Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

No one who sets a hand to the plow and looks to what was left behind is fit for the kingdom of God.

-Luke 9:62

FOCUS ON THE MISSION

"There are so many things to do." "We have so little time." How many variations of these statements have you heard or even said yourself?

Actually neither statement is completely true. There are many things to do in this life, but really few things that are vitally important. Working, searching, conniving, and worrying our way to "gratify[ing] the desires of the flesh," as Paul relates in today's second reading, are really non-productive. So little time? When we take on the freedom that Christ offers us, we have all the time we need in this world, and even more in the next.

Elisha, the prophet Elijah's chosen servant, was slightly befuddled about what he should do. When Elijah called, he returned to bid farewell to his parents and provide food for his people. Only then did he follow.

Jesus demands something different, something more of his disciples. He calls us to a single-minded determination to drop everything and follow him. Now, not later.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITIONS

An old and still vital treasure in our tradition is a document called the "Apostolic Traditions," giving us a snapshot of church life in third-century Rome. Its author, Hippolytus, describes the liturgical life of the church and records the actual texts of the prayers. The way he explained the various "orders" of the church was the basis for a major reform of the rites of ordination by Pope Pius XII in 1947, and later for the Second Vatican Council. Hippolytus tells us that a bishop had to be elected by the entire people, and that ordination had to take place on a Sunday in the presence of the people, the presbyters, and neighboring bishops. The bishop-candidate is ordained by the other bishops, who impose their hands on his head while everyone else keeps a profound silence, awaiting the outpouring of the Spirit. There is a prayer of blessing said by one of them, on behalf of all, asking for the Spirit and describing his ministry.

Later centuries layered new features on top of this liturgy, including the requirement for three bishop consecrators. Today, whenever a new bishop is announced (election by the people is no more), a kind of genealogy is provided, tracing his pedigree through the consecrating bishops down through the centuries to Peter and the first body of believers. Every bishop today can trace his office through his consecrators back to the beginning in a tradition called "apostolic succession."

SOCIAL JUSTICE

Be Aware

On June 17 the Sacramento B33 published: "Newly declassified documents offer more details about a detainee who died inside the secret prison network of the C.I.A. abroad after the Sept. 11 attacks, and disclosed that President George W Bush was worried about images depicting the treatment. One of these showed a detainee, chained to the ceiling, clothed in a diaper and forced to go to the bathroom on himself. Another detainee in Afghanistan was shackled to a wall using the "short chain" method in freezing conditions, an extremely painful torture! The man was found dead in his cell the next day, and it is thought that he died from hypothermia.

June is Torture Awareness Month. It is always wrong, it is a moral issue and never justified. It is against the teaching of our Christian faith, and what our country stands for. For a copy of this article see the flyer in the entryway of the church.

HEALTH MINISTRY

SUMMER HEAT—Another silent killer

One of the biggest health hazards effecting our region during the summer is heat.

We don't realize how deadly heat can be. In contrast to the visible, destructive and violent nature of fire, floods and earthquakes, heat is another "silent killer," Human bodies dissipate heat by varying the rate and depth of blood circulation, by losing water through the skin and sweat glands.

The body does everything it can to maintain 98.6 degrees inside. Heat disorders happen when the body can't maintain that temperature. Disorders can range from simple discomfort to serious injury and even death, e.g. sunburn, heat cramps, exhaustion or heat stroke. They all share one common feature, a person has overexposed or over exercised for his or her age, physical condition and the weather.

Reduce your chances of disorders by following a few simple steps:

Slow Down—reduce strenuous activities or reschedule them to a cooler time of day.

Dress for summer—lightweight, light colored clothing, cover all exposed skin with high SPF sunscreen and wear a wide brimmed hat.

Drink plenty of water, avoid caffeine,, soda and fruit juices.

Check on the elderly, young children and people with health problems or disabilities.

Keep pets indoors or provide them with shade and plenty of water. Do not leave pets, or anyone else in a closed, parked vehicle

Dios, concede la *serenidad* para aceptar las cosas que no puede cambiar, *Valor* para cambiar aquellas que puede, y *Sabiduría* para conocer la diferencia..

TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

El último sábado de junio o el primero de julio en un ayuntamiento de Valcildacos, España, se pone en escena el *Miserere* escrito por Gustavo Adolfo Bécquer (1836-1870). Esta obra relata como un músico llega de noche a la Abadía de Fetero pidiendo posada. Los hermanos del monasterio lo invitaron a pasar la noche. Allí él les contó su vida pecaminosa y su deseo de encontrar un *Miserere* (Salmo 51) digno de expiar sus pecados ante Dios. Le contaron del *Miserere* del Monte que cantaban durante la noche los monjes difuntos de un Monasterio que había sido destruido siglos atrás. El músico afanado por encontrar su *Miserere*, corrió a la montaña donde escuchó aquel lamentoso y bello canto. Al regresar a la Abadía intentó escribir la música de aquel *Miserere*, pero lo único que logro fue volverse loco.

Aquel pobre hombre murió sin reconocer que cada quien debe entonar a su manera su propio y pobre *Miserere mei* (piedad de mi). Dios no nos perdona por la belleza o la fuerza de nuestra confesión, sino por su amor y su misericordia.

EL JUICIO LA CONCIENCIA

El mismo texto de la *Carta a los Romanos*, que nos ha presentado la esencia de la ley natural, indica también el *sentido bíblico de la conciencia*, especialmente en su *vinculación específica con la ley*: “Cuando los gentiles, que no tienen ley, cumplen naturalmente las prescripciones de la ley, sin tener ley, para sí mismos con ley; como quienes muestran tener la realidad de esa ley escrita en su corazón, atestiguándolo su conciencia con sus juicios contrapuestos que les acusan y también les defienden” (Rom 2, 14-15).

Según la Palabra de San Pablo, la conciencia, en cierto modo, pone al hombre ante la ley, siendo ella misma *“testigo” para el hombre*: testigos de su fidelidad o infidelidad a la ley, o sea, de su esencial rectitud o maldad moral, La conciencia es el único testigo. Lo que sucede en la intimidad de la persona esta oculto o a la vista de los demás desde afuera. La conciencia dirige su testimonio solamente hacia la persona misma. Y, a su vez, sólo la persona conoce la propia respuesta a la voz de la conciencia.
