PASTOR'S PARISHABLES

The "prerogatives of the Jews" is a term I 1st heard used in the seminary, as in "the 8 prerogatives of the Jews" in Romans 9:4-5. Since those verses are part of the 2nd reading this Sunday, it's a good time for a little review. First, about that word "prerogative": "a right or privilege exclusive to a particular individual or class." Paul didn't use the word "prerogatives" but he did list 8 claims & qualities of the Jews that give them a "privileged" place in God's plan. The great Catholic theologian St. Thomas Aquinas cited this passage in Romans (among other Scriptures) to analyze & explain the dignity of the Jews. (The very name Jew is "honorable" he says.)

The relationship of Christians & Jews has been difficult & complex from the beginning—hence St.

Paul's anguished treatment of the topic in Romans 9, 10, & 11 (Jews & Gentiles in God's Plan). He's addressing Gentiles. He's a Jew, of course. He's also a Christian, of course! Between this week's reading & next week's, the lectionary skips some verses, including 11:1-2: "Has God rejected his people? Of course not! I myself am an Israelite, descended of the tribe of Benjamin. No, God has not rejected his people whom he foreknew."

When the Catechism of the Catholic Church talks about non-Christians, it puts the Jewish people in 1st place: "The Jewish faith, unlike other non-Christian religions, is already a response to God's revelation in the Old Covenant." The Jews are "...unlike any other non-Christian religion." The Catechism proceeds to quote St. Paul, from the part of Romans we read this Sunday (the 8 "prerogatives"): "To the Jews 'belong the adoption, the glory, the covenants, the giving of the law, the worship, & the promises; to them belong the patriarchs, & of their race, according to the flesh, is the Christ."

As a Church, we have not always sounded so gracious about the Jews or so much like St. Paul: Anti-Semitism is a deeply rooted cancer in our society & our world. It is not in remission! We need to continue to address the apathy of many Christians to improving Jewish-Christian relations & the persistence of anti-Semitism.

How about a trip to Detroit? We've been asked to spread the word: "Bishop Quinn & Bishop Harrington invite you to join them in Detroit for the Beatification of Father Solanus Casey. Tuesday, Aug. 15th, is the feast of the Assumption of Mary, a holyday of obligation. <u>Masses are at 8:30 AM at</u>

SM & 5:15 PM at SSPP. This is one of our oldest feasts honoring Jesus' mother. August 15th was the date for it, even back to the 6th century when it was called The Falling Asleep of the Mother of God. That's where the old word "dormition" came from. That word's root means "to sleep" & gave us the word "dormitory". The term "assumption" (taking up) was later used to affirm the traditional belief that the body of Mary did not decay but soon after burial was assumed into heaven. This belief of the Church certainly did not originate on Nov. 1, 1950—that was merely the date on which Pope Pius XII declared the Assumption of Mary a dogma—an article of faith.

The phone rang last Friday after lunch. "Hello, my name is Laurin Vance & I'm calling from Winnebago." I was scheduled for some 1st Friday communion calls & running late. Now the phone rings. "This better be important." No, of course I didn't say that—but it might have come through in my tone of voice. My caller continued, "I'm a grandson of the man who built your church in Winnebago." Suddenly, I was in less of a hurry. I'm interested. He wondered where the church was in Winnebago & if it's unlocked. At that moment it was hard for me to be helpful so he said, "Where are you now?" When I said the Blue Earth rectory he said, "My grandfather built the Catholic Church in Blue Earth too. I'll be right over."

In the 15 minutes before he arrived I changed my schedule & grabbed the history books of our parishes. SSPP was built in 1934 & SM in 1938. I have more info on SSPP: F. A. Slifer was the architect, the P. O. Navick construction company was the contractor, & Thomas J. Gaytee did the windows. When my guest arrived I learned that he's from the Seattle area. He was interested in our history books (telling me he's doing a photo essay of his grandfather's work—& "It's Navik not Navick"). He was more interested in the church, of which he took many pictures. (He also told me that he knew what I was busy about that day: "I'm a retired Lutheran minister.") He went to St. Mary's for more evidence, & pictures. I said that the little history book on St. Mary's doesn't mention Navik Construction & he said, "Oh, I have the records on that." There are pictures of the foundation being dug & the cornerstone being laid. I learned that his grandfather built many churches ("mainly Catholic") in southern MN. He also noticed the credit line "Photo by Harland Navik" under the picture of the church in the 1934 dedication book. "That's my uncle," he said, & then told an interesting story about how Harland's career began with a photo of a lightning strike at Luther in Decorah, Iowa. A very, very interesting hour. We've promised to keep in touch. You will be hearing more I'm sure. Try & stop me.

The Anointing of the Sick sacrament is planned for <u>Aug. 17 at St. Luke's</u>, during the weekly Thursday Mass there.
