**FROM THE PASTORS DESK**

**"Catching Your Breath"**

Dear Brothers and Sisters of St. Anthony's,

Once again, I slipped and slid over here to my office this morning to begin to write my article. I hope you enjoy reading these little reflections of mine as much as I like writing them. Even though my secretary is always badgering me to get my article to her so we can get it to the bulletin company, once I get started I really get into them.

Today, we begin the short stretch of what the Church calls "Ordinary Time", as distinct from the other seasons in the Church that have a specific goal or end. Whereas, Advent leads us to Christmas and Lent to Easter, "Ordinary Time" doesn't lead us to any big liturgical celebration. That's one of the big reasons I like ordinary time. I call it the short stretch because Lent will be beginning five weeks from now. The longer stretch of Ordinary Time happens in the summertime. That's really when you can get into the whole thing.

The main reason that I like this time we call "ordinary" is because you get a chance to "walk with Jesus." I remember as a child being fascinated with the life of Jesus of Nazareth. I hardly knew that this grace or blessing would dominate my entire life. But it has!!! From the first moment I heard of a person named Jesus who died on the cross to save us and rose gloriously from the dead, I was hooked. Call it what you want; a boyhood fascination that many thought I would get over or some other obsession that would eventually fade in time. All these certainly happen during any relationship with the Divine but for some reason not with me. I am still enamored by and fascinated with the person of Jesus.

One of the greatest blessings of my life happened years ago when I decided to take my vacation time and make a 30-day retreat. One of the masters of the spiritual life whose name is Ignatius Loyola devised a retreat that would enable the retreatant to delve deeply, as one could, into the life of our dear Lord. Through the gift of the imagination, which is a beautiful cognitive gift, the gospels can come alive in ways that surpass our expectation. Ordinary time in the Church is meant to open us up to the gospel being lived out in our own lives. This is what St. John of the Cross meant by telling the Christian, working towards growing in holiness, that we are called to be "Living Gospels."

St. Francis of Assisi, whom the whole world loves, had this in mind when he set out to rediscover and pray in the places that our dear Lord lived and undertook His ministry. Even now, when you visit the Holy Land, the Franciscans are the custodians of the holy sites. They have been there for years and we certainly thank God for their presence. The Holy Land continues to be a place of intense turmoil and shifting landscape. The Friars are a constant and familiar presence when you visit the holy places.

So, enjoy this brief time we call "ordinary," there is really nothing ordinary about it when you retrace the footsteps of the Man from Nazareth and open yourself to the great power of His Love.


Parents are encouraged to attend the next two "Taming Technology" sessions on January 21st and 28th. Come and discover how technology impacts faith and family life.

## **THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME** **JANUARY 21ST, 2018**

### **First Reading: Jonah 3:1-5, 10**

Jonah set out for Nineveh as God asked and told the people that their city would be destroyed in forty days. The people believed him and repented from their evil ways. God did not destroy their city, showing his mercy for those who see the evil of their ways and correct it.

### **Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 7:29-31**

Paul advises the Corinthians that their world is changing, so they should not take their daily trials too seriously. We should remember that the problems of everyday living will not last forever, but the eternal life God promises us will.

### **Gospel: Mark 1:14-20**

Jesus observes Simon and Andrew where they are fishing and tells them to come with him and become "fishers of men." They abandon their nets without hesitation to follow him. Next he calls James and his brother John, who also leave what they are doing and follow him without question.
