A message from Fr. Vieira.....

Lord, teach us to pray

The walk of faith to which each Christian is called, indeed, each human is called is a relationship with a living God. We are not on this earth for a dry contract with an impartial being, but a living covenant that was sealed with the Blood of Jesus on the cross with a loving Father. Jesus had been spending time in prayer, and as the disciples watched, their hearts yearned for the same relationship with the Father that they saw in Jesus. A relationship of trust, love, and confidence. In the book of Genesis Abraham had an encounter with the living God and took the opportunity to intercede on behalf of Sodom and Gomorrah. Imagine trying drive a bargain with the creator of the universe. We can come to the Father and intercede on behalf of the whole world. Do we dare to do so? God is waiting for us to bring our needs to Him.

As one considers the Lord’s prayer, we are reminded that first, God is our Father. This is a personal relationship that allows us to bring Him our most personal needs. We need never shy away from the “little” requests. The Father is just as interested in our concerns about what decisions we make concerning dinner as He is in our prayer for the conversion of sinners. Each of us, called to the Church through the waters of baptism are to have such an intimate bond with the Father that we can live each moment in an attitude of prayer, sharing each moment of our lives with God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. Let us live lives that are enlivened with the reminder, if you seek, you will find, if you knock the door will be opened, and if ask, you will receive.
