FROM FR. MARCIN...

My dear parishioners,

We are in the season of Advent, the season of waiting and hoping, waiting and hoping for God, waiting and hoping for the Second Coming of Jesus. As much as we are waiting and hoping for God, can you imagine how much more God is waiting and hoping for each of us, waiting and hoping that we will turn to him during this season of grace, Advent? We have heard so often of God's love. Do you ever think about God's love searching for you, longing for you, wanting no hindrance or obstacle between you and him?

This season of Advent is a time of grace for us. It is a time of grace given to us to prepare our hearts so that we are ready to receive Christ at Christmas. That is what Christmas is all about, Jesus. We do not want to get lost in the frenzy of the run up to Christmas and forget what Christmas is all about. Advent is a time of grace to remind us that Jesus is the reason for Christmas.

During this season of Advent, let us ask ourselves is there anything keeping us and God apart? Is any sin of any kind in our lives keeping us separated from God? During this season of waiting for the Second Coming of Jesus, can we also look into our hearts and turn from sin to God asking forgiveness? We may say we have no sins and when we go to Confession we have to make up sins to tell the priest. Are we really that holy? There were only two people on this earth who had no sin, Jesus and Our Lady. If we say we have no sin are we expected to think that you are Jesus or Our Lady? If we say we have no sin do we not mean that we have allowed our consciences to go dead so that now we sin but are not even aware of it?

We are living now in this time of mercy when we have an opportunity to repent. Let us receive as much grace as we can from God during this time of Advent. The Lord has no limits to what he wants to give us, it is we who put limits on what he wants to give us. The Lord is waiting to receive you in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, to take you in his arms and hold you close to his breast. Let us pray as much as we can during this season of Advent. During this season of Advent we think in a special way of Our Lady, pregnant with Jesus. Pray to her and ask her to help you prepare your heart for Jesus. FROM FR. SLAWEK...

St. Lucy

Martyr (d. 304) – December 13

Despite the paucity of reliable information about her life, St. Lucy is one of the most famous of the so-called virgin young woman from Sicily, raised as a Christian by her wealthy parents. At a young age she privately dedicated herself to Christ. When she refused the proposal of a prospective suitor, he angrily denounced her as a Christian. Subsequently she faced a series of ordeals and futile punishments – commitment to a brothel, death by fire – until at last she was put to the sword.

Because of associations between her name (Lucia) and the Latin word for light (lux), as well as certain gruesome tortures that adorn her legend, Lucy has been invoked as a patron of those who suffer from eye troubles. Her feast day in Sweden is a festival of light, celebrated by a procession of young girls wearing crowns of lighted candles.

The stories of Lucy and similar female martyrs have often been used to exalt the "virgin" state. In fact, like the stories of Perpetua and felicity (both young mothers), her story describes a woman's power in Christ to claim her own identity and a kind of integrity her persecutors were powerless defile.

"If now, against my will, you cause me to be polluted, a twofold purity will be gloriously imputed to me. You cannot bend my will to your purpose; whatever you do to my body that cannot happen to me." - St. Lucy

TEACHING FROM THE CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

The Fifth Commandment

You shall not kill. "You have heard that it was said to the men of old, You shall not kill: and whoever kills shall be liable to judgment. But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother shall be liable to judgment".

My brothers and sisters, let us continue our learning from the Fifth Commandment

Intentional homicide

In the numeral 2268 says, "The fifth commandment forbids direct and intentional killing as gravely sinful. The murderer and those who cooperate voluntarily in murder commit a sin that cries out to heaven for vengeance".

According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, Infanticide, fratricide, parricide, and the murder of a spouse are especially grave crimes by reason of the natural bonds which they break. Concern for eugenics or public health cannot justify any murder, even if commanded by public authority.

Also the fifth commandment forbids doing anything with the intention of indirectly bringing about a person's death. The moral law prohibits exposing someone to mortal danger without grave reason, as well as refusing assistance to a person in danger.

The acceptance by human society of murderous famines, without efforts to remedy them, is a scandalous injustice and a grave offense. Those whose usurious and avaricious dealings lead to the hunger and death of their brethren in the human family indirectly commit homicide, which is imputable to them.

Unintentional killing is not morally imputable. But one is not exonerated from grave offense if, without proportionate reasons, he has acted in a way that brings about someone's death, even without the intention to do so.

We were created to love not to destroy.
