WATER changed into **WINE**

By changing the jars filled with water into wine our Lord did two things: he provided drink to the wedding guests and he showed that, through baptism, people were going to be filled with the Holy Spirit. The Lord himself declared this elsewhere when he said: "New wine into fresh wineskins!" (Mt 9:17). The fresh wineskins stand, in fact, for baptismal purity, the wine of the Holy Spirit's grace.

Catechumens, pay particular attention to me. Your minds, which are ignorant as yet of the Trinity, are like water that is cold. They must be warmed, like wine, with the heat of the sacrament of baptism so as to transform a liquid that is poor and valueless into rich and precious grace. Like wine, let us acquire a good taste and sweet aroma, then we shall be able to say together with the apostle Paul: "We are indeed the good aroma of Christ for God" (2Cor 2:15). Before baptism the catechumen resembles still water, cold and colorless..., useless, unable to restore strength. If kept too long water deteriorates, stagnates, turns foul... The Lord said: "No one can enter the Kingdom of God without being born again of water and the Spirit" (Jn 3:5).

The baptized faithful are like wine that is strong and red. Every created thing deteriorates with time; wine alone improves as it ages. Daily it loses its sharpness and acquires a bouquet full of mellowness, with a deep flavour. Christians, too, as time passes, lose the sharpness of their sinful life and acquire the wisdom and goodness of the divine Trinity. Elijah on Mount Horeb

Then the Lord passed by. A strong, heavy wind rent the mountains and crushed rocks before the Lord – but the Lord was not in the wind" (1Kgs 19:11). After the great storm there were earthquakes and lightening but Elijah understood that God was not in those either. These natural phenomena were intended to restrain the prophet's otherwise laudable zeal within the bounds of his responsibility, and to teach him that severity is to be tempered by mercy after the example shown by the signs of divine authority. According to their hidden meaning, the whirlwind that preceded God's coming, the earthquakes and fires stirred up by the wind, were signs foreshadowing universal judgement.

"And after there was fire there was a tiny, whispering sound." By means of this symbol God restrains Elijah's immoderate zeal. He wanted to tell him in this way: "Do you see how neither unbridled winds nor terrible earthquakes give me any pleasure, and I have no love for lightening or thunder: why don't you imitate the gentleness of your God? Why not relax a little this burning zeal so as to become more of a protector than an accuser of your people?" The tiny, whispering sound represents the joy of blessedness bestowed on the upright when, at the end of time, the fearful judgement is to be paid.

"When he heard the sound, Elijah hid his face in his cloak and went and stood at the entrance of the cave. A voice said to him: 'Elijah, why are you here?' He replied: 'I have been most zealous for the Lord, the God of Hosts, for the children of Israel have forsaken your covenant'..." The prophet stood at the entrance to the cave without daring to draw near to the God who was approaching, and he covered his face, thinking himself unworthy to see God... Nevertheless, he had before his eyes a sign of the divine clemency and, what must have touched him even more, personal experience of God's wonderful goodness in the words he spoke to him. Who would not be melted by consideration of so great a majesty and by so gentle a question: "Elijah, why are you here"

Saint who was called CRAZY JIM-Blessed Jacopone da Todi
(c. 1230 – December 25, 1306)

Blessed Jacopone da Todi's Story

Jacomo or James, was born a noble member of the Benedetti family in the northern Italian city of Todi. He became a successful lawyer and married a pious, generous lady named Vanna.

His young wife took it upon herself to do penance for the worldly excesses of her husband. One day Vanna, at the insistence of Jacomo, attended a public tournament. She was sitting in the stands with the other noble ladies when the stands collapsed. Vanna was killed. Her shaken husband was even more disturbed when he realized that the penitential girdle she wore was for his sinfulness. On the spot, he vowed to radically change his life.

Jacomo divided his possessions among the poor and entered the Secular Franciscan Order. Often dressed in penitential rags, he was mocked as a fool and called Jacopone, or "Crazy Jim," by his former associates. The name became dear to him.

