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Windows Devoted to the Blessed Mother

The Annunciation of Mary and the Assumption of Mary are highlighted in this article, the ninth in a series featuring the stained glass windows in St. Patrick Church. In the last issue, we incorrectly stated the window closest to the pulpit as you face the altar was of the Annunciation of Mary. It depicted, instead, the Assumption of Mary. The Annunciation of Mary is depicted in the window on the wall and to your left as you walk up the stairs to the church.

The Annunciation of Mary

This deeply religious stained glass panel depicts the Archangel Gabriel (shown on the right) as he presents himself to the Virgin Mary, bearing the message that she has been chosen to give birth to the Son of God. Described in the Bible in the Book of Luke, the Annunciation to the Blessed Virgin Mary is the moment that Mary finds out she will bear the son of the Lord. She has already promised her hand in marriage to Joseph when the Archangel Gabriel appears to her. He tells Mary that

she is highly favored by God and blessed among women. Mary is shaken and frightened by the vision, and questions how she could possibly bear a child when she is still a virgin. The words of the angel bring her comfort and peace.

The Assumption of Mary

Celebrated every year on August 15, the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary commemorates the death of Mary and her bodily assumption into Heaven. We Catholics believe that the glorification of the flesh, which will take place for us only at the end of time, was granted to Mary at the end of her earthly life. We believe, therefore, that the bodies of both Jesus and Mary are now in heaven. There is, however, this difference: Iesus arose from the tomb and ascended into heaven by his own power, whereas Mary's body was taken up to heaven by the power of her Son. For that reason we use two different words: the Ascension of Christ and the Assumption of Mary.

Spotlight on Marita O'Rourke by Maureen Sposato

Main Street resident Marita O'Rourke has been a familiar person at St. Patrick Church since she moved to Farmington with her family in 1969.

Born and raised in Westfield New Jersey, Marita attended Mt. St. Mary Academy and then Chestnut Hill College in Philadelphia. She and her husband Jim, an ophthalmologist, moved to Farmington when he was recruited to become the first director of the UCONN Health Center's ophthalmology department.

Although raised as a Catholic and married in the church, Marita considers herself fortunate to have had an ecumenical upbringing. "My mother came from a large Catholic Brooklyn family, and my father was an engineer and Episcopalian. They couldn't have been more different, and I saw all sides of every issue," she says. Her husband Jim, born a Catholic, became more comfortable at St. James Episcopal Church after they moved to Connecticut. "It was the right one for him," she says. "The Catholic Church is the right one for me."

Her husband passed away in 2011 after 57 years of marriage, and she credits her faith for helping her through the hard times. "I lost my husband, my son and my brother in a very short time period, and daily Mass gets me out, keeps me going," she says. "We are very fortunate and blessed to have Fr. Barry. He is a good priest who gives good sermons."

Marita has three daughters: Carol Troiani, Elizabeth Doyle, and Margaret Nowak. Her son James passed away suddenly when he was in his fifties. She has eight grandchildren. She also has many friends, both from Farmington and from her childhood.

When the children were younger she managed the household,

handled the family finances and loved to sew. She was a "friendly visitor" for shut-ins and the elderly who needed a friend. In addition to often attending the "Tuesday Morning" group at St. Patrick, she has been a long time regular at the "The Brown Cover Book Club" at St. Peter Claver Church in West Hartford. The reading group discusses books and articles about Catholicism and how the Church has changed. "It's important to be broadminded, to not get in a rut," she says.

Ministry Minute: MESI ANPIL

hank you very much for, once again, generously donat-▲ ing to our annual collection for the people of Haiti. Your gift continues to CHANGE and SAVE lives! For many years St. Patrick has helped Outreach to Haiti's programs in life giving ways. On behalf of the Haitians we say, mesi anpil ~ thank you!

The programs developed and rendered by Outreach focus on healthcare, education, and economic development. Education in Haiti is vastly different than in the United States. Free public education does not exist, therefore students whose parents cannot afford private school tuition, do not go to school! Fortunately, through Outreach to Haiti's education sponsorship program there are 200 students, kindergarten through post-secondary, who are able to attend school. Outreach has also launched a new economic development program named Fanm Avanse Kounye (FAK) ~ English translation is "Advancing Women Now". Using the skills of contracted coaches, FAK will provide the next steps for women to develop the skills and confidence to secure a livelihood and attain a sense of well-being for themselves and their families. To learn more about these and other Outreach programs visit http://outreachtohaiti.org. The newsletter has up-to-date information about what Outreach is doing in Haiti.

Outreach works with skilled Haitian doctors and nurses to deliver much needed healthcare for the Haitians. In addition, St. Patrick's has been blessed to have many of our parishioners travel and volunteer with the dental team led by Dr. Ralph Bozza. Every year they set up a dental clinic and care for hundreds of patients in one week. Dr. Dennis Gianoli, also from our parish, often travels with the dental team. Among those who helped at the clinic last October were Bob and Marion Slater and Gene and Bev Montresor (pictured). Below are the thoughts they shared about their experience.

According to Gene Montresor, "Working with our parish dental team in Haiti was an amazing experience. Adults and children were lined up every day for an opportunity to receive much needed dental care. Everyone was so gracious and appreciative. While there is so much need in Haiti, it was rewarding to see what this team accomplished in one week and how much good Outreach to Haiti is doing."

Bob Slater added, "When first planning to go to Haiti there were many things unknown to me. I wondered whether the

> water would be safe to drink; I didn't know what we would be doing there, and I also didn't know how we would interact with the Haitian people. I had a great experience truly better than I thought it would be. We assisted St. Patrick's dental team, and each morning we found long lines of Haitians waiting at the clinic for treatment. It was evident that the Haitian people appreciated the terrific work of the dentists. Lastly, I enjoyed the harmonious company of the travelers and delicious food we were served at the Mission House. We were lucky enough to travel to Haiti with a great group of people and the trip was so enjoyable and memorable."


September 16, 17, 18: Theme: The Holy Spirit: The Spirit in Scripture; Pentecost; Spirit of Life.

Catholics Coming Home

Do you know someone who has left the Church? Most of us do not have to look very far to find nonpracticing Catholics in our circle of family and friends. Many of us are concerned about these loved ones, but do not know how to help them. Most of them are searching, but how can we help them find their way home?

As baptized, practicing Catholics, we have a precious gift of faith and love from the Lord that needs to be shared with our nonpracticing brothers and sisters. First, we need to pray for them. Next, we need to extend a personal invitation to them to come home to the Catholic Church. Many nonpracticing Catholics are waiting for an invitation to return. Many mistakenly think that they are excommunicated and are not welcome to return for a variety of reasons.

Many nonpracticing Catholics carry with them a tremendous amount of guilt and misinformation about the Church and are afraid of approaching the Church for fear of being rejected. We can make a difference in someone's life simply by reaching out to them and telling them we miss them and would like for them to come back home to our Church community.

At St. Patrick we are currently developing a program called Catholics Coming Home to reach out to our nonpracticing Catholic brothers and sisters and welcome them back. This program will conduct a six-part mini-series this fall (October / November) for nonpracticing Catholics who are interested in returning or reconnecting with their faith. The sessions, based on the book, Catholics Can Come Home Again! A Guide for the Journey of Reconciliation with Inactive Catholics, by Carrie Kemp, will be conducted in a very welcoming, non-threatening, atmosphere. No one will be rejected for whatever reason they left the Church.

I am currently recruiting members to this program's team. If you are interested in learning more about this program, either because you might be interested in participating as a team member or because you know of a nonpracticing Catholic who might wish to attend our fall program, please contact me. 
