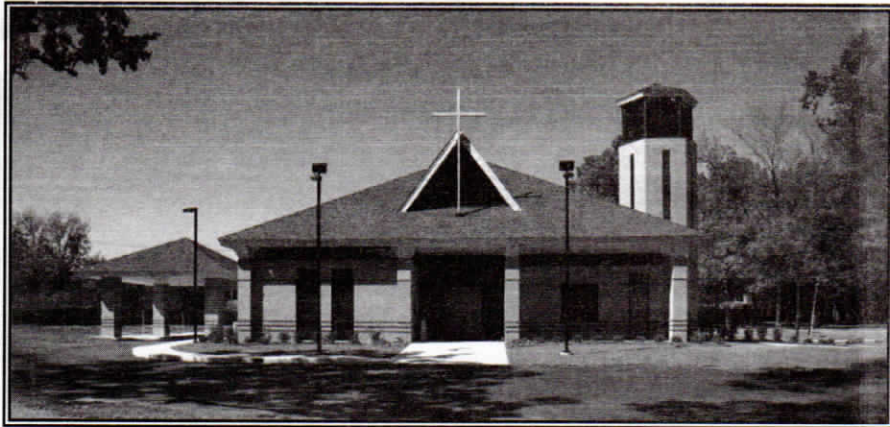

## *Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God*

**JANUARY 1, 2017**

Numbers 6:22-27; Galatians 4:4-7;  
Luke 2:16-21

January 1 is the most ancient feast day of Mary; probably it was on this day that the Basilica of St. Mary Major in Rome was dedicated in ancient times. After the Council of Ephesus in 431 A.D., October 11 was set as the feast of Mary's Motherhood; and this day declined in importance. It went through several changes of title, including "Circumcision" and "Octave Day of Christmas." The Second Vatican Council restored its ancient title.

But this day is observed as a Holy Day of Obligation (even when it doesn't fall on Sunday) because it is New Year's Day. The Church wants us to begin our year right with God!

The Council of Tours in 567 A.D. said that the days between January 1 and 3 should be days of prayer to stamp out the debauchery of pagans. Considering the revelry of our modern times on New Year's Eve, we may wonder if the Church ever succeeded!

The first reading is the blessing of Aaron. In ancient times, blessings and curses were thought to have almost a physical effect: They caused what they said. (The blessing of Jacob by Isaac is an example of this.) For us, the blessing is a prayer; we pray that the Lord will bless us, keep us, and make his face shine on us throughout the year.

The second reading speaks of our adoption as children of God. We must be free from the entanglements of this world. Our relationship with God is so close that we can call him "Abba," an intimate term for "Father" (perhaps better translated as "daddy.")

The Gospel speaks of Mary reflecting on her heart the mystery of God become man. We need to reflect in our hearts this great mystery. The Lord became one of us in order to bring us to God. Let us live as his children this year.

**The Church:** Today, we continue to think about collegiality. When the apostles' age came to an end, bishops of each region met together very often. We have record of the letter written in 100 A.D by Bishop of Rome to Corinthians telling them how important the solidarity is to build up the Christian community. As in the case of the apostles, they used to send epistles to other churches just as we see the letters of the apostles to churches in our Scripture. As the Church grew in number and frequency of meetings, the correspondence grew as well. The local council used to consult with the Bishop of Rome when they had to make decisions on important matters. Thus, his judgment was crucial when there were disputes on the date of Easter to be celebrated in Asia Minor, the rebaptism controversy in North Africa, and the threat of Gnosticism affecting many parts of the Christian community. In all such cases, the decision from Rome was considered final. They also appreciated the idea of all the bishops of the world coming together to re-evaluate the whole structure of the Church. It is known as the ecumenical Council because the Greek word "oikoumene" means the inhabited world. The first one of that kind was the Ecumenical Council at Nicea in 325. Yet, a total development of the doctrine of the Church was formalized by Vat II under the guidance of Pope John XXIII and Pope Paul VI. It became necessary due to the rise of the secular state and the facilities of communication that were growing. Now bishops can contact each other in no time. In other words, modern technology helped the collegiality greatly. At the same time, there was the rise of national churches where the princes' supported the bishops who wanted their autonomy. It is called Caesaro-Papalism. As the name suggests, the "Caesar" is sufficiently religious and could establish his own state church independent of papal authority. In Maoist China, it came up with another face. There the "nationalization" of the church was its total de-Christianization. Father Joe
