## From Father's Desk

My Dear Parish,

There's something about God commanding us to love and to hate which strikes us as odd. Why is that?

For one thing can you really command someone to love or to hate? Isn't the nature of love, for instance, that it is freely given, and so something that cannot be compelled or coerced by external force? The same goes for hatred. Isn't it right that I wouldn't hate anything unless I already had to of necessity, so that God's compelling me to hate something would seem redundant?

Do we really need God to tell us whom and how to love? Do we really believe in a God that would command us to hate? And moreover isn't it a contradiction for Jesus to command us to love one another and also to command us to hate one another? How do we make sense of all this?

Yet this Sunday we hear Jesus say, "If anyone comes to me without hating his father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple" (Luke 14:26).

Love and hatred are passions. One of the main consequences of the original sin of our first parents was that man lost the ability to have proper dominion easily over his passions. While he may think that his love for God, himself and his neighbor are rightly ordered, it is not as it seems. Man has to struggle to love the way he ought. It's for this reason that God comes to man's help with the aid of his commandments of how and whom to love. When we hear it clearly given by God himself that we are to love him first and above all things and only then our neighbor as ourselves we hear a commandment that keeps us from giving free reign to our unruly passions. God's commandments save us.

Turning to Jesus, his unequivocal word that no love may precede our love for God saves us from the unruliness of our passions. The good news is that loving God whole-heartedly is what gives us the ability to love others perfectly.

There's no need to fear any contradiction in God—that he commands us to love only to then command us to hate. Rather, he rightly orders our ability to love so we and all whom we love can know the salvation he has won for us.
