AN ONGOING MISSION

In his hometown synagogue, Jesus' neighbors are amazed by his words. Nevertheless, they remind each other, "Is this not Joseph's son?"

Surely the people know who he is. The carpenter's son. The young man who had learned in this very synagogue. The boy down the street.

Conflict arises as Jesus begins to define himself in a new way. When he compares himself to the ancient prophets Elijah and Elisha the tensions grow. The tensions multiply when Jesus begins to tell of a new mission for God's people: the good news of the scriptures is intended for all.

In his famous passage from the First Letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul reminds us of the eternal nature of love. Love does not come to an end. In today's readings, we are reminded that, like love, Jesus' mission cannot be contained. Jesus slips through the crowd of persecutors and moves on to new challenges. We are called to this same perseverance in the name of love.

TREASURES OF OUR TRADITIONS

The song of the angels, "Holy, Holy, Holy," resounds from our lips at every Mass. There was a widespread belief in the first religions of the world that God stirred creation into being by a word, a song, a musical note. Music and a sense of God's presence have always been inseparable. In the liturgy, your voice is invited into this song as the priest names the reasons for our praise. "Heaven and earth are full of your glory," and we are not passive onlookers, but participants in this glory. Catholic prayer no longer assigns this angelic hymn to a choir, but gives it to you to sing. Even if your voice is thought to be suitable only for a well-insulated shower stall, you are called into this song.

We are born to sing—just listen to a baby testing the full range of newly-discovered vocal abilities. Soon we get shushed and hushed into quiet, and given lots of messages that our voices are unwanted, and that we need to raise our hands in order to be heard. All of that is overturned in liturgy, the place where God waits to hear us come alive in the song of all creation. In heaven, everyone's in the choir; why not start practicing now?

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

HARRIET TUBMAN (1820-1913)

She was a Black American whose daring rescues helped hundreds of slaves escape to freedom. She became the most famous leader of the underground railroad, which aided slaves fleeing to the free states or to Canada. Blacks called her Moses, after the biblical figures, who led the Jews from Egypt.

Tubman was born a slave in Bucktown, Maryland, near Cambridge. Her name was Araminta Ross, but as a child she became known by her mother's name, Harriet. Her father taught her a knowledge of the woods that later helped her in her rescue missions.

When Harriet was 13 she interfered with a supervisor to save another slave from punishment. The enraged supervisor fractured Harriet's skull with a 2 pound weight. She recovered, but suffered sudden blackouts for the rest of her life. She married John Tubman, a freed slave in 1844.

Harriet Tubman escaped from slavery in 1849 and went to Philadelphia via the underground railroad without her husband. She then vowed to return to Maryland and help other slaves escape. Harriet made her first trip back shortly after Congress passed the Fugitive Slave Act of 1850. This law made it a crime to help a runaway slave. Harriet returned 18 more times during the 1850's and helped about 300 slaves escape.

Harriet was never caught and never lost a slave on any of her 19 rescue trips. In the late 1850's Harriet met with the radical abolitionist John Brown, who told her of his plan to free the slaves. She considered Brown the true liberator of her race. Soon afterwards, Harriet also became active in the women's rights movement in New England and New York.

During the Civil War, Harriet served as a nurse, scout and spy for the Union Army in South Carolina. During one military campaign she helped to free more than 750 slaves.

BLACK HIISTORY

Ralph Bunche—United Nations Diplomat

He did not have many breaks in his early life. His grandfather was a slave. Ralph was born in the slums of Detroit, Michigan in 1904. His family needed extra money, as both of his parents died in 1997, so he sold newspapers. After their deaths he was raised by his grandmother, Lucy Johnson. Even though she was poor she would not allow Ralph to quit school in order to earn extra money. She always said she wanted him to go to college.

Ralph was at the top of his class in high school. He went to college and received a doctorate from Harvard in 1934, and this was a very high honor.

In 194 President Harry Truman chose Ralph to be a diplomat in the United Nations, where the job is to help countries get along with each other.

In 1950 he won the Nobel Prize for his hard work he did for the United Nations, and for World Peace. Ralph Bunche died in 1971.

DIOCESAN DIRECTOR OF WORSHIP

Subject: SILENCE

What are the those times when sacred silence should be observed? The Church tells us:

Before Mass: During the Penitential Act: after each invitation to pray: after the readings and the homily: after Communion.

The main purpose of silence is to foster a spirit prayer and enable the priest and the faithful to celebrate the Sacred Mysteries, fully aware of what they are doing. Good judgement is necessary. After each invitation to pray a few seconds is sufficient.

How much time is needed to "call to mind our sins" during the Penitential Act? Certainly more than a few seconds, but not overly long.

After each reading, about the same amount of time..

After the homily a little more time.

After Communion time should be allowed so that the faithful can meditate on the mystery they have just received.

The longest time of silence is before the Mass begins. The faithful need a quiet time to pray before the Mass.

Momentos Importantes del **SILENCIO en la Misa.**

¿Cuáles son los momentos en que se debe observar el silencio sagrado? La Iglesia nos dice:

Antes de la misa: durante el acto penitencial: después de cada invitación a orar: después de las lecturas y de la homilía: después de la comunión.

El propósito principal del silencio es fomentar una oración espiritual y permitir que el sacerdote y los fieles celebren los Misterios Sagrados, plenamente conscientes de lo que están haciendo. El buen juicio es necesario. Después de cada invitación a rezar unos segundos es suficiente.

¿Cuánto tiempo se necesita para "recordar nuestros pecados" durante el Acta Penitencial? Ciertamente, más de unos pocos segundos, pero no demasiado largo.

Después de cada lectura, aproximadamente la misma cantidad de tiempo ..

Después de la homilía un poco más de tiempo.

Después de la Comunión, se debe permitir el tiempo para que los fieles puedan meditar en el misterio que acaban de recibir.

El tiempo más largo de silencio es antes de que comience la misa. Los fieles necesitan un tiempo de silencio para orar antes de la misa.

TAMBIEN, no olvidar hacer la reverencia al entrar a la Iglesia, pasar por frente del altar, pasar por frente del Tabernáculo.

Enseñar a nuestros niños a no correr, comer y masticar cicle dentro de la Iglesia..
