

Consideration of our Christian Commitment: Awaiting Fulfillment

This Sunday as we begin the Fourth Week of Advent, St.



Joseph is presented to us as a model of trust, to guide us through these last weeks of Advent. It is beautiful how all who were associated with the first Christmas were asked to trust – Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, the Wise Men. All trusted and acted on their trust. May they and their faith based trust guide us into Christmas and the

Christmas Season.

This is one of those years in which we have a full Fourth Week of Advent. Of course that means that the evening Eucharist for the Fourth Sunday of Advent will not be celebrated. Instead we have the Christmas Vigils.

Many have asked about Deacon Pete and how things were going with him and Ruth, their health and home. I had the opportunity to visit with him last weekend, as he was transferred from New Orleans where he and Ruth had been staying these past months. At the time of the flood, Deacon Pete had surgery for cancer in his lungs, and the surgery and flood all came at the same time. He had the surgery in New Orleans where he and Ruth were staying with their son. The surgery went well, but he is recovering from the chemo. He was at the Lake when I visited him, and he hoped by Christmas to be back with Ruth in their home. Let us keep them and their family in our prayers.

Our parish staff had our annual outing the second week of Advent.



This year we went to St. Michael the Archangel Church in Convent where we celebrated the Eucharist, had a tour and short presentation on the history of the parish and then a holiday luncheon at Hymel's. Our staff has always been a top notch staff and works together beautifully, but these past months have been exceptional



and as for many of you, very challenging. But they more than rose to the occasion. I would like also to say a special word of thanks to Lota Lamonica who assumed a lion's

share of our parish's ministry to the flood victims. She has been our contact person with those in need and their contact with the parish, helping us set up different programs that were needed, when they were needed, moving from clean up, to rebuilding and finally refurbishing. I join with the staff in thanking her for her efforts on our behalf. She has not only been a blessing to those who came to us, but also to the staff and to me.

The parish Christmas Cards to parishioners got into the mail last week and I hope by now you have received them. This year a good friend of mine, Joyce Jackson, did a pen and ink sketch of the Gate of Mercy, the Memorial to the Oblate Fathers and Brothers and their ministry among us. The cards arrived from the printer the first week of August and were stored in the closet in my office. Well, like most of us, the cards have their own story. On August 13, they were flooded along with everything else under two feet of water in the Administration Building.




At left is a photograph of the cards on August 15, when we were cleaning out the offices and beginning the process of gutting out walls. I had placed the first load of wet cards in a wheelbarrow

in preparation for their trip to the road. I made several trips with cards that day, but was on the phone with the printer by the end of the week asking for a reprint. The photograph above was for the insurance man, not a souvenir photo! A lot of the cards needed to be readdressed, evidence that many of our families were still not in their homes. Much has happened since then, and I hope things are moving along with all of you also as we move toward Christmas.

If all goes right, this should be our first week with the refurbished pews – new ends, middle supports and kneelers. We appreciate your patience over these past months. With the arrival of the pews, the Cry Room is expected to be opened again. Work continues on other rooms associated with the church and around the campus. Presently we have no word as to when the Adoration Chapel will reopen and Fr. Raj and I will not be back in the rectory till sometime early next year. I have heard day by day from some that they are returning to their homes. I pray that wherever you are, like Mary and Joseph, your loving and faith-filled trust will open your hearts and lives to a good and graced Christmas. Let us keep one another in prayer.



Stump the Deacon!

Was Jesus really born on December 25?

This question has been debated for 2,000 years and some Church Fathers questioned whether it should be celebrated at all. No one today knows for sure when Jesus was born. At the time they did not keep records as we do today. The early Christians were far more concerned with when Jesus died. We are told that he died during the Jewish Feast of Passover which would be in the Spring close to the Spring Equinox roughly March 23. Some early fathers felt that it would be appropriate for Jesus to be conceived (to begin His life on earth) at the beginning of Spring so they set the celebration of the Annunciation on March 25. Nine months later would be December 25. None of this was much of an issue until the mid-4th century when Christianity could finally be practiced openly. The first clear date for Christmas was December 25, 336 although it had probably been celebrated on December 25 for 50 to 100 years already.



## Outreach

### Getting Through the Holidays While Grieving

*“Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.” Matthew 5:4*

The holiday season can be a mixture of feelings, especially if you are grieving the loss of a loved one. Celebrations take on a different meaning as you work through the many emotions of grief. It is so hard to think about gifts and fun and holidays when a loved one has died. Whether the loss is recent or old, you have to determine what kind of celebration and remembrance is right for you. Tackling the holidays after a loss is a work in progress. Make changes that feel right to you and honors those you have lost.

There are steps you can take, however to help give the holidays a new meaning. The holidays can become a time of peace and reflection, a time to cherish the gift your loved one has been-and continues to be-in the life of your family. Here are a few ideas that may help you begin the journey.

- **Be patient and realistic.** Often our high expectations lead to frustration at this time of the year. You are grieving so be kind and gentle with yourself. Leave the word *ought* out of the holiday season. Plan ahead so you are not overwhelmed. Grieving makes it hard to concentrate so make lists and prioritize what is the most important to you.
- **Listen to your heart and acknowledge your limits.** Spend some quiet time acknowledging your needs and desire. Share them with family and friends and have them share with you what their needs are. Say “no” and make your “yes” tentative. If it is too much to decorate the whole house, lawn etc., just decorate one room or one corner. Don’t drown your grief in food and alcohol but also do not deny yourself the pleasures of good food and companionship out of a sense of guilt. Take care of yourself and listen to your body.
- **Adapt cherished traditions.** Don’t scrap the whole idea of the holidays because of feeling overwhelmed. Do small things like make a donation of a gift or money to a charity; try new twist to old traditions-have dinner on Christmas Eve instead of Christmas day. Do whatever feels right for you and your family.
- **Allow the tears to come, but look for joy amidst the pain.** Unpacking the holiday decorations will mean unpacking not only warm, loving memories but heartaches as well. Don’t deny yourself the gift of healing tears. Sometimes all we can remember are the painful details surrounding our loved one’s death. This holiday season, try to also remember all the wonderful moments of your loved one’s life.
- **Focus on the spiritual dimension of the holidays.** In your own time and when it feels right, focusing on the underlying religious meaning of this time may help refashion the holidays. In this season of light, remember the light your loved one has brought to your life. Light a special candle-not in memory of a death, but in celebration of a life and a loved shared.
