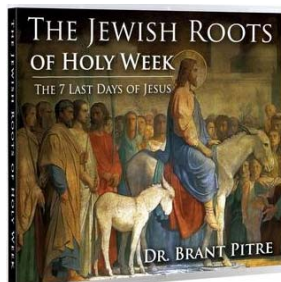

If you knew you only had one week left to live, how would you spend it? What would you do?

- *Sunday*: Why did Jesus rise on the "first day of the week"?

If you're looking to get more out of the season of Lent this year and to truly enter into the mystery of Holy Week with Jesus then this Bible study is for you.

## Consideration of Our Christian Commitment: Passion Sunday/Holy Week

**This Sunday known popularly as Palm Sunday and “officially,” as Passion Sunday begins the most solemn time of the Church Year.** We will begin this Sunday with the blessing of palms, and as we process into church we will remember Christ’s triumphant entry into Jerusalem.

**We will move through Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday with days of preparation. They will be days of preparation in many ways.** The church environment will be prepared for the Triduum which will begin later in the week, our Elect and Candidates for Full Communion will complete their final preparations to be received into the Church, and we will complete our own personal and spiritual preparation to enter into the Lord’s Triduum.

**The Sacred Triduum will begin Holy Thursday in the evening at seven o’clock with the Liturgy of the Lord’s Supper.** The Eucharist of the Lord’s Supper will also include the washing of feet of representatives of the parish. At the end of the Eucharist, we will process with the remaining Communion to the place of repose where the Communion, to be distributed at the solemn services Good Friday, will be placed for private prayer and adoration until 9:00 at night.

**The Sacred Triduum will continue on Good Friday, with the Solemn Liturgy of the Lord’s Passion at 3:00 p.m.** At this service we will proclaim the Passion of the Lord, have Adoration of the Cross, and the Solemn Prayers then join in prayer for each other and the world as Our Lord prayed from His cross. The service will conclude with Communion which was consecrated the evening before. Stations of the Cross will be prayed in the evening at 7:00 p.m. as a type of Evening Prayer.

**The Easter Triduum continues Holy Saturday evening at eight o’clock.** The service begins outside the church with the Blessing of the New Fire and the Easter Candle. As we process into the church, the candles of the congregation will be lit from the Easter Candle. When all are in the church with lit candles, the Easter Proclamation will be sung, and we will read from the Scriptures of the major events which bring us to this evening. Finally, the Alleluia will be sung and the lights turned on, and the beautifully decorated church will be a worthy place for the Easter Gospel to be proclaimed. After the homily, we will baptize our Elect and then confirm both them and the Candidates for Full Communion. Then we continue in celebration of the Easter Eucharist. There will be a reception following the Easter Vigil in the parish hall to share fellowship with our newly received parishioners.

**The Sacred Triduum will continue Easter Sunday** with the celebration of the Eucharist Sunday morning at seven, nine and eleven o’clock here, and at nine o’clock in the mission chapel. **The Sacred Triduum comes to its conclusion with Evening Prayer in the Adoration Chapel at six o’clock in the evening. There will be no evening Eucharist on Easter Sunday.** Following Evening Prayer, Perpetual Adoration will resume.

**I think it is important to call to everyone’s attention the idea of sacred silence.** The Church Fathers such as St. Augustine, St. Ambrose, and other early Christian writers speak of the Triduum as a time when the whole world quietly mourns the death of the Savior and awaits the Resurrection. For this reason, once the Triduum begins Holy Thursday evening, no other services or sacraments are scheduled in the main church other than Stations of the Cross on Good Friday. **The other Sacraments and sacramentals such as Communion to the Sick, Reconciliation, and Anointing of the Sick are usually only celebrated during the Triduum in emergencies – if a person is near death.**

It is good that we try, in the midst of our activity, to stay as recollected as we can, and remember in prayer, when we may have a quiet moment to ourselves, those who are



on the Triduum Journey with us, especially our **Elect and Candidates for Full Communion.** If you can, it would be nice to get cards for those whose names you received at the beginning of Lent to pray for. Individual photographs of our Elect are in the Church foyer so you can associate names and faces.



