Up until then, they were quite animated, laughing and talking between sets. Then, spontaneously, they all became silent, not a word was spoken, as they watched with rapt attention.

This was last Friday at the jamboree. The Sound of Pride, the Berwick High School band, performed at 5:30 before the first BHS contest of the evening. After their performance, the band members took their places in the bleachers to perform during Berwick's two scheduled football games. Another school band performed between the games.

When I looked over to our band, I was amazed to see them observe the other band's performance with such intensity, not a word being shared.

Mrs. McCarter, the staff, and the students spend hours preparing for the annual marching competition. The routine has to be mastered, the music perfected. Given their tremendous dedication, they observed the other school's performance from their own perspective.

I have been wondering about the nature of that perspective. Were they interested in comparing the programs? Were they scoping out a competitor? Were they ranking their performance against the other band? Were they merely curious? Was it respect for others with whom they shared the experience of hard work and effort?

Whatever the perspective, the students were very intense in their attention to the performance.

This was in stark contrast to the rest of the crowd. Most people were engaged in conversation or making their way to the concession stand. Some, I am sure, had to see a man about a horse. This behavior is more typical.

We have a tendency not to be attentive to what is happening. Notice, for example, people having extensive conversations while watching a movie. People sharing a meal frequently sit there and text, play games, or do other things on their phones. I will pass on the opportunity to comment on the behavior of people in church.

Are we losing our ability to be attentive in a sincere, integral, and authentic manner?

If we are, it is not because we have not been well educated in the importance of being attentive. Our educational experiences contain many incidents wherein teachers told us to pay attention, including setting aside distractions. Human nature is human nature: we tend to revert to what we hold to be of value, even when it is to our detriment. Mrs. McCarter did not tell the band members last Friday to watch the other school's performance. There are probably a multitude of reasons for their attentiveness.

There is, however, one thing that holds the various perspectives and motives together. Each student determined a value for watching the performance. This value was internal, self-motivation.

Are there situations in our lives that merit the same value and elicit appropriate attentiveness?

Do we fail to give people the attentiveness they are due? Do we fail to give our God the attentiveness He desires?
