



People will sometimes stop me to ask why I like to travel. One friend always says that all he wants to do is sit on a beach and read. Others like “staycations” because they involve less work and planning than major trips. Me, I like exotic places with zip lines! So, I have put together a brief “Catholic list of why I sense we all need to travel.

Reason #1: **God has made us stewards of creation.** Traveling around the world has become a part of everyday life for many; it’s

actually something everyone should be able to do at least once in their lives. Whether we choose to spend a few weeks or a couple months traveling this beautiful planet, it’s important to see what’s out there. We have the opportunity to reflect on the creation account from the Book of Genesis; encounter God’s children from other nations, religions, and cultures. Travel affords the opportunity of being away and aware of all the gifts God has given to us and our responsibility to insure that another generation will have the same gifts.

Reason #2: **Our eyes become open to the reality that surrounds us.** If we are open and willing, travel will make us an incredibly more well-rounded human beings. And that’s really the goal. One of the most profound experiences of my life was walking through the slums of Cairo with a Coptic priest friend. We were making our way to the Church at which he was stationed. We met Christians in need of food, clothing, and shelter. It opened my eyes to realize that being a Christian in Egypt is not easy. It also helped me to understand the meaning of uniting our present suffering with that of Christ on His Cross.

Reason #3: **We become Pilgrims not just Travelers.** Travel presents both challenges and opportunities; in a very profound way, it helps us discover who we are in a way that’s only possible on a journey. A pilgrim is one on a journey. Very often this is a journey to a sacred place; however, it may also be a journey of self discovery. If we are open to the possibility of God’s grace at work in our lives, then travel has the potential to change our minds and hearts to the wonder of people and places; this can help lead us on our journey of salvation.

Reason #4: **Pilgrims develop meaningful Relationships.** People we meet while on the journey of life become some of the most valued names written on our hearts. They become loved ones on the map to again. These new friends give us a worldview that is different from our families and circle of friends, and force us to take in new and broadening perspectives, and ultimately realize that we are one family of humanity

Reason #5: **Travel helps us realize that we can rise to any occasion.** Sometimes it’s only far from home that we realize all the skills God has given us; perhaps we have never used them, but they are still in our toolbox. It’s travel that brings them to the surface and helps us help others, knowing that we can reach the mountain top, cross any valley, or help a villager survive a hurricane.

Reason #6: **Travel gives us a whole new perspective.** Meeting people from other religions cultures teaches us that our worldview isn’t the only way to view the universe. In deed and in fact, our worldview may have several major prejudices. Seeing the world for ourselves improves our vision and our grip on reality.

Reason #7: **Travel Changes our Hearts (this is the most important!).** Can we all admit that our daily routines can get the best of us? Every now and then we need to shake things up so we can grow. Finding a new destination, looking at the world through different lens, and meeting new people forces us to change. Change is good and calls us to be better than we thought we could be. Travel is full of moments of joy and challenges. Growing in faith, hope, and love through travel the greatest joys of all.



Pope Pius X is perhaps best remembered for his encouragement of the frequent reception of Holy Communion, especially by children. The second of 10 children in a poor Italian family, Joseph Sarto became Pius X at age 68. He was one of the 20th century's greatest popes. Ever mindful of his humble origin, Pope Pius stated, "I was born poor, I lived poor, I will die poor." He was embarrassed by some of the pomp of the papal court. "Look how they have dressed me up," he said in tears to an old friend. To another, "It is a penance to be forced to accept all these practices. They lead me around surrounded by soldiers like Jesus when he was seized in Gethsemani."

Interested in politics, Pope Pius encouraged Italian Catholics to become more politically involved. One of his first papal acts was to end the supposed right of governments to interfere by veto in papal elections—a practice that reduced the freedom of the 1903 conclave which had elected him. In 1905, when France renounced its agreement with the Holy See and threatened confiscation of Church property if governmental control of Church affairs were not granted, Pius X courageously rejected the demand.

While he did not author a famous social encyclical as his predecessor had done, he denounced the ill treatment of indigenous peoples on the plantations of Peru, sent a relief commission to Messina after an earthquake, and sheltered refugees at his own expense. On the 11th anniversary of his election as pope, Europe was plunged into World War I. Pius had foreseen it, but it killed him. "This is the last affliction the Lord will visit on me. I would gladly give my life to save my poor children from this ghastly scourge." He died a few weeks after the war began, and was canonized in 1954.

His humble background was no obstacle in relating to a personal God and to people whom he loved genuinely. Pius X gained his strength, his gentleness and warmth for people from the source of all gifts, the Spirit of Jesus. In contrast, we often feel embarrassed by our backgrounds. Shame makes us prefer to remain aloof from people whom we perceive as superior. If we are in a superior position, on the other hand, we often ignore simpler people. Yet we, too, have to help "restore all things in Christ," especially the wounded people of God.

Why does the Catholic Church believe Christ is really present in the Eucharist?

The Catholic doctrine of the Real Presence is the belief that Jesus Christ is literally, not symbolically, present in the Holy Eucharist—body, blood, soul and divinity. Catholics believe in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist because Jesus tells us this is true in the Bible: "I am the bread of life. Your fathers ate the manna in the wilderness, and they died. This is the bread which comes down from heaven, that a man may eat of it and not die. I am the living bread which came down from heaven; if any one eats of this bread, he will live for ever; and the bread which I shall give for the life of the world is my flesh. The Jews then disputed among themselves, saying, 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' So Jesus said to them, 'Truly, truly, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of man and drink his blood, you have no life in you; he who eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day. For my flesh is food indeed, and my blood is drink indeed. He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood abides in me, and I in him" (*John 6:48-56*). Furthermore, the early Church Fathers either imply or directly state that the bread and wine offered in the celebration of the Lord's Supper is really the body and blood of Jesus Christ. In other words, the doctrine of the Real Presence that Catholics believe today was believed by the earliest Christians 2,000 years ago! This miracle of God's physical presence to us at every Mass is the truest testament to Christ's love for us and His desire for each of us to have a personal relationship with Him.




THE LOGIC OF PASTORAL MERCY

308. At the same time, from our awareness of the weight of mitigating circumstances – psychological, historical and even biological – it follows that “without detracting from the evangelical ideal, there is a need to accompany with mercy and patience the eventual stages of personal growth as these progressively appear”, making room for “the Lord’s mercy, which spurs us on to do our best”. I understand those who prefer a more rigorous pastoral care which leaves no room for confusion. But I sincerely believe that Jesus wants a Church attentive to the goodness which the Holy Spirit sows in the midst of human weakness, a Mother who, while clearly expressing her objective teaching, “always does what good she can, even if in the process, her shoes get soiled by the mud of the street”. The Church’s pastors, in proposing to the faithful the full ideal of the Gospel and the Church’s teaching, must also help them to treat the weak with compassion, avoiding aggravation or unduly harsh or hasty judgements. The Gospel itself tells us not to judge or condemn (cf. *Mt 7:1; Lk 6:37*). Jesus “expects us to stop looking for those personal or communal niches which shelter us from the maelstrom of human misfortune, and instead to enter into the reality of other people’s lives and to know the power of tenderness. Whenever we do so, our lives become wonderfully complicated”.


