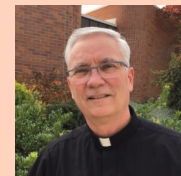
## FIRST FRIDAY HOLY HOUR NOVEMBER 2

## A Word from Father...



Dear Friends,

Planning on heading out into the night on All Hallows Eve? Be sure to stop by my house because I will be giving out *FULL SIZE CANDY BARS*, not just those iddy-biddy miniatures so many other houses pass out to the goblins and ghosts that come knocking at their doors!

I like Halloween for all kinds of reasons. Perhaps first and foremost are the warm memories of my siblings and I happily dressing up as hobos (burned cork rubbed on our faces gave us our beards and we had plenty of worn clothes sitting in the big box next to the Pfaff sewing machine to complete our raggedy outfits!), grabbing a pillow-case and working the streets from our neighborhood on out a couple miles until it got to be 11:00 pm and time to head home, our pillowcases slung over our shoulders holding more delicious loot than any real hobo could ever have hoped for. If I was careful in its daily consumption, I could make it last until almost Christmas!

But I also like Halloween for its *meaning*: just about everyone who knows something about the Christian origins of the feast knows that "Halloween" is the contraction of "All Hallows Eve", "All Hallows" being, of course, old fashion English for "All Saints." Held within that name is also the succeeding day of remembrance of our own beloved dead on November 2nd, All Souls Day. It is part and parcel of our Catholic tradition that we not just remember our saints and our beloved dead, but that in the remembering, we proclaim the foundational truth of our faith: Christ is risen from the dead...and invites us to tag along on his glorious robes into the beyond and life everlasting.

So much of what remains of the Halloween feast now has devolved into just silly dressing up as skeletons and grim reapers, goblins or ghosts, witches and warlocks, not to mention the occasional super-hero or axe-murderer. Some Christians get upset at this, but not me. I think the Halloween festivities with their haunted houses and carousing phantoms of death have a wonderful place in our faith tradition for they are actually mocking what they portray. Halloween helps us proclaim life over death by making death and all things evil stupid and powerless. Underneath those masks and costumes are children, the primordial symbol of innocence and what they receive by way of candy from their adult neighbors symbolizes abounding grace, free and delicious and the antidote to human selfishness, arrogance, anger, and revenge. The costumes of Halloween have never been meant to actually scare us, we all know there are kids beneath them, they are meant to make us laugh at death and mayhem and evil in any of its many forms...because God is good and he graciously and generously shares that goodness with us all...including the biggest "good" of all: the Resurrection and Christ's victory over sin and death!

*Happy Halloween, everyone!*
