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THOUGHTS FROM FR. RICHARD MANGINI

WE ARE ALL ONE FLESH

What are we to think as we see members of political parties demonize each other, make fun of each other, justify the behavior of men who harass women sexually or who support politicians because of their ideology, rather than being interested in whether they act morally in their work and actions?

We have forgotten the **essence and importance of the human person and of the human community**. There are too many Christians who have their own personal faith in God yet live free-for-all lives in their treatment of others and in the way their lives are disconnected from one another.

They may know a few rituals from their religious upbringing, but they do not know the Hebrew or Christian scriptures or the history of Catholic social thought, or how the universe and its peoples are all connected to each other.

Pope Francis never tires of expressing the need to **dialogue**, to encounter each other as persons as the way to rebuild the fabric of society. Dialogue is talking to and listening to each other, not talking past or badly or untruthfully. Before such dialogue can happen or be taught or practiced, we need to go back to the beginning to see what God had in mind as he created us. **Our scriptures today tell us quite simply, quite beautifully and quite powerfully that all human beings have been made in the image and likeness of God.**

I would say that this is the first article of our creed as Christians, as Catholics and as followers of Jesus. A person can say they believe in God, but how they speak, what they think and how they treat others reveal what they believe.

In the beautiful myth of creation created and passed down by our Jewish ancestors in the faith, God creates everything, but allows men and women to create each other with the special task of accompanying each other and caring for each other, where their words and actions will complement and

support each other. They endeavor to create a unity in themselves and a unity in family.

Men and women and family become the building block and DNA of humanity. God did not intend that we magnify differences and separateness in any forms or promote extremes that put self-interests against each other.

When we forget the big picture which is to be our inspiration, we sink into partisanship. We can understand the physical hardening of arteries, but we do not seem to recognize the hardness of hearts. The hardness of hearts, the forgetting that we are made in the image and likeness of God, allow divorce and separation and partisanship and down-right dislike to fester and to be festered.

Respectful dialog and listening to each other, the willingness to change or to look at a point of reality in a different way, to be truthful, to keep talking, to move from the heart rather than from narrow-mindedness, creates true encounters, true bi-partisanship and hints at what God's image should look like in us.

In today's Gospel, Jesus notes that everyone, even little children, are worthy of honor and respect, the best of modeling and inspired encouragement, as the letter to the Hebrews points out. "He who consecrates and those who are being consecrated all have one origin." We share a common humanity but so often we let our basic needs, our selfish interests and sometimes our worst instincts lead us by the nose.

So, when we hear Jesus affirm that "what God has joined together, no human being must separate," Jesus is talking about our human behavior and more than just a married couple.

He is talking about how we relate to one another in our homes, where we work and how we treat one another.

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PENSAMIENTOS DEL PADRE RICHARD MANGINI



TODOS SOMOS UNA SOLA CARNE

¿Qué debemos pensar al ver que los miembros de los partidos políticos se demonizan entre sí, se burlan el uno del otro, justifican el comportamiento de los hombres que acosan sexualmente a las mujeres o apoyan a los políticos por su ideología en lugar de estar interesados en si actúan moralmente en su trabajo y acciones?

Hemos olvidado **la esencia y la importancia del ser humano como persona y como comunidad.** Hay demasiados cristianos cuya fe en Dios es propia y personal, que viven sus vidas libremente tanto en el trato a los demás como en la forma en que sus vidas están desconectadas unas de otras.

Pueden conocer algunos rituales de su educación religiosa, pero no conocen las escrituras hebreas o cristianas o la historia del pensamiento social católico o cómo el universo y sus pueblos están conectados entre sí.

El Papa Francisco nunca se cansa de expresar la necesidad de **dialogar**, de encontrarse unos a otros como personas para reconstruir la estructura de la sociedad. El diálogo es hablar y escucharse el uno al otro, no hablar del pasado o mal o con mentiras. Antes de que ese diálogo pueda suceder o ser enseñado o practicado, tenemos que volver al principio para ver lo que Dios tenía en mente al crearnos. **Las escrituras de hoy nos dicen de manera muy simple, bella y poderosa que todos los seres humanos han sido creados a la imagen y semejanza de Dios.**

Yo diría que este es el primer artículo de nuestro Credo como cristianos, como Católicos y como seguidores de Jesús. Una persona

puede decir que cree en Dios, pero de la manera cómo habla, lo qué piensa y cómo trata a los demás revela lo que cree.

En el hermoso mito de la creación, creado y transmitido en la fe por nuestros antepasados Judíos, Dios crea todo, pero permite a los hombres y mujeres crearse uno al otro con la tarea especial de acompañarse y cuidarse entre sí, con palabras y acciones se complementan y se apoyan mutuamente. Se esfuerzan por crear una unidad en sí mismos y una unidad en la familia.

Los hombres, las mujeres y la familia se convierten en la piedra angular y el ADN de la humanidad. Dios no tuvo la intención de magnificar las diferencias y la separación en ninguna forma o promover extremos que pongan los intereses propios en contra de los demás.

Cuando nos olvidamos de la gran imagen que será nuestra inspiración, nos hundimos en el partidismo. Podemos entender el endurecimiento físico de las arterias, pero no parecemos reconocer la dureza de los corazones. La dureza de los corazones, el olvido de que estamos hechos a la imagen

y semejanza de Dios permiten que el divorcio, la separación y el partidismo, y el desagrado correcto, se acumulen y sean fomentados.

El diálogo respetuoso y el escuchar a los demás, la voluntad de cambiar o mirar un punto de la realidad de una manera diferente, ser sincero, seguir hablando, moverse de corazón en lugar de tener una mente estrecha, crea encuentros verdaderos, verdadero bi-partidismo y pistas sobre cómo debería ser la imagen de Dios en nosotros.

En el Evangelio de hoy, Jesús señala que todos, incluso los niños pequeños, son dignos de honor y respeto, lo mejor de los modelos y el aliento inspirado, como lo señala la carta a los Hebreos. "El que consagra y los que están siendo consagrados tienen un único origen". Compartimos una humanidad común, pero a menudo dejamos que nuestras necesidades básicas, nuestros intereses egoístas y, en ocasiones, nuestro peor instinto nos lleven de la nariz.

Entonces, cuando escuchamos a Jesús afirmar que "lo que Dios ha unido, ningún ser humano debe separarlo".

Jesús está hablando de nuestro comportamiento como ser humano, más que solo de una pareja casada.

Él está hablando de cómo nos relacionamos en nuestros hogares, en nuestros trabajos y cómo nos tratamos unos a otros.

Y también está hablando sobre cómo vivimos nuestras vidas públicas como ciudadanos de nuestro país, cómo hacemos un discurso político, cómo nos involucramos en nuestras comunidades, cómo nos ofrecemos voluntariamente para completar lo que se necesita hacer para mejorar a toda nuestra sociedad, cómo cumplimos con nuestras obligaciones de participar en la vida cívica y votar como ciudadanos .

Todos somos una sola carne.

PROGRAM ON DIALOGUE IN OCTOBER**



We now live in a world desperately in need of dialogue, but which is woefully lacking in the skill and practice of it. Dialogue is the foundation on which all that is broken in our society might be made whole. Pope Francis offers a good definition - "Dialogue is born from an attitude of respect for the other person, from a conviction that the other person has something good to say.
