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Today we celebrate the **Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica**. The Basilica of Saint John Lateran is the Cathedral church of the Diocese of Rome, Italy. Early in the fourth century Constantine the Great – Emperor of Rome 306-337 AD – gave Pope Melchiodorus (311-314 AD) some property and buildings for a church and his residence. The complex was designated as “Lateran” because the previous owner of the property was a man named Plautius Lateran. The buildings were converted into a church which was consecrated in 324 AD being dedicated to the Savior. Multiple times throughout its history the Basilica suffered damage from earthquakes and fires as well as the hands of invading armies. Most recently (1993) it was heavily damaged by a bomb set by the mafia in order to silence Saint John Paul II after his forceful call for them to repent or face the fires of hell. Each time it was rebuilt and eventually also dedicated to Saint John the Baptist and Saint John the Evangelist. The Popes lived at the Lateran complex until 1304 at which time they moved to Avignon in France. Since their return to Rome in 1377, the Popes have resided at the Vatican. Reflecting the fact that the Basilica is the Cathedral church of the Bishop of Rome – that is, the Pope – the inscription on its façade states that it is the “mother and head of all the churches of the City (of Rome) and of the world.”

We continue with part seven of the answer to the question posed by a parishioner: **“Who is a person to call if somebody needs the last rites before death” if the Pastor is gone?** Having explored the manner in which the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is celebrated, just what are the **effects** of this sacrament? The *Compendium of the Catechism of the Catholic Church* summarizes that “this sacrament confers a special grace which **unites the sick person more intimately to the Passion of Christ for his good and for the good of all the Church**. It gives **comfort, peace, courage, and even the forgiveness of sins** if the sick person is not able to make a Confession. Sometimes, if it is the will of God, this sacrament even brings about the **restoration of physical health**. In any case this Anointing prepares the sick person for the **journey to the Father’s House**” (319).

Elaborating on the effects of the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick the Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds us it is “a **particular gift of the Holy Spirit**. The **first** grace of the sacrament is one of strengthening, peace, and courage to overcome the difficulties that go with the condition of serious illness or the frailty of old age. This grace is a gift of the Holy Spirit, who renews trust and faith in God and strengthens against the temptations of the evil one, the temptation to discouragement and anguish in the face of death. This assistance from the Lord by the power of His Spirit is meant to lead the sick person to healing of the soul, but also of the body if such is the will of God” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1520).

A **second** effect is “**union with the Passion of Christ**. By the grace of this sacrament the sick person receives the strength and the gift of uniting himself more closely to Christ’s Passion: in a certain way he is consecrated to bear fruit by configuration to the Savior’s redemptive Passion. Suffering, a consequence of original sin, acquires a new meaning; it becomes a participation in the saving work of Jesus” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1521).

A **third** effect is “an **ecclesial grace**. The sick who receive this sacrament, ‘by freely uniting themselves to the Passion and Death of Christ,’ ‘contribute to the good of the People of God.’ By celebrating this sacrament the Church, in the communion of saints, intercedes for the benefit of the sick person, and he, for his part, through the grace of this sacrament, contributes to the sanctification of the Church and to the good of all men for whom the Church suffers and offers herself through Christ to God the Father” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1522).

The **fourth** effect is “a **preparation for the final journey**. If the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is given to all who suffer from serious illness and infirmity, even more rightly is it given to those at the point of departing this life; so it is also called . . . the sacrament of those departing. The Anointing of the Sick completes our conformity to Christ, just as Baptism began it. It completes the holy anointings that mark the whole Christian life; that of Baptism which sealed the new life in us, and that of Confirmation which strengthened us for the combat of this life. This last anointing fortifies the end of our earthly life like a solid rampart for the final struggles before entering the Father’s House” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1523).” Next week we examine who may receive the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick and when it should be requested .
