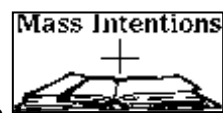

In today's First Reading from the Book of Genesis we hear the story of Adam and Eve and their sins, defying God. However, when God was present in the garden, the man and woman hid themselves. Adam responds to God's question why, in part, by saying "I was afraid... so I hid myself." Did he, do any of us, really think he could hide from God?
As children many of us may have hidden from a parent when we did something wrong and it was in violation of some specific order we had received. Our efforts to hide what we did and to hide ourselves were probably no more effective than Adam's.
As humans we know the temptation of following our own plans, even if they are contrary to God's. We think we know better and we may try to still have it our way. If what we have done is particularly shameful, we may try to hide our sins from God.
The sincere truth is that we cannot hide from God any more than Adam and Eve could. Psalm 139 declares, "Where can I hide from your spirit (God's)? From your presence where can I flee? If I ascend to the heavens, you are there; if I lie down in Sheol (the place of the dead) you are there, too. If I say 'Surely darkness will hide me'... Darkness is not dark for you."
What are we hiding from? In recent weeks we have learned over and over how much God loves us. It is time for us to accept that and not hide.

The pastel heavens and the majestic soft mountains give a natural warmth and serenity to the background. Birds appear to be chatting in a tree while a tiger plays with a hare at his feet. A lion and lioness vigilantly stroll their kingdom, inspiring security rather than fear. There is space to run, shade for rest, a path under a leafy arch that invites us to walk. Eden is the perfect habitat of protection, freedom, and fraternity.

And in the center are Adam and Eve. Traditional farm animals are nearby, and man's best friend is at Adam's right hand with a cat sitting at his feet. Dear Padre,

Does a Saturday wedding Mass count for Sunday obligation?

Your question is frequently asked of priests, so it's good to help clarify this matter. If you attend Mass anywhere in a Catholic rite either on Sunday or in the evening of the preceding day, then the obligation is satisfied (Canon 1248). "Evening" is generally understood in most dioceses as anytime from 4 PM onward. Thus, an afternoon Mass (wedding or otherwise) before 4 PM on Saturday is not an evening Mass and doesn't fulfill the obligation.

Moreover, if Mass is celebrated in a Catholic rite after 4 PM on Saturday, the Sunday obligation is satisfied regardless if the scriptural texts differ from those of the Sunday or holy day (Canon 1248 commentary).

A related question often asked of priests is whether Communion may be received more than once a day. Any eligible Catholic can receive Communion "a second time on the same day only within the eucharistic celebration in which



the person participates" (Canon 917). "A second time" doesn't mean "repeatedly." Only those in danger of death, or priests who trinate at Mass, can receive Communion a third time in one day. This law is intended to promote a full sharing in the Lord's Body and Blood, while preventing the abuse of receiving multiple Communions out of misguided devotion.
