## A Word from Father...



Dear Friends,

It is very good to be home! Thank you for your welcome back...and for your prayers for our parish mission in Cortez, Colorado. They really appreciated knowing that they had your prayerful support throughout our week together!

While I was away, word arrived that a good friend had passed into God's gracious hands. Cardinal Godfried Danneels served as archbishop of the Brussels-Mechelen Archdiocese from 1979 until his retirement ten years ago. Since Leuven (Louvain), where our American College seminary was located, was within the Archdiocese, I met with Cardinal Danneels often during my years as Vice-Rector and Rector of the American College. Each fall, we would bring our new seminarians to his home, where he would graciously greet us and spend time chatting with them about whatever they wanted to ask him. I remember one seminarian asking him how he relaxed with so much on his plate day in and day out; he responded that he listens to music at the end of the day. He was then asked,



“What kind of music?” He responded something like: “Well, it depends. When I am ready for bed, I listen to Bach, Vivaldi, or Handel because the beat of their music is the same as the human heart and so it calms me and helps me to sleep. Earlier in the day when I need energy, I listen to Beethoven or Mozart. When I am feeling sad, I

listen to jazz and the blues because this music was composed by people who were oppressed and so it is filled with human longing and hope. When I am feeling happy, I listen to Elvis Presley.” That got a laugh from our young seminarians! He also told them that the Church offers to the world, even the secular world, a rich experience of beauty, and it is through beauty that many people find their way to God. “Attend to the beautiful in your ministry,” he encourage them.

Whenever I needed his support, he was always ready to offer it without hesitation. He often visited our seminary, joined us for special celebrations, and took time to speak with our students about the situation of the Church in an increasingly secularized world. He always spoke about the Church with immense hope for the future and great reverence for the past and its traditions.

When my years in Belgium were coming to an end, I was presented with a lovely letter from Cardinal Danneels, which is now framed and hanging in my office here. It is a reminder of a true pastor of the Church who combined theological acumen and a shepherd's heart to make the Church a place where we human beings with all our faults and failings could find a home in Christ's heart.

*Cardinal Danneels: may you live now in the fullness of beauty that is the heart of Christ!*
