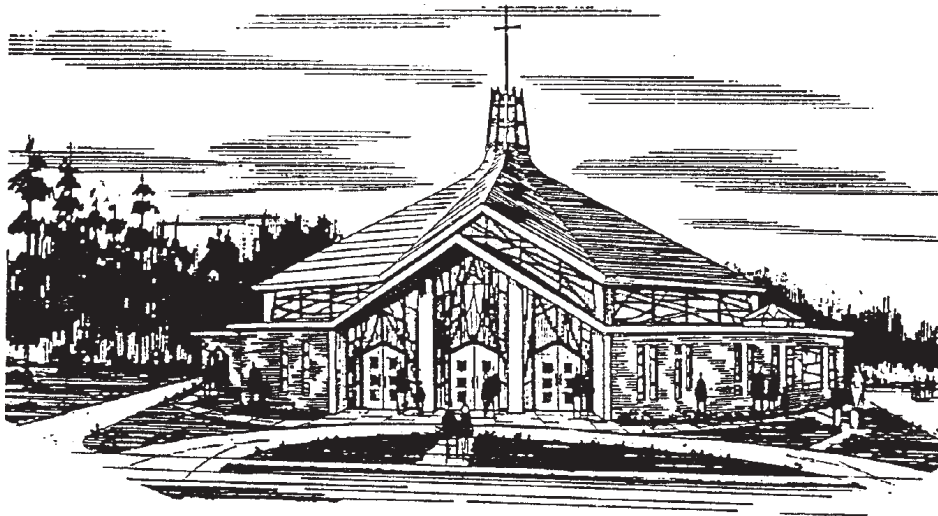

## Message from the Pastor:

The Gospel message today is very special and powerful.

Jesus teaches that He is the Bread of Life, the food that will forever sustain those who believe in Him. The multiplication of the loaves is the fourth sign that appears in the Gospel according to John and it is the only miracle found in all four gospels - occurring twice in Mark and Matthew. Unlike his disciples, Jesus was not concerned about how this huge crowd was to be fed. When Jesus asks about “where” to buy food to satisfy the hunger of the large crowd He is not thinking about a market. He is really asking a question about who He is. Jesus knows full well that the “where” of the food will be himself. Dismissing Philip’s response, Andrew tells Jesus about a boy with a measly five barley loaves and two fish – offering to share all that he has. Jesus took the bread, gave thanks, and distributed it to over five thousand people. When the crowd realized that everyone had been fed and there were still leftovers, they were astounded. Jesus said to the disciples “Gather the fragments left over, so that nothing will be wasted.” Twelve wicker baskets were filled with fragments from the five barley loaves. John does not say if any fish were left over. He is interested in recalling the bread as a symbol of the Eucharist. Jesus makes a claim only God can make: He is the true Bread of Life that can satisfy the deepest hunger we experience. He gives more than we need for ourselves that we may have something to share with others. Every time when we gather here at our Church at God’s table we become nourished by Jesus’ word and His Body. This is our special food for our life’s journey.

This Friday, July 31<sup>st</sup>, we celebrate the Memorial of St. Ignatius of Loyola. St. Ignatius was the founder and first Father General of the Society of Jesus, or Jesuits. Born in Spain, he joined the Army and was severely wounded in battle. While recovering he read about the life of Christ and the lives of the saints and decided to emulate them. He and six companions became the first Jesuits. He taught his brothers to be indifferent to poverty and riches. Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, the first Jesuit Pope is known for his humility, his concern for the poor and living a simple life. In the second reading today, Paul encourages the Ephesians to live as God calls them to live. We, too, are called to be humble, gentle, patient, to treat others with love, and live in peace and unity.

Let us also remember and pray for the all those who defend our country on a daily basis and for those soldiers who lost their lives recently protecting our freedom.
