The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Fifty five years ago today, Pope John XXIII passed from this world. He did so in the midst of one of the great undertakings of the Church in the modern era, as St. John XXIII gathered over 2,200 bishops and hundreds of other theologians of varying faiths. His purpose, his hope, as he said in opening address, was this:

“What is needed at the present time is a new enthusiasm, a new joy and serenity of mind in the unreserved acceptance by all of the entire Christian faith, without forfeiting that accuracy and precision in its presentation which characterized the proceedings of the Council of Trent and the First Vatican Council. What is needed, and what everyone imbued with a truly Christian, Catholic and apostolic spirit craves today, is that this doctrine shall be more widely known, more deeply understood, and more penetrating in its effects on men's moral lives. What is needed is that this certain and immutable doctrine, to which the faithful owe obedience, be studied afresh and reformulated in contemporary terms. For this deposit of faith, or truths which are contained in our time-honored teaching is one thing; the manner in which these truths are set forth (with their meaning preserved intact) is something else.

This, then, is what will require our careful, and perhaps too our patient, consideration. We must work out ways and means of expounding these truths in a manner more consistent with a predominantly pastoral view of the Church's teaching office.”

There was much work that had gone on in preparation for the Council, as the Vatican gathered together input from around the world about what bishops wanted to discuss, and began to circulate rough drafts and outlines to guide discussion. Each fall from 1962 to 1965, the Council Fathers would gather together for two or three months of discussions all together, as well as in smaller groups. In the end, they produced 16 major documents touching on most aspects of life in the Church. Their titles are taken from the first words of the official Latin texts:



Four Constitutions:

- Sacrosanctum Concilium (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy)
- Lumen gentium (Dogmatic Constitution on the Church)
- Dei verbum (Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation)
- Gaudium et spes (Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World)

Three Declarations:

- Gravissimum educationis (Declaration on Christian Education)
- Nostra aetate (Declaration on the Relation of the Church to Non-Christian Religions)
- Dignitatis humanae (Declaration on Religious Freedom)


Nine Decrees:

- Inter mirifica (Decree on the Media of Social Communication)
- Orientalium Ecclesiarum (Decree on the Catholic Churches of the Eastern Rite)
- Unitatis redintegratio (Decree on Ecumenism)
- Christus Dominus (Decree on the Pastoral Office of Bishops in the Church)
- Perfectae caritatis (Decree on the Adaptation and Renewal of Religious Life)
- Optatam totius (Decree on Priestly Training)
- Apostolicam actuositatem (Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity)
- Ad gentes (Decree on the Mission Activity of the Church)
- Presbyterorum ordinis (Decree on the Ministry and Life of Priests)

The two most commonly cited documents are probably Lumen Gentium and Gaudium et Spes—the Constitutions on the Church. If you are looking for a place to delve into the teachings of the Second Vatican Council, those are the best places to start. They are rich in material for spiritual reflection, as we also strive to live more fully the call to live as leaven in the world, heeding their call to holiness in our lives as disciples, witnessing to the world the power, the presence and the love of Jesus Christ.

School Highlights -

We celebrated the retirement of our beloved school librarian, Sue Harris this week. After 27 years at Holy Rosary School, we cannot thank her enough for her service, the love of reading she has passed on to so many students, her leadership in many areas diocese-wide, her welcoming personality and kind heart, and for always being a wonderful ambassador of our school. The students honored Sue in a special celebration this week and families sent in notes to wish her well in this next chapter of her life.

Even as we are going into the last few weeks of school, they are busy, busy weeks! Our Kindergarten class enjoyed a field trip down to Alki Beach together, and our fourth graders shared their Flat Stanley journals with our first graders. Also fourth grade, presented 2-4 minute presentations on their selected mystery books. Fifth graders continue to study the Revolutionary War and with partners have been working on an Interactive Notebook.

In 6th grade, students began a unit on the body's control systems. Students explored the functions of the nervous system and tested their reaction times to discover the functions of the peripheral nervous system. In Language Arts, 6th graders have been focusing in on their research skills and reviewing how to identify credible and not-so-credible sources. Seventh graders worked on a STEM challenge on pollination and eighth graders have begun their last week of finals before graduation.

We have 1 spot left in our Preschool 2s class. Student must be age 2.5 by August 31st. This is a drop-off class on Mondays and Fridays from 8:30am-11:00am. Class size will be 10 students and 2 teachers. Music, art, circle time, free-choice activity time, and outdoor recess are part of our preschool curriculum.

Students are engaged by enthusiastic teachers who provide hands-on curricula designed to spark creativity and encourage critical thinking.
