Psalm 27 "The Lord is my light and my salvation."

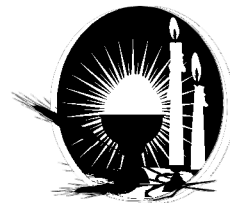
Philippians 3:27-4:1 or 3:20-4:1 Christ will change our lowly body to conform with his glorified body.

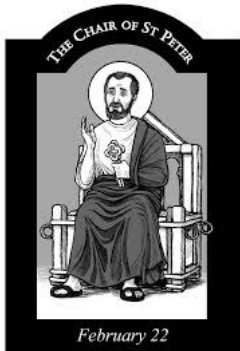

Feast of the Chair of Saint Peter, February 22: The Feast of the Chair of St. Peter celebrates the papacy and St. Peter as the first bishop of Rome. St. Peter's original name was Simon. He was married with children and was living and working in Capernaum as a fisherman when Jesus called him to be one of the Twelve Apostles. Jesus bestowed to Peter a special place among the Apostles. He was one of the three who were with Christ on special occasions, such as the Transfiguration of Christ and the Agony in the Garden of Gethsemane. He was the only Apostle to whom Christ appeared on the first day



after the Resurrection. Peter, in turn, often spoke on behalf of the Apostles. When Jesus asked the Apostles: "Whom do men say that the Son of Man is?" Simon replied: "Thou art Christ, the Son of the Living God." And Jesus said: "Blessed are you, Simon Bar-Jona: because flesh and blood have not revealed it to you, but my Father who is in heaven. And I say to you: That you are Peter [Cephas, a rock], and upon this rock [Cephas] I will build my Church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. And I will give to you the keys of the kingdom of heaven. And whatsoever you shall bind upon earth, it shall be bound also in heaven: and whatsoever you shall loose on earth, it shall be loosed also in heaven". (Mt 16:13-20) In saying this Jesus made St. Peter the head of the entire community of believers and placed the spiritual guidance of the faithful in St. Peter's hands. However, St. Peter was not without faults. He was rash and reproached often by Christ. He had fallen asleep in the Garden of Gethsemane instead of praying, as Jesus had asked him to do. He

also denied knowing Jesus three times after Christ's arrest. Peter delivered the first public sermon after the Pentecost and won a large number of converts. He also performed many miracles and defended the freedom of the Apostles to preach the Gospels. He preached in Jerusalem, Judaea, and as far north as Syria. He was arrested in Jerusalem under Herod Agrippa I, but miraculously escaped execution. He left Jerusalem and eventually went to Rome, where he preached during the last portion of his life. He was crucified there, head downwards, as he had desired to suffer, saying that he did not deserve to die as Christ had died. The date of St. Peter's death is not clear. Historians estimate he was executed between the years 64 and 68. His remains now rest beneath the altar of St. Peter's Basilica in Rome.

