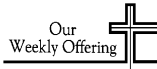

WEEKLY HOMILY / HOMILÍA SEMANAL**Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time/Domingo Treinta y dos Tiempo Ordinario**

The first reading and the Gospel of this Sunday give us a clear example of what it means to fulfill the commandments of loving God over everything and the neighbor as one's self. But before continuing, it is necessary to understand that the status of a widow in Israel, or better yet all of the Middle East, from the times of the prophet Elijah, to the times of Jesus Christ, and even until very recently in our actual society, she was considered nobody; she did not have anyone who could support her or defend her from the abuses and injustices that she could suffer, she did not have any rights. In those times there were not any state subsidies or a widow's welfare, nor social security or any type of pension. It is for this reason that these two women are heroes in scripture, for as we see in the first widow, who is given a word by the prophet Elijah, she risks the life of her son and her own for the love of God. As a result, she receives a great recompense, for she has demonstrated that she loves God over everything, even more than her son, and her own life. Showing not only by word but by deed what the prophet asks of her so that she may be able to experience that God has not abandoned them, and that God always provides for his children. In the second case, the widow of the Gospel, she places in the treasury, in basket for the collection, everything that she has to live; she does it for the love of God, two cents, which was nothing in comparison with what the rich and moneyed give. But she has also placed her intention to love God more than her very life. It is to this attitude that the Lord is calling us today to do something very radical, but not with our own will power, but by asking him that he help us –so that this word of the Shema Israel Adonai Elohenu, Adonai Ehad –may be fulfilled in our lives today, tomorrow and always. May God bless you always.

La primera lectura y el Evangelio de este Domingo nos ponen un ejemplo claro de lo que es cumplir los mandamientos, de Amar a Dios sobre todas las cosas y al prójimo como a uno mismo. Pero antes de proseguir, tenemos que entender que, una viuda en Israel, y en todo el medio oriente, tanto en tiempos del profeta Elías, como en tiempos de Jesucristo, e incluso hasta hace muy poco tiempo en nuestra sociedad actual, no era nada, no tenía a nadie que la sostuviera o la defendiera de los abusos y atropellos que pudiera sufrir, no tenía derechos. En aquellos tiempos, no había subsidios estatales ni pagas de viudedad, ni seguridad social, ni pensiones de ningún tipo. Por estas razones, estas dos mujeres, son unas heroínas de las escrituras, ya que la primera, a una palabra del profeta Elías, pone en riesgo su vida y la de su hijo por amor a Dios. Por esto recibe una gran recompensa, porque demuestra que ama Dios por encima de todo, incluso más que a su hijo, y su propia vida. Demostrándolo no solo de palabra sino haciendo lo que el profeta le pidió, para que pudiera experimentar que Dios no los había abandonado, y que Dios siempre provee a sus hijos. En el segundo caso, la viuda del Evangelio, ella pone en el tesoro, en la canasta de las ofrendas, todo lo que tiene para vivir, lo hace por amor a Dios, dos centavos, nada en comparación con lo que ponen los ricos y adinerados. Pero pone su intención de amar a Dios más que a su propia vida. A esto nos está llamando el Señor hoy, a hacer algo muy radical, no en nuestro esfuerzo, sino pidiéndole que nos ayude a que esta palabra del Shema Israel Adonai Elohenu, Adonai Ehad se haga realidad en nuestras vidas hoy, mañana y siempre. Que Dios me los bendiga siempre.

FOOD PANTRY DONATIONS

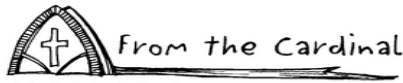
Our Food Pantry is in need of food. Please drop off your food to help feed those in need of our parish in the baskets at the back of the church or at the rectory.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Veterans Day began with the signing of a symbolic treaty between the Allies and Germany ending World War I (then called the "Great War") on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. The auspicious date was actually a well-established religious holiday, the feast of Saint Martin of Tours, a beloved soldier saint of the army of Rome. After World War II, Armistice Day was changed to Veterans Day in the United States and Remembrance Day in Britain, but of course the feast of Saint Martin endures.

Martin was named after Mars, the god of war, and against the advice of his parents he went on his own to church. He became a catechumen at the age of ten. By fifteen he was enlisted in the cavalry in France. Coming across a poor man, Martin had an impulse to divide his bright red soldier's cape and clothe him. He later had the insight that he had served Christ, and the other half of his cape became a lifelong sign to him of his duty to serve the poor. Housed in a tiny church capella or "chapel," the cape became a great object of pilgrimage on the way to Compostella, and a favored place for the prayers of soldiers. Martin was not so eager to serve as bishop as he had been as a soldier, and legend says that he hid in a barn filled with geese to avoid episcopal election. To this day, the customary meal for November 11 is goose! Traditionally, this is the last feast day before winter closes in, and begins a period of fasting once known as "Saint Martin's Lent" or "Martinmas," that later developed into the season of Advent --Rev. James Field, Copyright (c) J. S. Paluch Co.

Uno de estos fieles, el joven uruguayo Walter Elías Chango Rondeau, (1921-1939) en sus pocos años de vida encontró consuelo en el hecho de que Dios se entrega a sí mismo en la comunión.

Según testigos, Walter animaba a sus compañeros a la reconciliación y la Eucaristía. Hablaba tan elocuentemente del Santísimo Sacramento, que parecía sacerdote. Siendo laico, él supo ejercer su sacerdocio bautismal. --Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright (c) J. S. Paluch Co., Inc.
