

#### FROM THE DESK of FATHER STEVEN C. ROGERS.....

A few years ago, a middle-aged woman struggling with transitioning out of her youth-filled days of illegal drug abuse, alcoholism, and an excessively wayward lifestyle into the fast approaching twilight years, stopped by my office and wanted to chat. The carefree days of the '60s, '70s, '80s and '90s had caught up with her. Divorced twice, she was angry and weary. She was trapped in bitterness and paranoia. She was unable to break out of her fruitless marriage of nearly thirty years. An emotionally painful life and bad relationships had taken their toll.

She wasn't the woman she desperately struggled to hold on to. That woman she had killed and buried long ago. She wasn't aware then of who she was or who God created her to be. Worse, she was completely disconnected from the person she had become. She didn't recognize herself; she wouldn't recognize herself. That person was someone else's problem, not hers. She wasn't responsible. She hated what she saw in the mirror so she stopped looking. She hated what she thought other people saw in her, so she would lash out to make them turn away. She wanted to be someone else only she didn't like anyone else.

When the drugs and alcohol wore off, she would eat whatever she could find. She ate food well past the expiration date. She ate to change herself; she had eaten herself into a completely different person. For her, being fluffy took on a whole new dimension. When food would not satisfy her insecurity or clear her vision long enough for her to begin to like herself, she turned to prescription drugs, pain killers, antidepressants, anxiety pills, and more alcohol, lots of alcohol. She had convinced herself that it was helping, that it was good for her. Her mission was to convince everyone else that it was working.

When she hit rock bottom, she decided that she needed God in her life, which would somehow make it all better. The only trouble was, her mission included convincing God that her way was the right way, her way was working. She only needed God to help her convince everyone else. They were the problem. God would make it all go away, but she didn't need him to take away the drugs and alcohol; they were his gifts to her. She was still trying to work that out when I met her.

Once she had been kind and generous, but that gave way to wickedness and selfishness, especially after all the years of self-rejection. self-neglect, and her sheer wrongheadedness towards the truth. She had become surly and mean; she straddled mad and sad. Everyone around her straddled her outbursts of mad and sad. Once she thought herself capable of accomplishing many things in her days, but all that had changed and she didn't have the energy to get out of bed, except to binge eat, drink, and abuse drugs and others. After a night of excess, she would pick fights with others. A good day for her would be if she could annihilate someone's happiness, and stomp on their feelings of joy and peace.

She didn't like herself; she disliked other people more. She disliked God. She blamed God. She was angry with God. She wanted to get close to God so she could smack him in the face, and knock him down in size, and take from him the peace and joy he was giving to others. I don't know much, but I do know that's no way to approach one's glory years. This encounter with her was a difficult encounter to say the least. The first words out of her mouth were, "Who are you kidding! You're no better than me. You put your pants on one leg at a time just like me. I don't know why you think you're so holy!" She skipped straight past the hello line, and directly onto the kill train.

I responded, "Let's go back to hello. Hello! It is good that you are here." She twirled and flailed for a moment, "I don't know what you're smoking. And what are you smiling about? What's so funny? Wipe that smile off your face. You don't know me." She was bold. I caught myself starting to laugh, "Well, Ma'am. It's all I own." She wasn't humored. "I don't need nothing! I didn't come here for nothing!" "That's okay. It is good to have all you need. Still, I think God has something to give you though," I replied, still smiling, "that's what you came for, isn't it?" She wanted a fight. She wanted to knock me down, and step on me so she could be one rung higher to eventually reach God for the ultimate kill. People do that to priests. I can't imagine what they would do to a Bishop.

I wasn't afraid of her so I didn't take her verbal abuse personally. I had never met this woman before. I had no history to react to; I had no idea what she was capable of doing. I have heard it said that "your life

flashes before you when you are about to die." My life didn't flash, but her life certainly did. I was pretty sure it wasn't me who was dying. I wasn't the one who was about to kiss their maker goodbye, and not from something someone else would do. She was doing a good job of it all on her own, I thought. Then I remembered what a mentor had said long ago, "Kill them with kindness. Kindness can change a world of trouble."

Suddenly, she charged toward me. She got up in my face, nose-to-nose, and cursed at me. She raised her arm; she made a fist. She had rage in her eyes. Her breath was hot and dry. She smelled of self-loathing and disdain, mixed with Budweiser, Mad Dog 20/20 and a double cheeseburger from Mickey D's. The thought crossed my mind, "She must have eaten off the dollar menu to save money for the booze," but I had to focus on what she was going to do next.

I didn't move. I didn't say a word. I was calm. Something had come over me. It was like I was having an out of body experience. I wouldn't have noticed; it wasn't until she screamed, "I'll wipe that "blankety-blank" smile off your face, you "blankety-blank person/ thing," that I even knew the only thing I owned was still shining through it all. Again, I caught myself starting to laugh, "I'm not God. I think, maybe, you're having a bad day. God wants to help you if you would allow him." She stepped back, lowered her arm and unclenched her fist. "I can get you a glass of water or a cup of coffee? Perhaps, we can talk. You seem to have a lot to say." She glared at me, "Yeah, get me a cup of coffee, really hot, make it boiling hot. I'll throw it in your face. That'll get that 'blankety-blank' smile off your face! 'Blanketyblank' happens! "Well, I wish you wouldn't do that, but I won't stop you. I just want to do what God wants me to do," I replied.

I motioned for her to sit down on the sofa. I sat down next to her, and listened to her as she poured out her life, openly and honestly, raw and uncensored. That bunch of ugly had been bottled up for too long, it had to come out. What God was doing in her was far more interesting to me than what she could ever do to me. God wanted to resolve everything buried deep. While we talked, the veil of madness lifted. I could see the very person she clung to; she was fully present. I could tell she was a kind and generous person who had been overworked and controlled by her runaway emotions and pain. It is quite difficult to see through the wall built of bitterness, anger, and shame. She guarded her fragility and vulnerability. She protected herself from harsh and unkind people by becoming like one of them, by becoming someone other than who God created her to be. She had been unkind to herself.

After we talked for an hour or more, she looked at me with gentle eyes and said, "I would like that cup of coffee now." I smiled, "boiling hot?" We shared a hearty laugh. I went to the kitchen to get her a cup of coffee, but when I returned she was gone. She taught me something important to hold on to that day. She taught me no one cares about you if they can't get close to you, and you don't have to care about them if they keep their distance. God wants us to change that, to break free, to share acts of kindness, joy and peace. God wants us to smile.

A month later, I saw her in the back of the church for Mass. She kept her distance from the people around her. After Mass, she waited in the corner by herself, but as soon as the crowd cleared she approached me. She smiled, gave me a hug, and said, "God knew exactly what I needed. He sent me to you. You listened to me. You did not judge me or run from me. That meant the world to me. You are a very kind person...Father."

An encounter with kindness can change a troubled world, but it takes time for kindness to catch on. The world will change when we all are kind to one another, especially when we are kind those who least expect it, or to those who don't know that kindness happens.

Father Stora C Rege
