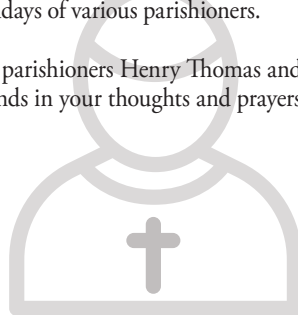
The other event that happened while the clergy and staffs were at St. Isidore, Danville was the release (by attorney Jeff Anderson and his law firm) of priests who have been credibly accused of sexual misconduct with minors. The names were, for the most part, the same ones listed on www.bishopaccountability.org website, with priests from religious orders mixed for good measure (and with some attempt by the plaintiffs bar to cast a wide net regarding accused perpetrators).

I was tipped off to the list and the subsequent press conference by folks within the survivors community, with whom I have journeyed with since 2002, and my work with the "No More Secrets" ministry to survivors of sexual abuse by Catholic priests. This is a story and sad tale that will continue to be a slow-moving disaster for the church, and a painful path of healing and justice for those who have experienced childhood sexual abuse by a Catholic priest.

Our very own Deacon Ron Tutson will be celebrating his 10th Anniversary of Ordination to the Diaconate this coming All Saints Day. We had a little gathering to celebrate this milestone last Wednesday evening at the rectory. We also honored Fr. Jay Matthews on his 70th, as well as the birthdays of various parishioners.

Over the past few weeks, we have lost long-time parishioners Henry Thomas and Fabio Guillion. Please keep their family and friends in your thoughts and prayers as they grieve the loss of their loved ones.
