Catholic Identity

At SJB we are all aware of the living presence of Jesus the "Master" who, today as always, is with us in our journey through life as the one genuine "Teacher," in whom all human values find their fullest perfection. The gospel spirit is evident in our thoughts and lives which permeates all facets of our school. We endeavor to create a school community climate that reproduces, as far as possible, the warm and intimate atmosphere of family life. As a staff we do everything we can to promote a common spirit of trust and freedom. The Catholic philosophy of education has always

paid special attention to the quality of interpersonal relations in the school community, especially those between teachers and students. This concern ensures that the student is seen as a person whose intellectual growth is harmonized with spiritual, religious, emotional, and social growth. St. John Bosco, our namesake, said "education is a thing of the heart," authentic formation of young people requires the personalized accompanying of a teacher. "During childhood and adolescence, a student needs to experience personal relations with outstanding educators, then what is taught has greater

influence on the student's formation when placed in a context of personal involvement, genuine reciprocity, coherence of attitudes, lifestyle, and day to day behavior." Prayer is a typical part of our school day. Students learn to pray in times of sorrow and joy, of disappointment and celebration, of difficulty and success. Such prayer teaches students that they belong to the communion of saints, a community that knows no bounds. The sacraments of the Eucharist and Reconciliation mark the rhythm of our Catholic school life. Masses are celebrated regularly, with the students and teachers participating appropriately. We also have our traditional Catholic devotions in place: praying the Rosary, singing hymns, reading from the Bible, recounting the lives of the saints, and celebrating the Church's liturgical year. The sacramental vitality of our Catholic faith is expressed in these and similar acts of religion that belong to our everyday ecclesial life.

Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment

At St. John Bosco School curriculum, instruction, and assessment are tightly aligned, and many academic areas have been redesigned to engage students in 21st Century, personalized, technology-enabled, deeper learning. Curricula and instruction are standards-aligned, research-based, and enriched through authentic, real-world problem solving. Students and teachers have robust and adaptive tools to customize the learning, teaching, and assessment, ensuring that it is student-centered and emphasizing deep understanding of complex issues. More of our assessments are shifting to be online, embedded, and performance-based. Data and associated analysis serve as building blocks for learning that is personalized, individualized, and differentiated to ensure all learners succeed. Not only is our curriculum continuing to grow stronger, but it is also continuing to be more diverse. This fall we will have completed our expansion of our middle school Spanish program. Four years of Spanish 5-8, on a daily basis, is part of our core curriculum. Reading, writing, speaking and cultural education are all part of these engaging courses. Our math curriculum is expanding also with us offering Algebra to 8th grade students who have done well in our 7th grade accelerated course. An elective writing course is also being offered to 8th grade students and of course the new STEM program with nationally recognized Project Lead the Way for our kindergarten thru 8th grade students.

Robust Infrastructure

When employed as part of a comprehensive educational strategy, the effective use of technology provides tools, resources, data, and supportive systems that increase teaching opportunities and promote efficiency. Such environments enable anytime, anywhere learning based on competency and mastery with empowered caring teachers who are guiding the way for each student to succeed. High quality, high speed technology and infrastructure systems within St. John Bosco are essential to the advancing of digital learning.

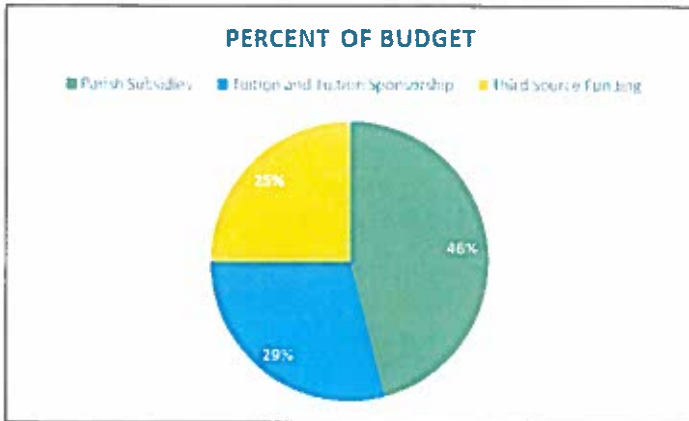
- **Adequacy of Devices; Quality and Availability:** The school has considered a host of creative options to ensure that diverse and appropriate technology devices are available to all students and staff to support powerful digital learning at any time, from any location.
- **Robust Network Infrastructure:** Adequate bandwidth and a supportive infrastructure are in place to ensure ready and consistent access to online resources for teaching and learning. Teams monitor usage and identify possible bottlenecks prior to them affecting teaching and learning. Privacy, safety and security are primary concerns as well. The school community collaboratively designs responsible use policies and confirm that the network design is supportive of these policies.
- **Adequate and Responsive Support:** Sufficient technical and instructional support, characterized by a positive service orientation, is available at SJB. This support is proactive, providing resources, coaching, and just-in-time instruction to prepare teachers and students to use new technologies, thereby reducing the need for interventions during the learning process.
- **Formal Cycle for Review and Replacement:** Our team along with our contracted technology team continuously monitors technologies—software, hardware, and infrastructure—to ensure upgrades, additions, and, when called for, sunsetting/eliminations in a timely, environmentally responsible, and proactive manner.

