FROM THE PASTORS DESK

The Beauty of Tradition

Dear Brothers and Sisters of St. Anthony's,

Last Sunday I was sorry to miss the breakfast the Knights of Columbus hosted at our parish. The Knights have a long tradition, beginning with Fr. Michael McGiveny, of standing fast for parishes and for the protection of the clergy. One of the blackest marks on the history of the United States of America was the persecution of the Roman Catholic Church. Catholics, and especially Irish Catholics, were persecuted and could not find decent work in the New World. Thus, the infamous sign: "Irish Need Not Apply", were posted in many places of work. Fr. McGiveny saw the plight of many Irish and started the Knights of Columbus for the protection of the priests and bishops sent to minister to the people in the New World. We pray that this holy priest is canonized soon for the tremendous work he performed.

The breakfast is first class and I was sorry to miss it, but I had another obligation and that was to teach the RCIA. The topic of the day was "Tradition." RCIA stands for "Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults." Deacon Ed and Nora Baker do an outstanding job bringing those who are interested in the Catholic Faith into a deeper knowledge and understanding of the Catholic Christian message of Jesus. I was so honored to teach that morning and to speak about the value and beauty of tradition.

There are many traditions that people throughout the world hold as "sacred", from Notre Dame football to the Jewish people's recalling of Passover, to the anamnesis which we hear at the celebration of the liturgy each Sunday at Church. This "Calling to mind" the events of the past are important to our lives as we journey through this life. Remembering a wise historian statement that is good to recall: to forget the past is to repeat its mistakes. So, let's not condemn ourselves to repeating the past mishaps by forgetting our history.

One practical way that I have found to keep some of the sense of tradition in our church here at St. Anthony's is to introduce some of the Latin Mass parts at our Choir Mass. Not at all the Masses, but at least at the Mass where the traditional choir sings. In the pews here at St. Anthony's you will find a helpful card, which will enable you to participate (*Missa Jubilate Deo*).

The card comes with the instruction from 1974 designating the *Missa Jubilate Deo* as a personal gift from Pope Paul the sixth, who in a few weeks will be canonized a Saint. It reads in part: "This minimum repertoire of Gregorian chant has been prepared....to make it easier for Christians to achieve unity and spiritual harmony with their brother and with the living traditions of the past. Hence it is that those who are trying to improve the quality of singing cannot refuse to Gregorian chant the place which is due to it....And this becomes more imperative as we approach the Holy Year during which the faithful of different languages, nations and origins, will find themselves side by side for the common celebrating of the Lord."

TWENTY-NINTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: OCTOBER 21ST

First Reading: Isaiah 53:10-11

Isaiah speaks of how the Servant of God will have to give his life up for the sins of other people. Because of this suffering the Servant will receive eternal life for himself and all the people whose sins are forgiven because of him.

Second Reading: Hebrews 4:14-16

Jesus is considered to be the new high priest and mediator between God and his people. Fortunately, Jesus has experienced the same temptations as other people, and so he has more tolerance of our weaknesses.

Gospel: Mark 10:35-45

Two of the disciples ask Jesus that they be allowed to sit at his right and left side when he comes into his glory. Jesus explains that they should not be concerned with their position. Instead they should concern themselves with serving others just as Jesus was planning to serve many in giving his own life for their sins.
