From the Heart - by Fr. Kern

A special thank you to everyone who helped plan and coordinate the Tri-Parish Picnic hosted by St. Teresa's last week. We had great food, fun with games for the kids (and me), and even raised some money for the youth programs. It was a great representation of community coming together to recognize the many blessings we have been given. May the Lord in His abundant grace continue to fill our hearts with the fullness of love and mercy!

Each of us knows someone who is searching. Can you think of someone who is searching to find answers in their faith or looking to grow deeper in their relationship with Jesus? I hope you might think of yourself in this context as well. There is an old adage that being stationary in the spiritual life is regression in the spiritual life. We have to stir into flame our ache or hunger for God. Allow Him to stir up within us a desire that is only satisfied in our personal relationship with Jesus. Our Triune God desires relationship with us in this way! There are many ways to actualize or satisfy this hunger in the Church and first and foremost it is through our devotion to the Eucharist and commitment to personal prayer time. By making a priority (and not just going through the motions) the Mass, Eucharistic adoration, time before the Blessed Sacrament, reading of Sacred Scripture, Marian devotion, and prayer anyway we can get it serves to be essential to our deepening relationship with God.

Starting Tuesday, September 15th, and carrying forth every Tuesday at 7:00PM, I will begin teaching a course or session along with two campus ministers at the St. Thomas More Newman Center Parish at Minnesota State University. This will serve as the parish RCIA program this year. I have sent letters out to specific people who might be interested in learning more about the Catholic faith but I would love to increase the number of people who are attending this program. I have opened it up to anyone who simply wants to go deeper in their faith journey—but not just know more—but encounter Jesus. It will be a welcoming group and perhaps will be a younger group than a normal parish RCIA program but will be a wonderful opportunity to study and fall in love with the faith given us by Jesus Himself. I think anyone who is searching might find this a great opportunity and it will be low pressure if it does not fit what they are looking for at the current time. Remember more opportunities are coming as well for bible studies and faith groups in our parishes so be ready to jump in and say yes to what Jesus is doing in your life! 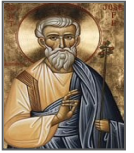

Panel discussion on Pope's New Encyclical

Recently, the Center for Medical Progress, (CMP) released a video showing the senior medical director at Planned Parenthood discussing PP'S ongoing involvement in today's sale of baby body parts. Ask them to 1) immediately suspend all Medicaid reimbursements to Planned Parenthood, and 2) to conduct an investigation of Planned Parenthood to shut off all taxpayer money to the organization. Sunday Bible Reflections with Dr. Scott Hahn

This Sunday's Mass readings conclude a four-week meditation on the Eucharist.

The 12 apostles in today's Gospel are asked to make a choice -- either to believe and accept the new covenant He offers in His body and blood, or return to their former ways of life.

Their choice is prefigured by the decision Joshua asks the 12 tribes to make in today's First Reading.

Joshua gathers them at Shechem -- where God first appeared to their father Abraham, promising to make his descendants a great nation in a new land (see [Genesis 12:1-9](http://www.bible.com/bible/1/Genesis/12/1-9)). And he issues a blunt challenge -- either renew their covenant with God or serve the alien gods of the surrounding nations.

We too are being asked today to decide whom we will serve. For four weeks we have been presented in the liturgy with the mystery of the Eucharist -- a daily miracle far greater than those performed by God in bringing the Israelites out of the land of Egypt.

He has promised us a new homeland, eternal life, and offered us bread from heaven to strengthen us on our journey. He has told us that unless we eat His flesh and drink His blood we will have no life in us.

It is a hard saying, as many murmur in today's Gospel. Yet He has given us the words of eternal life.

We must believe, as Peter says today, that He is the Holy One of God, who handed himself over for us, gave His flesh for the life of the world. As we hear in today's Epistle, Jesus did this that we might be sanctified, made holy, through the water and word of baptism by which we enter into His new covenant. Through the Eucharist, He nourishes and cherishes us, making us His own flesh and blood, as husband and wife become one flesh.

Let us renew our covenant today, approaching the altar with confidence that, as we sing in today's Psalm, the Lord will redeem the lives of His servants.
