

Summer Safety

As noted in a previous article in the bulletin, summer is here and it brings with it a lot of safety concerns. Prevention is the key to keep everyone happy and healthy. Here are a few more safety tips.

1. Beware of Bugs-Unfortunately, those blood-sucking critters are a part of summer nights and evening days. Here are some suggestions on how to stay safe from insects:

- **Spray and repeat-**Spray exposed skin and clothing. Reapply whenever the spray gets washed off or the skin gets bitten again.
- **Check for allergic reactions-**Some people react to insect bites more than others. If an allergic reaction occurs from a bite, seek medical attention to see what kind of medication to give.
- **Beware of serious bug-borne illnesses-**West Nile is the virus that you will hear the most about. The symptoms are flu-like. So if the person has bites and flu-like symptoms with muscle-stiffness, it should be checked out by the doctor.
- **Check for ticks-** Ticks are found in moist, warm, woody areas. Wearing long clothing is ideal in these areas but not always easy in the heat of summer. Shower and checking within two hours of exposure decreases the chances of a tick bite. Make sure to check the entire body: under the arms, in and around the ears, inside the belly button, back of knees, in and around the hair, around the waist, etc. Wash all clothing.

- 2. Prevent Dehydration-**To prevent dehydration, kids should drink 12 ounces of fluid 30 minutes before an activity begins and take mandatory fluid breaks with kids under 90 pounds drinking 5 ounces every 20 minutes and kids over 90 pounds 9 ounces every 20 minutes. Tip: A child's gulp equals a half-ounce of fluid, so they should take about 10 gulps for every 20 minutes of play. Watch for warning signs of dehydration: thirst, dry/sticky mouth, headache, muscle cramping, irritability, extreme fatigue, weakness, dizziness, or decreased performance.
- 3. Head injuries-** NO helmet, NO wheels. Kids should wear a properly fitting helmet that is approved by the CPSC for the activity they are doing, (biking, skating, skate boarding, etc.). Make it a family rule and have parents and caregivers wear a helmet also. (The biggest mistake with a helmet: forgetting to fasten the chin strap!)
- 4. Never wait in a hot car-**It only takes 10 minutes for a car to heat up by 19 degrees. Never leave a child (or pet) in a car, even for a minute. Even outside temperatures as low as the mid 50's can cause heat stroke or death. Children's bodies heat up three to five times faster than an adult's.

Summer Vacation Bible School was a big success. Before it began, Barbara Norman met with Deacon John to explain some of the possibilities for his involvement. **We were blessed to have many parishioners who taught, helped with crafts, refreshments, and fun activities and we thank you all.** Vacation Bible



School focused on the theme, **Christian Olympics, Running for the Gold.** St. Paul focused on that same theme 2,000 years earlier in his letter to Timothy when he wrote, "I have competed well; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith. From now on the crown of righteousness awaits me, which the Lord, the just judge will award to me on that day, and not only to me, but to all who have longed for his appearance."



Mighty Moms began their summer food distribution the second weekend in June. When I went to the office Saturday morning for a little while, I saw people all lined up in the parking lot at 6:00, nearly three hours before the distribution was to begin. To me it is a good witness to the



reality of how these recipients of the Mighty Moms' ministry are in need of their assistance and that they are not lazy. Lazy people would never have gotten in here so early and stayed in line for so long a time. Mighty Moms served on that one Saturday 151 households which totaled 568

people. They will continue to serve under the pavilion on the second Saturday of the month.

A Saturday morning workshop was held earlier this month for our Jr. High School Religion teachers.



Plans are being made for the coming PSR School Year to offer the Jr. High Students a blending of PSR and Youth Ministry via a Religious Education Program called **Edge**. Edge is a Catholic middle school youth ministry/PSR program which provides a safe, fun place for youth to find solid Catholic community, to get answers to their questions about the faith, and most importantly, to experience Jesus in a profound and personal way. Edge resources speak to the physical, psychological, cognitive, relational and spiritual maturation of middle school youth, and make it easier for youth ministers and teachers to plan out their semesters, presenting Catholic teaching in a way the youth can understand and appreciate. We believe that Edge will help us answer the needs of this age group in a catechetical, fun and relevant way, providing a good foundation for them to enter into Life Teen programs later. **The Life Teen program will be used for the ninth grade.** We trust Edge and Life Teen will be assets to our Religious Ed program as well as to our youth ministry program as it speaks to the needs of this age group while providing good religious education.

