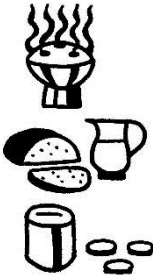


From the Pastor's Desk:

Jesus said to His disciples: "take care not to perform righteous deeds in order that people may see them; otherwise, you will have no recompense from your heavenly Father."

-St. Matthew

This Wednesday is Ash Wednesday! I know it is hard to believe as it seems that we just finished celebrating the great season of Christmas. (*In fact, as I write this, I still need to take down my nativity scene in the living room of the rectory!) The season of Lent is a time that most of us do not look forward to, spiritually speaking. Maybe that is why it seems to sneak up on us each year.



So, we are called to the three-fold Lenten mission of intensifying our "prayers", "fasting" and "almsgiving". No doubt, most of you that are reading this column are already doing these spiritual things in some form or another. You are attending Mass, the perfect prayer. You maybe have said no to a desert or a second glass of wine at a restaurant. You contribute to the local church or a charity as the need arises.

My definition of Lent is a "world-wide retreat" of the Universal Church. A retreat is a time where we set aside our concerns of the world and to be more concerned with the world to come. Unfortunately, we still need to hold our day jobs and cannot spend the entire 40 days in prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Yet, we can take some of our personal time and to make it a time of prayer for the Lord.

Traditionally, Lent is focusing on three-fold mission of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. I have taught enough religion classes that students will automatically ask the point or the purpose of fasting. "How does my not eating food help those who have no food to eat?" The answer is simple. Fasting does not help physically, those who are hungry. But our fasting can help us spiritually, so that we can respond physically. For when we fast, when we feel hunger. We feel what so many people around the world feel on a daily basis. When we feel their pain, then we are more inclined to help them through our almsgiving.

Perhaps this Lent, rather than saying you are skipping desserts, drinking less soda pop and saying some additional prayers; maybe consider some ideas outside the usual Lenten box.

Prayer: In addition to coming to Mass each week as a family, how about those who are "retired" or working out of their homes to come to at least one daily Mass a week? How about this Lent coming to at least one or two Stations of the Cross during the Lenten season? How about celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation after all these months/years and memorizing the Act of Contrition prayer?

Fasting: No doubt we are called to fast and abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Fridays during Lent as the stomach can sometimes get the attention of our soul.

How about this Lent eating out less (or not at all), and using the monies to give to the needs of the poor or the local church? How about simply using the stock-pile of canned goods in our kitchen or frozen foods in our freezer during this season and to see how little groceries you could buy for the next 40 days? How about simply saying "No" to all processed sugars for the next 40 days? Not only would this last request be penitential, but also extremely healthy at any age.

Almsgiving: It certainly is a noble act of penance to be more generous monetarily to the needs of local charities and the church. But, how about giving your house a true "house cleaning"? How many clothes, books, nick-knacks, furniture have been accumulating and have not been used in years or even decades? Think how much better our house would look and how good we would feel if those items were cleaned out of our rooms and closets.

Each year I look forward to Lent as a personal challenge to clean up my spiritual life. May we all pray that the Lent of 2015 might be the best Lent ever. God bless you!

**HOLY ROSARY WORSHIP COMMITTEE
MINUTES - JANUARY 26, 2015**

The Worship Committee was called to order at 6:30 P.M. by chairman Kathy Neve. Father led in an opening prayer and the minutes of November 10th meeting were read and approved. Father began with some opening comments as he thanked the Worship Committee for all of their hard work during the Christmas season in both setting up and taking down. There was much positive feed-back from the parishers regarding the decorations. Father shared a little bit of enrichment stating that Georgetown University recently completed a study that indicated 63% of Catholics decide where they are going to Mass based largely on the quality of the sermon that the priest gives on Sunday. Pope Francis recently said that the mark of a good homily is three-fold. 1.) It must be short 2.) It must be relevant 3.) It must bring the scriptures to life.

Old Business:

1.) The choir is being well supported with good rehearsal attendance. The choir will sing during Lent, much of Holy Week and for Confirmation. The Children's Choir will be singing at 10:00 A.M. Easter Mass and for 1st Holy Communion.

2.) The altar servers are doing well and we are consistently having three servers. More servers want to start serving. Father will have one other member of the Worship Committee assist him with training the servers.

3.) Training new and returning Eucharistic ministers will be held with two sessions on Sunday, March 1st and March 8th at 6:30 P.M. Father will give the instruction. All E.M.E's will be required to attend one session. The committee stressed to Father that "proper dress" is necessary as people are becoming very casual in their appearance.

