Indulgences

Through the waters of baptism Jesus offers us the rewards of eternal salvation. Baptism forgives us of the original sin that is passed on to us by our first parents, Adam and Eve. When we commit personal sin after our baptism we can go to confession to receive forgiveness of our sins. But this is only part of the story. When our sins are forgiven in confession the eternal punishment for our sins is remitted. This means that if we die after going to confession we will certainly go to heaven. What is not remitted is the temporal (or earthly) debt that has accrued because of sins. Sin causes destruction not just to our eternal soul, but also to our earthly family. While confession forgives all eternal punishment for sin, it does not heal the temporal

damages done by sin. We still have a duty to make up for the temporal damages we have caused. This is why the priest assigns a penance at confession. If we die with some temporal debt left we go to purgatory until we are prepared to enter heaven. This is why we can and should do other things to help heal the damages we have caused. This is done primarily through good works. There are many things that we can do to heal sin. Some good works that the Church finds to be especially good for healing damages and for being a source of increased charity for the faithful are attached to indulgences. Indulgences help to make up for the damages we have caused and remit the punishment for temporal sins. There are two types of indulgences. A partial indulgence forgives

some portion, but not all of the punishment due for temporal sin, meaning there is still some purgation that we must go through before entering heaven. A plenary indulgence remits all of the temporal punishment we have earned for our sins, meaning that we would go straight to heaven after our death. A plenary indulgence requires us to have complete detachment from sin and will typically come with a more strenuous work than a partial indulgence. Stay tuned for next week's bulletin, where I will discuss some of the actions we can do with indulgences attached, and how exactly we can obtain these indulgences to help our loved ones who have passed on from this earthly life.

Reflecting On Sunday's Readings

In the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, depending on the translation you use the word “kingdom” or “reign” and the phrase “kingdom of God” or “reign of God” appear numerous times. And like today’s Gospel Reading it was an important topic of Jesus’ discourses, and obviously an important concept that he wanted his disciples, and future generations, to understand. Jesus used many parables as verbal visual aids to express the immensity, nature, and value of the Kingdom or Reign of God. These word pictures, such as a woman sweeping her house until she finds the missing coin, still communicate to us today, and at the same time, like the disciples, we need a further explanation to grasp the full significance of what Jesus is teaching regarding the Kingdom/Reign of God. The Holy Spirit is ever present to illuminate our minds and give us understanding, and hopefully, we all are investing time daily to read and meditate on sacred Scripture. Fortunately, the Holy Spirit has been actively illuminating the meaning of Scripture for over 2000 years and we can draw upon this history of understanding and interpretation to enhance and focus our own meditation. I have found the book *Jesus of Nazareth** by Pope Benedict XVI to be very helpful in this way. Referencing Origen, an early Church Father, Pope Benedict XVI introduces three dimensions in which the Kingdom/Reign of God can be interpreted: Christological—Wherein the Kingdom is a person. “Jesus himself is the Kingdom; the Kingdom is not a thing, it is not a geographical dominion like worldly kingdoms. It is a person; it is he. ...

Jesus leads men to realize the overwhelming fact that in him God himself is present among them, that he is God’s presence.” Idealistic or Mystical—Wherein the Kingdom is a reflection of God’s reign in us. “It sees man’s interiority as the essential location of the Kingdom of God. ... The basic idea is clear: The ‘Kingdom of God’ is not to be found on any map. It is not a kingdom after the fashion of worldly kingdoms; it is located in man’s inner being. It grows and radiates outward from the inner space.” Ecclesiastical—Wherein the Kingdom/Reign of God is expressed in the Church. “But nineteenth- and early -twentieth century theology did tend to speak of the Church as the Kingdom of God on earth; the Church was regarded as the actual presence of the Kingdom within history.” As we meditate on the different statements of Jesus these three dimensions do shed light and help us understand what Jesus was emphasizing. Through them all though, is the presupposition that a Kingdom must have a King, and that King is Jesus. It presupposes that only one person can reign in the Kingdom, and that person should be Jesus not ourselves, or another. Pope Benedict XVI states it this way, “What is meant is not an imminent or yet to be established ‘kingdom’ but God’s actual sovereignty over the world, ... It would be better to speak of God’s being –Lord, of his lordship.” Many of us have been baptized into his Kingdom as infants, some later in life, consequently it is easy to miss this concept and fail to answer the question, “Who is reigning in my life?” In one sense this reign comes about in our life gradually as this week’s Gospel Reading may speak of, yet for many when we ask ourselves this question