CommUnity Hands is an ecumenical ministry to the poor and needy. Though



similar to Mighty Moms, they do not give out food but help with other needs like electrical bills, housing, etc. They had a very successful fund raiser two weeks ago and served about 635 plates. CommUnity Hands had its origin in our Outreach Commission a number of years ago, and now enjoys the involvement of many churches in our community. **We thank the K.C.'s who assisted them in their fish fry.**

Let us keep one another in prayer as we all, like John the Baptist, seek to prepare the way of the Lord. Love,

Each week during the next few months, we will be sharing the R.C.I.A. experience and stories of our new Catholics who joined the Church this Easter, as well as comments from their sponsors.

My RCIA experience was different than most. I was not questioning whether or not I should go through this process or if this was where I was meant to be – I knew I was meant to be here. I had dreams throughout the summer before RCIA began of me becoming a part of the Church with her as my safe haven. I knew after a few weeks after my reoccurring dreams that I was meant to be here and this is where God intended my life to take me. When I decided to go through this, I didn't really have that much of a connection to God or a faith life at all really. I had boycotted organized religion for over seven years, but something in me continually brought me back and solidified this decision for me. Father Raj had given me a blessing after my mom had told him of the reoccurring dreams I was having. He prayed over me and told me the further I got into the Church, the more graceful I'd become. I held onto those words throughout my entire journey. Every time I would convince myself I was "too busy" or didn't have enough time for this, those words Father Raj spoke to me drew me back into the process. Before converting, I wouldn't have labeled myself as a bad person. I was a good daughter, a studious student, and very involved on campus. After converting and feeling my heart open up to His grace and really giving myself fully to God, it felt like I was a whole person. It was as if a part of myself had been missing this entire time without me even noticing it. I have never felt so much fulfillment and so much joy in my 19 years of life until I completed this process. RCIA gave me a reason for all that I do in life. It allowed me to give everything I have to God and trust in Him and His decisions entirely because I know He knows way more than I do. All of my choices and decisions in life I now look at in an entirely different light. How will this affect my relationship with Christ? How will this affect my journey to eternal salvation? Before my conversion, I was constantly trying to fill this void I felt within my life with extracurricular activities and leadership positions at LSU. Even through all of the praises and awards, I still did not feel like it was enough. Without this process, I would not be entirely satisfied with where I am or who I am, but with Christ in my heart, I now have a reason to live a graceful life, and I'm not chasing worldly things any longer (although I do fall short at times). If you are ever considering going through the RCIA process, pray about it, and God will always bring you to the place you are meant to be – He did for me over and over as much as I tried to deny Him, and I'm forever thankful for this blessing.

Stump the Deacon!

Hurricane season started June 1st. Some of our prayers asking to be spared from hurricanes are addressed to Our Lady of Prompt Succor Why? (Part 3)



In 1812, a great fire threatened the Vieux Carré and the Ursuline Convent in New Orleans. As the convent was being evacuated, a nun brought a small statue of Our Lady of Prompt Succor to the window facing the fire and Sister Michel prayed:

Our Lady of Prompt Succor, we are lost if you do not come to our aid.

The wind changed direction and turned the fire away. The Ursuline Convent was one of the few buildings in the French Quarter that was saved from destruction. Our Lady interceded again at the *Battle of New Orleans* in 1815. Many faithful, including wives and daughters of the American soldiers, gathered in the Ursuline chapel before the statue of *Our Lady of Prompt Succor* and spent the night before the battle in prayer. They asked Our Lady for victory by Andrew Jackson's forces over the British. Jackson and 200 men from around the South won a remarkable victory over a superior British force in a battle that lasted twenty-five minutes and saw few American casualties. The victory Our Lady gave could not have been more prompt and complete. The Ursulines credited Our Lady of Prompt Succor for the British defeat. Jackson agreed; throughout his life he would remark that the battle was won only with the aid of a supernatural presence. He even went to the Ursuline Convent to thank the sisters for their prayers.

As a result, Our Lady of Prompt Succor is the Patron Saint of Louisiana, the Archdiocese of New Orleans, and the City of New Orleans. Catholics in Louisiana continue to pray to her to save them once again whenever a hurricane threatens.
