

THE 7TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME – SOME MUSINGS

“Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful.”

Day crept reluctantly over the horizon; the anemic sun giving little hope of warmth. The snow was fierce and blowing in the open as if to find a treasure hidden somewhere beneath the earth’s frozen surface. The sidewalks had not been cleared and the cold seemed to permeate the very fibre of one’s being. And suddenly a knock at the door, my son, coming to make sure things were okay with his mother. Ah yes! Easy to love people like that. A phone call from a friend leaves me laughing and joyful. Another person easy to love. But the others are sometimes difficult. Those who speak unkindly of others can be difficult. The ones who take and take and give back little again are difficult to love. Those who hurt us don’t make our lives one bit easy. Yet according to our gospel today we’re asked to love even those with the kind of love that Jesus shows us when we don’t live the life He’s called us to live. At times our willingness to love is like that anemic sun of my morning.


Luke’s account of the Sermon on the Mount, while very different from that of Matthew, still contains the Lord’s Prayer in which we say, “Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.” We want to be forgiven by God but if that’s to happen, we have to forgive others. Asking forgiveness is easy but if we truly want forgiveness we have to forgive. We can find it easy to pick and choose what we want to hear from the teachings of Jesus. We want all the blessings but are often loathe to do what He calls us to do. We’re called to be generous with our goods, with our blessings. We’re not to give just out of our abundance but also out of our poverty. Responding to the needs of others when we’re busy, or tired, or feel the need of some private time is not as easy as asking for those things we need for ourselves. Loving the way Jesus would have us do requires a heart willing to think of others before ourselves. The role of Christ’s disciple requires discipline and courage.

The teachings from the Sermon on the Mount are meant to help us live a life of service and love. They help us grow in love for God and neighbour. They most certainly challenge us to a high standard. They call us to be merciful to others. Living a life of mercy, love and service enriches our relationships with others and with our heavenly Father. It’s a life well worth living.

However, carrying that out in practice means that we’re aware of those around us, of those who enrich our lives and those who can try to diminish us. We have to choose which kind of life we’ll live – a life of service or a life of self-serving. Choosing the latter may mean sacrifice on our part; it may mean we have to choose a path that challenges us, that stretches us. It means that we seek out opportunities to assist. Just as the ice and snow can isolate us from one another, leaving us cold and lifeless, so loving others can warm us and others surrounding us in a wrap of life-giving warmth.

There is much food for our journey in the Sermon on the Mount, much to digest and strengthen us, much to challenge us. Let’s spend some time reflecting in those teachings and find places we can improve our faith practice for His service here and make this cold world a warmer place for all. Let’s labour in the cold so when the spring comes, we’re ready to plant seeds of love and compassion, of mercy and joy, and so bring a bit of His love to others. Wishing you a week of much joy and many small miracles.

FROM THE PASTOR’S DESK:

The words of Jesus in today’s Gospel describe a world almost the exact opposite from the world we know, from the way we tend to live. When Jesus says, “Love your enemies... Do good to those who hate you...Bless those who curse you...,” the Lord is speaking, on one level, to His followers about the Romans who are occupying Palestine. He is also referring to those who would reject the Gospel and persecute its missionaries. But the Lord is also speaking on a more general level to all of us today. To say that we should love our enemies, do good to those who hate us always been the most difficult part of the Gospel message. Forgiving our enemies has never been a popular commandment but it is crucial for spiritual health. May be we can look at forgiveness as strength, as liberation, and as a grace.

Scarcely any day passes without the news about terrorism, crimes, rape or other brutality. The old Jewish law: ‘an eye, for eye, tooth for tooth’ (Lev. 24:19), seems to be as much relevant in this century as it was 2000 years ago. Is Jesus’ command: ‘love your enemies, do good to those who hate you,’ still hold good?

Jesus not only preached, he lived what he preached, he destroyed enmity by loving. When Abraham Lincoln was asked once: ‘Why can’t you destroy your enemies,’ he replied: ‘Yes, I do destroy my enemies by making them my friends.’ Jesus by dying on the cross destroyed sin and death. So we understand that God is good and loving, he is good even to the ungrateful, forgives sinners, and loves enemies. Jesus loves and, like Jesus, we too must love without reserve, without condition. For everyone created in God’s image, shares in God’s own life; hence we have no reason to condemn or despise anybody. Jesus says: “Do not judge, and you will not be judged, do not condemn, and you will not be condemned.” St. Augustine said it this way: If you want to stop thinking about the other person’s failings, the thing you have to do is to focus first on your own faults. Augustine was not talking about becoming scrupulous or morbid. What it involves is taking a deep breath and before I fly off the handle about someone else, to ask myself: How is it that I so quickly see the other person’s laziness or hypocrisy or greed? Could it be that I have similar faults, may be even worse ones? When Jesus said that he came not to condemn, but to save, he was referring to you and me – as much as anyone else.

Jesus rejected the law of retaliation and declared: ‘Treat others as you would like them to treat you.’ That means: Jesus expects of his disciples more than mere friendliness and mutual hospitality, for ‘if you love only those who love you, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners do so.’ There must be some difference between the disciples and other people in their attitude; their life must be marked by the golden rule which says: if someone curses you, do not curse back, but rather bless; if someone treats you badly, pray for him; if someone slaps you on the face, do not slap back but turn the other cheek; if someone steals your goods, do not keep grudge, do not stop helping the needy. An amazing example has emerged from the life of Ronald Reagan. On March 30, 1981, a young man ambushed the president. He fired six shots wounding Reagan and three others. When they wheeled him into the operating room, Reagan had an image of the gunman crouching in the darkness. The image filled him with rage. But he immediately got hold of his anger and said to himself, how can I expect God to forgive me, if I don’t forgive that man? This incident sums up what we must do when rage overcomes us. Remember that we too will be judged. Only mercy can free us from condemning others. Mercy knows no limits. Therein lies the true challenge, heroism; loving forgiveness is its highest aspect.
