Dear Community Members,

As I told you last Sunday, it's good to be back with you again. I must say, going from North Little Rock to Chicago and back was like going from summer (well, almost) to winter and back to summer again. What's with the weather? Doesn't the weather know that it's still supposed to be winter time? Last weekend, the temperatures were in the low 70s. Yikes! Now, as I write this, it's in the 50s. I tell you, the weather in Chicago was great. Imagine wind chill factors of -9°! And yes, "The Windy City" was certainly windy. It snowed too. I didn't sweat the whole time I was there. It was just a bit of heaven.

So now we're into the second week of Lent. I hope it's going well for you. Of course, it's still a bit early so your penances might still be a bit new. Watch out now. As we begin things, very often an initial fervor might be present and our penances might not seem too strenuous. This can be a good thing. However, the term 'initial' means just that, i.e., the beginning stages. The test is whether or not we can sustain our penances and sacrifices with good grace through the whole of Lent. But, isn't this really what Lent is all about? Like St. Paul, we have to run our course to its end. It's also important to know that our self-denials are not ends in themselves. We deny ourselves lawful goods and/or pleasures (things intrinsically good in themselves) for a much greater good, a deepening of our spiritual life in communion with the Triune God. This is no small task, as we all know.

Last Saturday, 20 February, was the day of Justice Antonin Scalia's funeral. Justice Scalia was very devoted to the Traditional Latin Mass. His funeral Mass was celebrated by his son, Rev. Paul Scalia, also a good friend of the TLM. I suppose it was too much to hope for that the funeral Mass would be the TLM, and it was. I saw portions of it. The Mass was very dignified and many priests were in attendance. The music, of course, was excellent and well done. Though I never had the honor of meeting Justice Scalia, I did meet his son while I was stationed in Scranton, PA.

We can only hope and pray that someone of equal caliber eventually occupies his judicial chair. It's my belief that he can certainly have a successor, but no one will really be able to replace him. He was the champion of morality and, dare I say it, sanity, a commodity in very short supply in every branch of our government these days. Requiescat in pace, my children and my friends.
