# Suffering and service

During Ordinary time, the Lectionary readings invite us to reflect on stories and teachings from Jesus' everyday ministry. Today's readings ask the believing community and RCIA participants to think about the human condition and a disciple's response.

In the gospel, Mark concludes Jesus' first day of ministry: Jesus heals Simon's mother-in-law, Jesus ministers to the whole town, and his disciple forget why he came:

**Simon's mother-in-law:** On arriving, Jesus and the disciples find her too sick to perform the traditional demands of first-century hospitality. Jesus' touch heals her. As proof that she is healed, she fulfills her obligation of hospitality by "serving them." The Greek verb διακονέω (dee-ah-koh-NEH-oh) means "to serve" or "to wait on." Simon's mother-in-law embodies ideal disciples as someone *in service to others*—a point that James and John miss (see Mk 10:43).

All who were ill or possessed: As the Baptizer foretold in Mk 1:7-8, Jesus comes with power and authority preaching and healing. Jesus' power/authority to heal breaks evil's hold on this world and displaces demons, which makes room for God's kingdom. The Greek verb  $\theta$ εραπεύω (theh-rah-PYOO-oh), root of the English word "therapy," means "to serve" or "to heal." Its use here implies that Jesus did not simply heal, but spent time ministering to each person.

**Everyone wants you:** The reason that Jesus came was to preach God's kingdom (Mk 1:14-15). Jesus' healings were just a small part of his ministry. Unfortunately, Peter, Andrew, James, and John (and everyone else) want to promote Jesus' powerful acts above his message of salvation. Jesus has to remind them why he came--to tell everyone that the time is fulfilled, God is near, and to change their hearts and minds.

Today's readings display how far we have progressed in our understanding of suffering. The believing community and RCIA participants find Job searching for a reason and encounter Jesus proclaiming an answer in words and actions. Job experiences God as a distant power and wisdom; Simon's mother-in-law and Capernaum's suffering people experience Jesus' physical touch and personal attention. Through his death and resurrection, he has transformed the meaning of suffering. As disciples, Jesus calls us to continue his individual *service* and *ministry* to everyone. Where do we drive out today's demons? How do we heal those who suffer? How do we serve to make others whole?

#### **BEGINNING MY LENTEN PATTERNS**

"Insanity is defined as doing the same thing over, and over again, expecting different results."

This saying, commonly used in 12 Step programs (i.e. Alcoholic Anonymous Recovery Program), reveals a real wisdom. It can be a good beginning reflection as we examine the choices we will make in the days ahead. It is very simple. Our Lord is calling us to a "change of heart." And, we know from experience, that nothing will change, unless we change our patterns. To expect different results is insanity.

So, what needs changing? We start to come to know that by <u>asking for help</u>. "Lord, help me to know what needs changing." It is often said, "Be careful about what you ask for." This is one of those requests that God must surely want to answer.

Then, we have to <u>listen</u>. With a little bit of reflection, most of us will just begin to "name" things that make up our ordinary habits and ways of being who we are, that we aren't very proud of. Things we do and things we never get around to doing. We can "feel" the call to change our attitudes, our self-absorption, or our way of interacting with others. Perhaps a spouse, a loved one, a friend, a family member, a co-worker has told me something about myself that gets in the way of communication, that makes relating to them difficult. Maybe I don't take God very seriously. I go to Church on Sunday, and contribute my share, but I don't really take time to deal with my relationship with God. Perhaps I've let my mind and fantasy get cluttered with escapist litter. I might begin to name a number of self-indulgent habits. I may realize I rarely, if ever, hear the cry of the poor, and can't remember when I've answered that cry. It could be that dishonesty on all kinds of levels has become a way of life. One of the roadblocks in my relationship with God and others may be deep wounds or resentments from the past, things I continue to hold against others or myself.

You are always merciful! Please wipe away my sins.

Wash me clean from all of my sin and guilt. - Psalm 51
