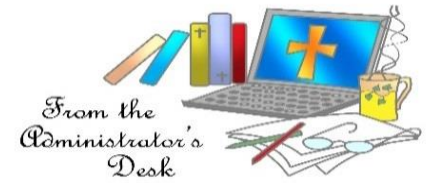
SUNDAY MASS & VACATION

Dear Parishioners



I know that last week I said it would be our last bulletin pages due to summer vacation, but please allow me to share with you some information about Father James Smyth, a retired SMA priest. (Society of African



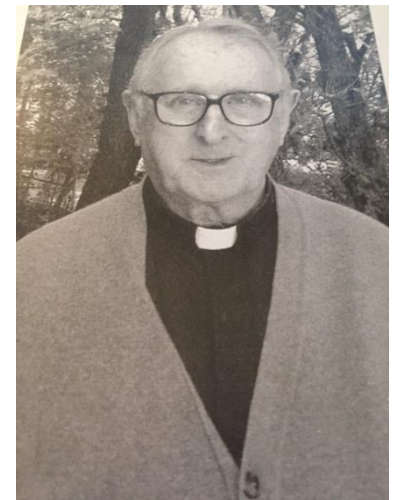
Missions) I met Fr Smyth when I joined the parish of Saint Matthew 31 years ago. At the time Father was known by all and was the beloved old priest, he was 62.

Father Smyth was born in Ireland in the county of Longford, the eldest son of eight boys and four girls. He completed high school and served as a cooper and in time became a master cooper. He worked with his father and brothers in this trade. Father was very dedicated to our Blessed Mother and became an active member of the Legion of Mary. After a great deal of thought and discussions with his family he left the

family business and went into the seminary of the Society of African Missions and was ordained a priest on December 18, 1956 at age 34.

From 1957- 1971 Fr. Smyth worked as a pastor in the Diocese of Jos in the northern corner of Nigeria. He used his skills as a tradesman and farmer to establish schools and training centers. He designed and led a team of villagers in the area in building a dam and pipeline and provided the first fresh water to the village. He was instrumental in bringing many people in the area into the Catholic faith and to the sacraments. Father always said this was the best part of his priesthood. In 1971 Father was involved in a serious motorcycle accident and was assigned to heal in the United States. On February 18, 1978 Father was assigned to Saint Matthew Church in Hastings for a 3 month period and has been there ever since. He was a fixture in the school, Fire Chaplain and dedicated to the ill in hospitals and nursing homes. He was the main celebrant for many years at the Andrus on Hudson Nursing home serving the Saturday afternoon Mass. About 10 years ago Father Smyth started having some health issues. I was blessed and lucky enough to be asked by him to be his health care proxy. In all his illnesses he never slowed down. Up until five years ago he was still driving and if he heard someone was ill or needed an anointing he was in the car faster than anyone.

Last Friday the day before he passed we had a wonderful visit. As I was leaving he said in only a voice that he would use, "You know Gina, my 60th anniversary is coming up in December, and you must start planning." I am telling you this brief story my parishioners for two reasons; please pray for vocations, Father Smyth was the epitome of a priest, he was dedicated to God the Almighty and his Mother. He always had his rosaries in his pocket and would be the first to say, let's pray to Our Blessed Mother, the other is this please look after your family members as they are aging. Check on neighbors or assist in driving them to the doctor, it is ministry in itself to help one another. I was blessed and honored to call him Father and friend. I will miss him very much, but I know that he is with the Almighty praying for all of us. Please keep him and all of his family members in your prayers.

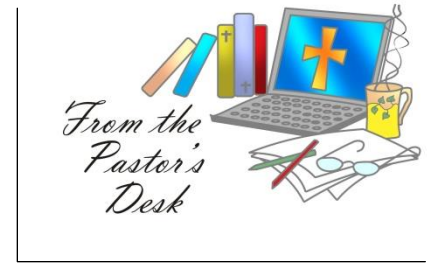

THE BLESINGS OF A SENIOR PRIEST

“It was fitting that we should have such a high priest: holy, innocent, undefiled, separated from sinners, higher than the heavens. He has no need, as did the high priests, to offer sacrifice day after day, first for his own sins and then for those of the people; he did that once for all when he offered himself. For the law appoints men subject to weakness to be high priests, but the word of the oath, which was taken after the law, appoints a son, who has been made perfect forever.” (Hebrews 7:26-28)



[As Ms. Mastrangelo explained in her column, we don't usually have our pages for the summer months, however, the events of this past week warrant a diversion from the norm.]

When I was a seminarian, I was blessed to be assigned to Saint Margaret, Pearl River, with the pastor, Msgr. James Doyle, may he rest in peace. At that time, he was just Fr. Doyle... but whether Msgr. or Fr., the lessons he taught were just as important. Fr. Doyle had a retired priest living with him, Msgr. John McKenna. What a blessing Msgr. McKenna was to the parish as he exercised his ministry, in a limited way due to physical ailments, and what a blessing he was to me as he lived the *Dying on the Cross* in his daily life. Msgr. Doyle made that possible by giving Msgr. McKenna a home.

When I was assigned as pastor to Saint Matthew, Hastings on Hudson, the parish was blessed to have a not-yet-retired but Senior Priest, Fr. James Smyth, as the Parochial Assistant. Now *I* was the pastor with a Senior Priest. The next ten years Fr. Smyth continued to serve the parish were a blessing to Saint Matthew, the Administrator and Staff of the parish, Hastings on Hudson and me. As we were planning Fr. Smyth's 50 Anniversary of his Ordination to the Sacred Priesthood of Jesus Christ, we learned so much of his life before Saint Matthew, before the USA, before Nigeria... all the way back to Ireland. All those stories were delightful but the daily moments given to us in the rectory were life lessons that we... I had a chance to re-learn, recalling the summer months with Msgr. James Doyle and his Senior Priest, Msgr. John McKenna.

Fr. Smyth wasn't the only Senior Priest Saint Matthew was blessed with. As Fr. Smyth was getting older, a dear and compassionate soul, Msgr. Frank Gorman was just retiring from his "active" priesthood as the Pastor of Saint Teresa of Avila and Holy Cross, Sleepy Hollow. When asked if he wanted to continue with Sunday Ministry in Saint Matthew, Msgr. Gorman jumped at the chance to serve the Holy People of God. He continues in his active ministry right up to this very day.

It is said by the retired priests... "I am busier now that I have retired..." because now I can concentrate on just the ministry and leave all the business to others. These Senior Priests are a blessing because they have so many life lessons in the hearts. They have lived through Baptisms, Communions, Confirmations, Marriages, Divorces and Deaths... all within so many families. They have continued to live out that selfless calling of bringing God to the good and holy people who are lost and searching for the Divine. Pray that we at Saint Eugene may be so blessed as to be given the gift of a Senior Priest... loving God and serving His people.

Finally, please understand, that as the ministry of the priest did not cease with his retirement, so does it not cease with his death. As Jesus Christ is "*high priest: holy, innocent, undefiled, separated from sinners, higher than the heavens,*" because of His Priesthood that we share... all priests and in this case Fr. Smyth who was called home to God... "*You are a priest forever according to the order of Melchizedek.*" (Hebrews 7:17) Therefore, Fr. Smyth, Msgr. John McKenna, Msgr. James Doyle and countless others, please God, are continuing their ministry from their heavenly reward.

God love you... Father Fernan
