WELCOME to this AMAZING Church where we hear God's Word and feast at this Table for spiritual comfort where **YOU're LOVED** without measure!

My sisters and brothers; enduring members of this Church and new-found-Friends of Christ the Good Shepherd, WELCOME! You and are embracing our Lenten journey of fasting, prayer, and alms eqqqgiving; so as to be CLEANSED or MADE ANEW in God's Peace and Love.

We are temples of the Holy Spirit. Christ cleanses the physical temple in Jerusalem of all that is not leading people to God. We ourselves must be cleansed of all that does not lead us to God.

The first reading, from the Book of Exodus, it says KNOWING and STRIVING, to live the Commandments is one way of being cleansed for God's Peace and Love. We cannot achieve our own salvation, but you and I can strive to cooperate with what God is asking of us; and has asked of His People throughout the ages, to be slow to anger, abounding in compassion, and full of great love..

The Book of Exodus makes it clear that God wants His People for Himself and is jealous in His love for us. This is a good jealousy that leads us to salvation and assures us that God is always there striving to love us and draw us to Himself.

Lent is a wonderful time to reflect on our own responses to God's Peace and Love.

Those around Him did not understand until after the Resurrection.
Jesus spoke to His followers and to others with clarity, even when they could not yet understand what He was saying.
Do we listen to the Lord?
Can we believe His words?

Lent prepares us to celebrate the death and resurrection of the Lord—when we have faith.

In our remaining days, our Lenten journey of fasting, prayer, and alms giving, let's collectively be CLEANSED or MADE ANEW in God's Peace and Love.