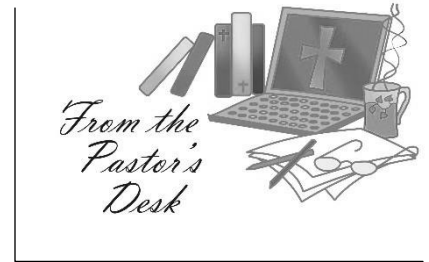

Sundry Items



An Ash Wednesday Misunderstanding: Ash Wednesday is not and never has been a Holy Day of Obligation. Neither is it a holy day without the obligation. It is the beginning of the Lenten Season and as such has prominence over any other church feast. But again it is not a day with any obligation. That is why, when some people were wondering to each other or asking the priests why there wasn't an evening Holy Mass for the day... since Ash Wednesday is not a holy day of obligation, there should be a noticeable difference between the regular Sunday Mass and Holy Day Mass schedules. Also, as the other days of Lent are also not holy days with an obligation, adding an extra evening Holy Mass is not a necessity and should be further considered in light of Cardinal Dolan's directive that each parish as a part of *Making All Things New* should reevaluate its Holy Mass Schedule and consider pairing down. Our parish use to have the extra evening Holy Mass. Our parish also use to have three priests – now we have two, Father Anthony and I. Father Morris, because of his assignment as Archivist for the Archdiocese, cannot take a daily, Monday through Friday, Holy Mass. I did some further investigation among our neighboring parishes, St's Bartholomew, John the Baptist, Ann, Anthony, Matthew, Our Lady of Fatima, Pompeii, Perpetual Help, Annunciation, & Sacred Heart's, Dobbs & Hartsdale, and they do not have an evening Holy Mass during Lent either. I am not saying that because they don't we shouldn't, but the essence of our faith is Sacrifice, not convenience. If you wish to make a Sacrifice, Saint Eugene has daily 6:45 and 9:00 AM Holy Masses. I look forward to praying with you.

The Holy Mass in the Extraordinary Form: After much prayer and consultation, the parish schedule for Holy Masses will remain as they currently are published – Saturday 5:00PM & Sunday 8:00 & 10:00 AM, 12:00 & 6:00PM.

Altar Cloths: The designs are completed for the Altar Table and the back of the Tabernacle table. The Colors are White (Christmas & Easter Seasons), Red (Pentecost, Martyrs & the Holy Spirit), Green (Ordinary Time outside of Christmas, Easter, Advent & Lent), and Purple (Advent & Lent). If you would like to memorialize an Altar Covering or Tabernacle Banner, please call the rectory and speak with me or Ms Mastrangelo as soon as possible as there is much interest.

Tabernacle Coverings: A question came up regarding putting cloths of different colors over the tabernacle, and whether WHITE was the only one allowed. In the old days, the covering or veil over the tabernacle was the only outward sign that the Holy Eucharist was present, not the Sanctuary Candle. This goes back to the Old Testament when there was a curtain separating the Holy of Holies from the other courts in the Temple of Jerusalem because of the belief in the presence of God in the Ark of Covenant. When Tabernacles were built into marble altars, there was only a veil in front. When they became free standing as in our church the designed changed to cover the entire tabernacle. As the Altar Candle became prominent because of the Code of Canon Law, #940, "*A special lamp which indicates and honors the presence of Christ is to shine continually before a tabernacle in which the Most Holy Eucharist is reserved,*" veils have fallen into disuse. This is also true as tabernacles have become more ornate. Whether or not the tabernacle can be covered only by white, my research has found that the only color not be used is black, the color of death. Finally, the panels for our church are more like banners which will be placed on the back side of the tabernacle table, not on the tabernacle itself.

Altar Candles: In an effort to again save money, we are changing the type of candles (not candle sticks which have been and will continue to be used) that are used on the altar table, beside the tabernacle and in the Adoration Chapel. As you look at them, they are or can be inserts into other candle forms. Each "candle" has a life of approximately 11 hours and is then discarded. The cost for a 6 month supply of these "candles" is \$2,700.00, \$5,400/year. We have purchased four refillable candles for the Altar and Tabernacle for a total one time cost of \$266.00. The cost of the liquid to refill these candles for the next six months is \$78.00, \$156/year.

The Kneelers: There has been some chatter or properly categorized, *gossip*, that "Father Fernan doesn't want anybody to kneel while receiving Holy Communion." Isn't "chatter" usually either unproductive or in most cases harmful? In a number of forums, I have explained that with a bad back it is painful to hand out Holy Communion over a kneeler to one who is not kneeling. So I will push the kneeler to the side so that the priest is equally between the two columns of people who are approaching to receive Our Blessed Lord. If any person wishes to receive kneeling all they need to do is either move to the line with the kneeler or just cross to the kneeler when it is their turn. Also, liturgically, the kneeler should never be an obstruction to the Procession or Recession of the Altar Servers, Lectors or Clergy. No one should have to go around a kneeler as this gives the message that the kneeler is more important than any of the ministers, lay or ordained, during the Holy Mass.
