A message from Fr. Vieira.....

In today's second reading from Hebrews (12:5-7, 11-13), we hear: "My son, do not disdain the discipline of the Lord or lose heart when reproved by him; for whom the Lord loves, he disciplines; he scourges every son he acknowledges." (And so....) Endure your trials as "discipline" God treats you as sons. For what "son" is there whom his father does not discipline?

Was there strong discipline in your home when you were a child? It may sound like cruelty by today's lenient standards, but my dad and mom had a leather strap in the basement of our home. And though I wish that it could be said that "Deacon Tom has all the makings of a saint", the truth is, I 'met' the strap more than once as I was growing up. In spite of my loud complaining or wailing protests, there were times when discipline was the key and essential element in my life that my parents felt was necessary to ultimate growth and maturity.

You have perhaps heard the story of St. Teresa of Avila who was complaining to God: "Oh, my Lord!" she exclaimed, with her usual loving familiarity, "when wilt Thou cease from scattering obstacles in our path?" "Do not complain, daughter," the Divine Master answered, "for it is ever thus that I treat My friends." "Ah, Lord, it is also on that account that Thou hast so few!" was her reply.

Whatever our age, we don't like, welcome, or seek correction. But if St. Paul the Apostle, or St. Teresa or even you, while doing good things, experience obstacles or correction... remember today's reading from Hebrews. "For whom the Lord loves, he reproves." Now smile: Jesus Loves You!
