Reach out and touch someone

Few things can stir the soul like the sensation of touch. We are sensate beings who from our birth must be touched. An infant who is deprived of touch will quickly cease to thrive. We continue to need this touch as adults. Studies have shown that hugs increase our sense of well-being, reduces stress, and can even bring healing. Our Lord brings us this healing touch.

This touch is what our Lord provides, not once but twice in the same Gospel reading from Mark. First, as he sets foot on this side of the Sea of Galilee, Jairus, a Synagogue leader, catches our Lord's attention to ask Him to come, lay His hands on his daughter and heal her. She is so sick, she is nearly dead. In fact, by the time Jesus arrives, she is already dead.

As He follows Jairus to the house, a woman with an illness reaches out and touches His cloak. How she hungered for Him to touch her, to heal her, yet she reaches out, willing to satisfy herself with the feel of the hem of His cloak. She is healed, she knows within herself that the illness has left her body. She is not the only one who knows it, Jesus also felt the “power leave Him” and knew instantly what had happened. He stops cold and begins searching for the one who had touched Him. This delay must have ripped Jairus' heart out; yet to the woman who had been healed, this was an opportunity to be touched, and to be reminded of her humanity.

The Lord also reaches out to us, wanting to touch us personally. We are not a number in the church, we are loved by God. When we receive the Eucharist, Jesus physically touches us. The Eucharist is truly the body and blood of Christ. Jesus comes to us in the Eucharist and touches us, providing healing to our souls. Just as our Lord healed through the touch of His hands, He heals us now through His touch in the Eucharist.
