

COLESBURG CHURCH WILL BE DEDICATED

Solemn Services Will Take Place on Tuesday August 27th.

Colesburg, Ia., August 27.—On Tuesday, Aug. 27th Archbishop Beckman, S.T. D., will dedicate the St. Patrick's Catholic church of Colesburg, Ia. The Archbishop, assisted by a number of resistant. assisted by a number of neighboring priests will celebrate the Pontifical high mass of dedication which will take place at 9:30 a.

The Pontifical high mass is preceded by the ceremony of dedication. The celebrant, the Archbishep, intones the "Asperges Me" which the choir takes up and the entire procession then proceeds to walk around the entire church on the outside, the Archbishop reciting the prayers of dedication as he goes along. Returning to the entry of the church the Archbishop, intones another Psalm and then the aptire procession enters then the entire procession enters the church and the Archbishop sprinkles the walls within the church with holy water as he has done the outside walls before. After this ceremony the Archbishop kneels at the foot of the altar while the choir and chanters sing the Litany of the Saints. Then follows the Pontifical high mass, celebrated by His Excellency.

SPECIAL EVENT WELL ATTENDED

Archbishop Beckmann of Dubuque Officiated at Ceremony.

Colesburg, Ia., May 7.—Impressive services marked the laying of the cornerstone of the new. St. Patrick's church at Colesburg, last Sunday afternoon, which was attenued by a large congregation of members of the parish and people of the surrounding territory. Promptly at 3 o'clock, his Excellency Archbishop Beckmann of Dubuque, his assistants Dean J. B. Herbets of Dyersyille and Ray, J.

Promptly at 3 o'clock, his Excellency Archbishop Beckmann of Dubuque, his assistants Dean J. B. Herbers of Dyersville and Rev. J. H. Schilmoeller of Worthington and the Reverend Clergy marched from the parochial residence to the site of the new edifice. Arriving at the steps to the entrance of the church, the litany of the saints was sung by the clergymen. The chanters were Rev. Father Halbach and Rev. Father Ament, both of Dubuque Then followed the blessing of the stone after which it was imbedded in its place and sealed by Paul Kramer, of Dyersville contractor.

After the ceremony was completed the document, a copy of which was inclosed in the cornerstone was read by Monsignor Wolfe of Dubuque, The document contained a brief history and facts in connection with the construction of the new church.

Archbishop Speaks.

His Excellency Archbishop Beckmann delivered a brief sermon in the course of which he took occasion to congratulate the parishioners of the Colesburg church on their efforts in erecting the fine new structure, which replaces the one destroyed by fire some months ago. He stated that Protestants as well as Catholics are commended for their hearty cooperation in the reestablishment of the edifice. The Archbishop extended the papal benediction to the vast assembly at the conclusion of the sermon.

Dimensions of Church.

This beautiful structure is 70x30 ft nearing completion with cement foundation and large basement hall. The material used in construction is of Johns-Mansville tapered shape textured bestos siding, shingles on outer wall and hexagonal asbestos roof shingles.

The interior of the church built of glaze coat bevel plank tan on the walls and white on on the celings. Three ply fir plywood four feet high is used for walnscoating. The windows are glazed opalescent glass with peak frames. A fine gallery has also been provided for where the organ and pews for the members of the choir will be placed. When completed it will be one of the finest little churches, for miles around (Continued on Page Two)

Following is a copy of the docu-ment read by Monsignor Wolfe and placed in the corner stone of

the church:

The cornerstone of St. Patrick's church, Colesburg, Delaware County, Iowa, was Iaid on the 5th day of May, 1940 by His Excellency Francis Joseph Beckman, S. T. D., Archbishop of Dubuque. This event occurred during the second year of the Pontificate of His Holiness, Pope Pius XII, formerly known as Cardinal Pacelli, while Cardinal Magillione was secretary of State to His Holiness Pope Pius XII and His Excellency Ameleto Cicognani, was Apostolic Delegate to the United States and Francis Joseph Beckman S. T. D. was Archbishop of Dubuque and while Reverend John Herbers was dean of the Dyersville Deanery and the Reverend Joseph W. Bohr, was Administrator of St. Patrick's church, Colesburg, Iowa. Likewise the cornerstone of the

said St Patrick's church, Colesburg, Iowa was laid during third year of the second Administration of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, then residing Capital City at Washington, D.
