Fr. Wojciech's Corner

"The Lord executes righteousness and justice for all who are oppressed." (Psalm 103:6)

This past week the Archdiocese of Newark has released the names of the priests who were credibly accused of sexual abuse of minors. This past weekend, the Vatican made its strongest move yet against sexual abuse in the church by defrocking former U.S. Cardinal Theodore McCarrick for abusing children and adults.

The atrocity of these actions has provoked different reactions. Our hearts and prayers go to all the victims and their families. As Jeremiah rightly states: *"For My eyes are on all their ways; they are not hidden from My face, nor is their iniquity hidden from My eyes." (Jeremiah 16:17)* The letter to the Hebrews goes even stronger: *"And there is no creature hidden from His sight, but all things are naked and open to the eyes of Him to whom we must give account." (Hebrews 4:13)*

As the bishops gather in Rome to look for the solution to the abuse crisis, we pray for the healing of all the victims and that the justice of the Lord be executed.

20/20 Campaign. In New Jersey, abortion is legal for any reason throughout all nine months of pregnancy. Given proper neonatal care, babies born at 20 weeks can survive and they deserve protection.

This weekend our parishioners have the opportunity to send postcards to our state senators and assembly members urging them to support the "New Jersey Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act". If passed, this bill would [protect babies in the womb] prohibit abortion after 20 weeks – that is 5 months and beyond. This legislation has already passed in 17 other states. Along with educating our legislators, we need to raise awareness among our fellow citizens about the humanity of the baby in the womb. We need to do our part to make sure that babies in the womb are welcome and protected. Let us take advantage of this opportunity.

Considering all the attacks on family and especially on the children, is it not surprising and impressive why God would choose to become first THE CHILD IN THE WOMB and then CHOOSE TO LIVE the childhood in all its stages? By actually doing it He wanted to indicate the sanctity of the life of each person. Let us cherish and defend it and pray for all to do the same.

Love One Another!

I am the eldest of three very strong-willed boys. When I was growing up, we had all of the fights and arguments you can imagine of rambunctious boys. Sometimes our disagreements would get so intense we would go to mother to have our righteous indignation ratified. She would often say to us, "You boys go back and resolve it, but remember you are brothers." "But Mom," we would reply, "he took my ball; he said I was a liar." "Mom, he broke the rules." But all she would say was, "You boys go back and resolve it and, **remember, you are brothers.**" It was eventually clear that what was most important to Mother was that we behave, in such a way that demonstrated our bond as brothers. This was even more important to her than our resolution (which she also expected).

DID YOU KNOW?

The capital of Bavaria is named after monks. Munich, Germany, is the country's third largest city and in German its name is actually *Munchen*, literally meaning "Monks," or loosely "Home of the Monks." The name goes back to the eighth century, and refers to a Benedictine monastery on the shores of Lake Tegernsee. In 1157, Henry "the Lion," Duke of Bavaria, gave these monks the land to start a marketplace. Thus, the city of Munchen was founded. Apparently the "Benedictine marketplace" was successful for it has grown into a city of over a million inhabitants. Munich's oldest church (Catholic, of course), the *Peterskirche* (Saint Peter's Church), was built in 1169, twelve years after the city was founded. It can still be seen today. Also, a fish is named after Monks. The monkfish, which is harvested along the Atlantic coast, is really a kind of shark with a huge head and toothy mouth. It acquired the name "monkfish" not because of its looks; but because, while most fishermen discarded it, the frugal monks used the fish for food.

What Padre Pio says about the Deceased