4.) Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament was discussed. It was decided to suspend the Thursday evenings as virtually no one is attending. Instead the parish will have Exposition beginning on First Fridays through the school year with a sign-up to cover the hours. Father will expose the Blessed Sacrament and will conclude with a brief Benediction, @ 3:00 P.M. More details will be forthcoming.

5.) Lector booklets were discussed. Lectors are now requesting these books yet no one had responded to Kathy's e-mail prior to Father's Paul's arrival. A second e-mail will go out. Father requested at least one book in the sacristy for lector's use. It was also decided that after February 15th to go down to one lector at the weekend Masses as opposed to two. Some are coming only to do one short reading when the Deacon is present. Most parishes in the area have only one lector. Many lectors have been looking for substitutes. A future lector training is being considered.

6.) "The Word Among Us" booklets will again be ordered, but a smaller quantity as there have been more ordered than were taken.

7.) Palm Sunday was discussed including palms and environment. Liturgically, we are encouraged to process into the church. A perfect place to gather will be the school gym. The procession will occur at the 5:00 P.M. and the 10:00 A.M. Mass. A simple procession will be held at the 8:00 A.M. Mass in church.

8.) Holy Week and Easter was discussed at length. Times for the services will all remain the same except for the Easter Vigil. That time will be pushed up to 7:00 P.M. to encourage greater attendance. We are anticipating 6-8 converts coming into the Church. Father will stress that this is the most important Mass of the entire Church year throughout Lent!!!!

9.) Stations of the Cross was discussed as well as soup supper to follow along with some optional enrichment for those wishing to stay on Fridays. Father will also have Stations on Wednesday once for the grade school and high school. (Deacon Russ might also help with Stations.)

10.) Ash Wednesday will have three Mass times. Mass will be at 8:30 A.M. 4:30 P.M. and 7:30 P.M. Students from religious education will have class and will attend the two later Masses.

11.) Food Shelf collections has not been stressed but will be again during the Lenten season.

12.) A lengthy discussion was held about re-opening the church as opposed to having it locked most of the time. The churches in the Mankato community are open during the day. It was agreed that it could be open from 8:00 – 5:00 P.M. but with the sacristy remaining locked and the basement secured. Father will look more into this in the week's ahead.

13.) Father asked the committee if they felt the parish would want the mural in the sanctuary cleaned, repaired and restored. The parish has designated money set aside specifically for the project. The committee encouraged talking about this with the Pastoral and Finance Council and the possibility of the work being done in the summer of 2015.

14.) The air conditioning and the temperature in church was discussed. It was felt by a good number on the committee that the air-conditioning does not have to run for several months straight. A de-humidifier is needed for the church social hall. The heat of the south windows was discussed. Years ago, there was metal awnings that reduced the heat. They have been removed and has made sitting in church difficult with sun shining in people's eyes and heating up the church. Father will explore some options and present to the committees if something can be done.

15.) Time and Talent sheets were discussed. They have not been done in the parish for many years. This will be done in the coming weeks.

The meeting concluded after nearly 3 hours. Next meeting will be March 2nd, at 6:30 P.M. in Conference room 1. The meeting closed with prayer.

The 2015 Bishop Lucker Lecture and Diocesan Distinguished Service Award Ceremony will take place Monday, March 9, 2015, 7 p.m. at the Church of St. Catherine in Redwood Falls. Our featured speaker will be Fr. Raymond de Souza. His talk will be on "The Future of Religious Liberty in America." Fr. de Souza was ordained a Catholic priest on July 20, 2002, for the Archdiocese of Kingston, Ontario. He currently serves as chaplain at Newman House, the Roman Catholic chaplaincy at Queen's University. He is the pastor of Sacred Heart of Mary Parish on Wolfe Island where he currently lives. Fr. de Souza teaches at Queen's in the Faculty of Education and the Economics Department. He is a longstanding weekly columnist for the *National Post*, and contributes a weekly column to *The Catholic Register*, Canada's largest Catholic newspaper. He is the editor-in-chief of *Convivium*, a magazine examining the role of faith in our common life. All adult parishioners are invited free of charge. A social time will follow the ceremony and the presentation.

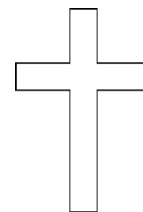

LENTEN RETREAT

During the season of Lent, Ss. 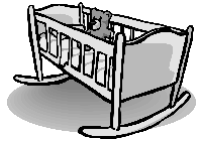
BENEFIT FOR BIRTHRIGHT RAFFLE
