BELIEVING IN JESUS CHRIST

Throughout the Easter season, all three of the Sunday readings are taken from the New Testament—the Christian scriptures. Together they explore what it means to believe in Jesus as the Christ, the One who fulfilled the prophecies of the Jewish scriptures.

Today's selections refer to our human weakness, yet they emphasize the forgiveness and peace that are available to those who put their faith in "Jesus Christ the righteous one" (1 John 2:2). In the Acts of the Apostles Peter invites everyone to "repent, therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be wiped away" (Acts 3:19). The First Letter of John calls Jesus Christ "expiation for our sins" (1 John 2:2). Finally, in the Gospel Jesus greets the disciples with "Peace" and urges them to preach "repentance, for the forgiveness of sins" (Luke 24:47).



My Dear people of God,

Easter greetings and best wishes! The Lord is risen, Alleluia Alleluia.

As we continue to celebrate the gift of the resurrection of our Lord and savior Jesus Christ, the gospel reading today is an invitation to us to reflect and focus on the reality of bodily resurrection. In our profession of faith (the Apostles Creed) we profess belief in “*..the resurrection of body and in life everlasting*”. Indeed, the bodily resurrection of Jesus is the crowning this truth of our faith.



The primary focus of the gospel today is to show that the risen Jesus is the same person that the apostles had known prior to the crucifixion. Furthermore and probably more importantly, the message of the gospel is to show that the same person who suffered the brutal journey of the cross has emerged victorious. It is however, evidently clear that the resurrection is merely a return to earthly life. Jesus has risen to a new life beyond the former life.

The disciples having lived with and witnessed the power of Jesus were delighted by their relationship with Him. The miracles He performed, the powerful teachings He gave and above all the promise of eternal life with God warmed their hearts. Although He frequently told them about the eventuality of His suffering and death, they couldn't reconcile it with what they saw, experienced and heard from Him. How can one so powerful and favored by God, ever suffer, they must have wondered. Because of this, the Way of the Cross was a devastating experience for them.

The shock caused by His brutal suffering and death was such that, the disciples were left with little to trust and believe in the resurrection. It is therefore up to Jesus to yet again teach and convince them that He is alive. That, there is life after death. That the suffering He underwent was only a means to a new life. This then prepared the apostles and indeed all the disciples of Jesus for their own suffering and death. Having seen and witnessed both the suffering/death and resurrection of Jesus, they were then convinced that the words He had spoken to them before were true: “**...whoever lives and believes in me will never die**” (John 11:26).

The evangelist Billy Graham who recently concluded his earthly journey, once said; “*..if ever you hear anybody say that Billy Graham has died or that Billy Graham's life has ended, do not believe them, I believe in God and in Jesus Christ His Son, therefore I will never die*”. That was truly a statement of faith. In fact, that statement is in line with the Preface I For the Dead (used at Catholic funeral Masses) that states that “*Indeed for your faithful, Lord, life is changed and not ended and when this earthly dwelling turns to dust, an eternal dwelling is made ready for them in heaven.*”

The core message of this third Sunday of Easter therefore is that our bodies will share in the triumph of the resurrection. All the resurrection accounts stress that Jesus rose with His body, the tomb is empty, the apostles touched Him, He ate and walked with them. All these appearances and manifestations convey the message that, He is the same person, yet somehow changed and therefore not immediately recognizable. The resurrected body is not subject to the human limitations of time and space. The resurrection therefore is not merely a return to earthly life (as in the case of Lazarus) but to a new life that is beyond death (eternal life).

The bodily resurrection of Jesus opened the way for our own bodily resurrection. This is the profound basis for the Catholic attitude towards the human body. An attitude that pays due regard to the body because it is destined for eternal life. We therefore take care of the bodies of the hungry, the sick and most importantly those of the dead because we know they are destined to share in the resurrection of Jesus.

May the joy and peace of the risen Lord fill our hearts and minds. And may the good news of the bodily resurrection of Jesus be our strength and hope.

**CATHOLIC CHARITIES OF THE
DIOCESE OF HOUMA-THIBODAUX**

We are one human family whatever our national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences. Our love for our sisters and brothers demand that we promote peace in a world surrounded by violence and conflict.

All three scriptures today speak about “repentance and the forgiveness of sins.” The risen Jesus proclaims forgiveness, renewal, and new life. The attitude of Christians is not of revenge and violence, but of reconciliation and forgiveness.

The early church community could have reacted to the killing of Jesus, by trying to get revenge or by trying to destroy those who killed Jesus or throwing out those who denied or betrayed Jesus. They were initially afraid of the authorities; however, Jesus came saying “Peace be with you.” Jesus came giving the power to forgive. Instead of fear, revenge and violence, the early community seems to have adopted an attitude of forgiveness and reconciliation, even toward those who had been so hostile to Jesus and his teaching and even toward those who persecuted the early Christian community.

John writes that Jesus “is expiation for our sins, and not, for our sins only but for those of the whole world.” In the gospel, Jesus says that this repentance and forgiveness are called to forgive other people.

In what way we are also called to apply this attitude of mercy and forgiveness to social sin?

We are not called to be passive and do nothing in the face of injustice.

We are called to speak up strongly and act boldly.

We are called to an active and loving nonviolence.

How does this spirit of forgiveness influence our action for justice?