Data

Data and privacy are foundational elements of digital learning. A personalized, learner-centered environment uses technology to collect, analyze, and organize data to improve the effectiveness and efficiency of learning. Data is the building block of diagnostic, formative, and summative assessments—all of which are key elements in a system where learning is personalized, individualized, and data-

informed decision making. The use of formative and summative assessment data is part of our school culture, with myself, teachers, and, perhaps most importantly, students actively using this data to improve learning. Assessment is not viewed as punitive, but rather as part of the teaching and learning process. There is an expectation at SJB that data will inform all teaching and learning practices and decisions. This is modeled at all levels of our school, from administration to the students themselves.

Finances



Parish Subsidies (\$365,000) = 46%

Tuition and Tuition Sponsorship (\$234,000) = 29%

Third Source Funding (\$203,000) = 25%

At St. John Bosco, we are very aware of the investment that is being made in our children by the parishioners, parents and community members. We take seriously our responsibility to be good stewards of our investment. The above figures are what has been budgeted for the 2017 – 2018 year. Third Source Funding includes our Golf Outing, Gala of Giving, Annual School Fund Drive and a few miscellaneous fund raisers.

Special Project Grants and Donations (\$184,500)

Special Project Grants and Donations include STEM (Project Lead the Way), fine arts, technology, and physical education, these monies are not included in our budget as they are for special designated projects.

Extra-Curricular Activities

Our seventh annual school musical presentation of Mary Poppins was a definite highlight of our year. The students in grades 5 – 8 began their preparation for

the performance in February. Their hard work and commitment resulted in a performance exceeding our expectations. We are especially proud of the great cooperation and respect shown by the students for one another in working together to make the production a success. This year we fielded five basketball teams of various grades and genders. The focus was continued growth in their skill set along with teamwork and sportsmanship. Two math teams competed in the Door County Competition held in March. Prior to the competition students refined their skills in problem solving, numerology, formulas, probability and statistics and algebraic reasoning. Not only did the students develop confidence in their ability to reason and solve problems but they gained insight as to its application to real world situations. Student Council provided students an additional opportunity to provide leadership and service to the community. Their year began with a baby supply drive for young mothers and ended with a school countdown celebration of the last 15 days of school. Each day corresponding with a letter from the alphabet and activity.

Marketing

Our website(www.johnboscoschool.org) now has the capability to accept donations thru PayPal. Our website also connects directly to our Facebook page. We have 1,126 participants who have entered their personal information as part of being an alumnus of one of the three parish schools (Sts. Peter and Paul, St. Joseph or Corpus Christi) prior to St. John Bosco being formed or an alumnus of any Catholic school. We have Donor Perfect to organize our constituent data into one unified database with almost 3000 members entered of which 400 are alumni. We are beginning to use the information for various reports and communications.

Christmas by the Bay afforded the school parade participation with the float theme “Glory to God & Peace on Earth”. This is the fourth year in a row St. John Bosco has placed first in the Non-Profit Category. We continue to have marketing announcements at all the masses throughout the year, and a Parish Connection communique the first weekend of each month. This annual report will also be sent to all of our generous donors.

- * Successful engagement of 41 students involved in our school play – Mary Poppins.
- * Hosted by St. John Bosco, two math teams competed in the Door County Math Competition, 1 of our students placing in the top 10, Andrew Konop.
- * Continued with five basketball teams this year.
- * Design completed and funding for STEM (Project Lead the Way) taking place now.
- * Over 500+ letters written to our homebound partners throughout the year.
- * Running Club started thru Run to Luv2 program. 79 students participating Kindergarten thru 8th grade, they ran in the Green Bay Cellcom 5K on May 19th.
- * Over 150 letters written to active service men and women to be enclosed with 4th of July care packages.
- * Students met the principal’s reading challenge of 100,000 minutes in 6 weeks reading 117,388 minutes.
- * Students generously contributed items to the Christ Child Society.
- * Computer coding began in 4K-3rd grade.
