

### **Where do my Fruitful Harvest dollars go?**

The money raised by Fruitful Harvest goes to a variety of programs designated to help members within our Diocese and in the Universal Church. More specifically, they go to:

- **Priest and Retired Priest's Benefits**
- **Parish and other programs in our Diocese, for example, Newman Centers at Ball State, Purdue and Wabash**
- **National Collections (see last question for list)**
- **National Organization Donations, for example, the Archdiocese for the Military Services**
- **Direct Overseas Assistance**
- **Diocesan Office benefitting parishes and vocations**
- **All offices and their staff in the Bishop's Office**

All employees in the Bishop's Office are paid by Fruitful Harvest dollars, with the exception of the Office of Communications. The Office of Communications, which produces the *Catholic Moment* newspaper, is paid and supported by subscriptions and advertising.

### **Why should I give to Fruitful Harvest? Shouldn't I focus on giving to my parish?**

The Catholic Church is a Tripartite Church made up of the Parish, the Local Church, and the Universal Church. Parishes, under the guidance of the Pastor, are funded by the weekly collection made every Sunday. The Local Church – or Diocese – is under the guidance of the Bishop and used to be funded by a tax ("cathedraticum") on the money raised for the Parishes, which was given to the Parish with the intent that it was going to stay within the Parish. The Universal Church, which is under the guidance of the Holy Father Pope Francis, receives its funding from the Local Church.

In 1983, it was realized that this method of taking "old money" from the Parishes in order to fund the Local and Universal Churches was strangling our Diocese. A year later, the first Fruitful Harvest Campaign was launched as a better way of funding the Local and Universal Churches. This method for raising "new money" for the Diocese has proved effective and lets money raised by the Parish stay within the Parish. As Catholics, we are not Congregationalists, we have a duty to provide for members of our Diocese and the worldwide Church. Fruitful Harvest allows us to do this.

### **How is a Parish's Fruitful Harvest goal calculated?**

A Parish's goal is determined by its size and offertory income relative to the entire Local Church. The Parish goal is determined by two criteria: 1) the number of families as a percentage of the total number of families in the Local Church, and 2) the Parish offertory income as a percentage of the total offertory income of the Local Church. The two numbers are then applied in relation to the overall campaign goal, added, and divided by two to arrive at the Parish goal for a particular campaign.

### **What does it mean when a Parish "dovetails"?**

A "dovetail" Parish is one that has received permission to conduct a Parish stewardship fundraising campaign concurrently with Fruitful Harvest. The Parish drive is generally for capital needs associated with building construction or major debt reduction. To avoid the confusion and complexity of conducting two separate, simultaneous fundraising campaigns, the Parish capital stewardship fundraising campaign is "dovetailed" into Fruitful Harvest. When a Parish is granted "dovetail" status, it guarantees its full Fruitful Harvest goal and receives no rebate, but 100% of the overage is returned to the Parish quarterly as soon as the Parish goal has been reached.

### **What was done with the overage money returned to the Parish from the previous Fruitful Harvest Campaign?**

The Fruitful Harvest “dovetail” is the funding mechanism to retire debt from the capital improvements we all enjoy as a parish community at St. Alphonsus Liguori. The Parish has quarterly mortgage payments of approximately \$35,000 from recent renovations to Weitzel Hall, Parish Hall and the Parish Office Building. Dating back to previous campaigns, “dovetail” funds were used for major repairs, mandatory infrastructure improvements and other building projects.

### **What will be done with the overage money returned to the Parish from Fruitful Harvest 2018?**

Parish Leadership engaged an architect to assist with the planning and design of a new Activity Center to be located directly north of the church. The concept drawing shows one potential floor plan that gives planning efforts a place to start when visioning future needs. It is expected that funds from Fruitful Harvest 2016, 2018 and 2020 will provide the funding necessary to embark on this capital project. The Parish must have 70% of the project cost in the bank before we move from concept to construction documents. It’s anticipated the facility could offer features such as a basketball/volleyball court for recreation, intramural activities and possibly CYO league practices in addition to space for multipurpose group exercise classes. This Activity Center’s primary function would be to meet the growing needs of our Parish ministries and Parish sponsored events. Conceptually, the Activity Center could also be used to host community events and meetings as the wider community continues to grow.

### **Why is St. Alphonsus Liguori Parish not considering building a school?**

Under 2002 guidelines issued by the Indiana State Board of Education, we do not have enough acreage available to build a school.

A financial accounting for the Diocese is published each fall as an insert in the *Catholic Moment* and is mailed to every Catholic household in Northcentral Indiana. ### **Why does my Parish have so many second collections? I thought Fruitful Harvest was supposed to take care of all the special collections.**

Seven special collections are funded through Fruitful Harvest: Indian and Black Missions, Holy Land, Peter’s Pence, Latin America Cooperative, Catholic University, the Catholic Communications Campaign, and Home Missions. Several others are mandated which cannot be funded through Fruitful Harvest: Religious Retirement Fund, Propagation of the Faith, Catholic Overseas Relief, World Mission Sunday, and the Campaign for Human Development.