After 10 years of such humiliation, Jacopone asked to be received into the Order of Friars Minor. Because of his reputation, his request was initially refused. He composed a beautiful poem on the vanities of the world, an act that eventually led to his admission into the Order in 1278. He continued to lead a life of strict penance, declining to be ordained a priest. Meanwhile, he was writing popular hymns in the vernacular.

Jacopone suddenly found himself a leader in a disturbing religious movement among the Franciscans. The Spirituals, as they were called, wanted a return to the strict poverty of Francis. They had on their side two cardinals of the Church and Pope Celestine V. These two cardinals though, opposed Celestine's successor, Boniface VIII. At the age of 68, Jacopone was excommunicated and imprisoned. Although he acknowledged his mistake, Jacopone was not absolved and released until Benedict XI became pope five years later. He had accepted his imprisonment as penance. He spent the final three years of his life more spiritual than ever, weeping "because Love is not loved." During this time he wrote the famous Latin hymn, *Stabat Mater*.

On Christmas Eve in 1306 Jacopone felt that his end was near. He was in a convent of the Poor Clares with his friend, Blessed John of La Verna. Like Francis, Jacopone welcomed "Sister Death" with one of his favorite songs. It is said that he finished the song and died as the priest intoned the "Gloria" from the midnight Mass at Christmas. From the time of his death, Brother Jacopone has been venerated as a saint.

Did you know?

The name Agnes comes from the words for "pure" in Greek and "lamb" in Latin. St. Agnes lived around the year 300. The lovely 13-year-old daughter of Roman nobles had several suitors but, having consecrated herself to Christ, she refused to marry any of them. For this, the suitors attempted to force her into a life of impurity. Agnes resisted, strong in her Christian faith, and was eventually martyred for her beliefs. She is beloved as a saint of innocence and virtue.

EVERY year on the Feast of St. Agnes the Holy Father blesses the lambs, from whose wool the Pallium will be made. The Pallium are white woollen stoles, decorated with six black crosses presented to metropolitan archbishops by the Holy Father on June 29, the feast of Sts. Peter and Paul.

The lambs whose wool is destined for the making of the pallia are solemnly presented at the altar by the nuns of the convent of Saint Agnes. The Benedictine nuns of Santa Cecilia in Trastevere later weave the lambs' wool into pallia.

The Pallium was to remind bishops that they are shepherds after the Lord Jesus and carry their sheep on their shoulders.

One WISH left

A man found a magic lantern and every time he rubbed it a "Genie" would appear to grant his wish. The man was full of anxiety, and because of his constant worries, he kept the "Genie" busy all the time. This went on for years -- one wish after another -- until, one day, when the man rubbed his magic lantern for the fifth time that week, the Genie appeared and said: "I am sick and tired of your anxious worry and your constant wishing. I have decided to settle this arrangement once and for all. I will grant your next three wishes only. Nothing more. After that, you're on your own."

The man made his first wish immediately. He asked that his boss would disappear so that he would be happier at work. His wish came true at once. But when his co-workers discovered he was replaced by a real tyrant, they began to recall all the old boss's good qualities. This saddened the man and he realized he had been hasty. So he asked the Genie to bring back the old boss, and immediately his wish was granted. Now he had but one wish left. He fretted and agonized and anxiously worried about that third wish. He was determined not to make another mistake, since he would be unable to correct it. He went everywhere for advice. Some people told him to wish for immortality.

But if he got too sick to enjoy life, he reasoned, what good would immortality be? "Maybe," he told himself, "I should wish for good health." But then he asked himself: "What good is health if I don't have much money? And what good is money if I have no friends?" Many years passed and still he worried -- he couldn't decide on health or wealth or power or money or the dozens of other ideas that kept cropping up. Finally, in desperation, he cried out, "Someone tell me what to ask for!" And he heard a gentle voice from within answer: "Ask to be content, no matter what you get."

 - Winston Churchill failed the sixth grade.
 - Babe Ruth struck out 1,300 times - a major league record.
- A person may make mistakes, but he isn't a failure until he starts to blame someone else. We must believe in ourselves, and somewhere along the road of life, we must meet someone who sees greatness in us, expects it from us, and lets us know it.