This Lent has been a good journey, and I feel blessed for having made it with you. Thanks for your prayerful support, both personally and for the parish. Thanks also to Fr. Santucci for our Mission. Next Sunday we begin the 50 days of Easter which will culminate with the celebration of Pentecost, the birthday of the Church, our shared birthday. It is always good to journey together, not only in Lent, but throughout the year. Love,

### Health Care Advance Directives

In Proverbs we are reminded that “A simple man believes anything, but a prudent man gives thought to his steps.” (14:15). In light of this wisdom, we can consider how best to plan for our future health care needs.

April 16<sup>th</sup> is National Health Care Decision Day. Now is the time to decide on a Health Care Advanced Directive. A Health Care Advanced Directive is a document in which you give instructions about your health care if in the future you cannot speak for yourself. You name someone to have power to make health care decisions for you. You also give instructions about the kind of health care you do or do not want.

An Advanced Directive is different than a Living Will. A Living Will is limited to terminal illness. An Advanced Directive is used if you cannot make or communicate decisions because of temporary or permanent illness or injury. In the directive you state your wishes about any aspect of your health care including decisions about life-sustaining treatment and choose a person to make and communicate these decisions for you.

By appointing someone to convey your wishes and decision, your treatment will be based on how you want your health care to be. If there is not someone appointed, physicians and institutions or even a court appointed guardian may be making the decisions.

An advanced directive can also relieve family stress. Since your wishes were made known in advance, you help family and friends that might struggle to make good choices in a difficult time.

Before making an advance directive ask yourself the following questions’

- What are my goals for medical treatment? (*What do you want the treatment to accomplish? Quality of life versus prolonging life issues.*)
- Who should be my agent? (*Choose only one person to avoid disagreements. It should be someone that you trust.*)
- How specific should I be? (*Put in writing any specific wishes or preferences. Also discuss this with your agent and health care providers.*)
- How can I make sure that health care providers will follow my advanced directives? (*Speak with your physician and other health care workers ahead of time to make sure they have no objections. If there are objections, work them out or change physicians.*)

You do not need a lawyer to make an advanced directive. Your doctor or hospital should have forms available. The parish nurse has a wonderful document called “Five Wishes”. Call her for questions or to get a form. Once you sign a Health Care Advanced Directive, be sure to give a copy to your doctor and to your agent, close relatives and anyone else who may be involved in your care. —Mrs. Stephanie Gaudin, Parish Nurse; 225.665.5359; [www.nurse@icc-msh.org](mailto:www.nurse@icc-msh.org).

Stump the Deacon!

What should I do with the palms that I received last year on Palm Sunday? How to I dispose of them?

Because these palms were blessed by a priest on Palm Sunday, they become a “sacramental” (an object that is meant to draw us closer to the celebration of the seven sacraments). Since they are blessed, they should not be thrown away in the trash can. That would be sacrilegious. The law of the Church states that sacred items that are blessed “are to be treated reverently” (*Code of Canon Law*, #1171). Throwing them into the trash ignores their sacredness and treats them like any other object that we no longer care about.

The proper way of disposing of these palms is to return them to nature by either burying them or burning them and spreading the ashes outside, maybe in a flower bed. This type of disposal honors their sacred purpose. If you cannot bury them or burn them, you can drop them off at the parish office of us to take care of.

The Divine Mercy Novena begins here at ICC on Good Friday, April 19, 2019 at 5 p.m. in the Adoration Chapel. Everyone is invited and encouraged to attend. We will continue the novena every evening leading up to the **Feast of Divine Mercy on Sunday, April 28.**



If you've been following Pope Francis, you no doubt are aware of his strong emphasis on mercy since becoming pope. During one of his homilies, Pope Francis said, "it is not easy to entrust oneself to God's mercy because it is an abyss beyond our comprehension. But we must!" This reflects directly on the words of Christ regarding his abyss of mercy which he gave to Faustina saying, "**The greater the misery of a soul, the greater its right to My mercy; [urge] all souls to trust in the unfathomable abyss of My mercy because I want to save them all. On the cross, the fountain of My mercy was wide opened by the lance for all souls—no one have I excluded!**" (Notebook III item 1182).

As Pope Francis says God's mercy is indeed an abyss beyond our understanding, and it is through God's unfathomable mercy that Pope Francis is trying to reach souls. Pope Francis said, "I see the church as a field hospital after battle. It is useless to ask a seriously injured person if he has high cholesterol and about the level of his blood sugars! You have to heal his wounds, then we can talk about everything else." Mercy is, after all, about meeting a person where they are – wounds and all, just as Christ meets us where we are at.
