THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Isaiah 8:23-9:3 "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light."

Psalm 27 "The Lord is my light and my salvation."

1 Corinthians 1:10-13, 17 Let there be no divisions among you.

Matthew 4:12-23 or 4:12-17 Andrew and Peter abandon their nets to follow the Lord.

Our first reading from Isaiah sounds as if we were still in the Christmas season: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light." But paired with today's Gospel, which repeats that phrase, it makes a powerful prelude to the beginning of Jesus' public ministry and the calling of the first apostles. Jesus' response to John the Baptist's arrest is to begin his announcement of the Kingdom of Heaven. How can today's word of God help us to respond to adversity?

Dear Parishioners:

March for Life: This year's March for Life in Washington DC will be on Friday, January 27, 2017, marking the 44th anniversary of the legalization of abortion in our land through the tragic *Roe v. Wade* decision. Immediately following the 9:00 mass in Saint Eugene Church on Friday morning we will lay flowers at the memorial for the unborn which is located at the chapel entrance. Adoration will be in the church throughout the day with spiritual readings and the rosary. We will culminate the day with Mass for the unborn at 7:30 pm.



Our Lady of Guadalupe, we turn to you who are the protectress of unborn children and ask that you intercede for us, so that we may more firmly resolve to join you in protecting all human life. Let our prayers be united to your perpetual motherly intercession on behalf of those whose lives are threatened, be they in the womb of their mother, on the bed of infirmity, or in the latter years of their life. May our prayers also be coupled with peaceful action which witnesses to the goodness and dignity of all human life, so that our firmness of purpose may give courage to those who are fearful and bring light to those who are blinded by sin. Encourage those who are involved in the March for Life; help them to walk closely with God and to give voice to the cry of the oppressed, in order to remind our nation of its commitment to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness for all people. O Virgin Mother of God, present our petitions to your Son and ask Him to bless us with abundant life. Amen.

The Conversion of Saint Paul - January 25 Paul's entire life can be explained in terms of one experience his meeting with Jesus on the road to Damascus. In an instant, he saw that all the zeal of his dynamic personality was being wasted, like the strength of a boxer swinging wildly. Perhaps he had never seen Jesus, who was only a few years older. But he had acquired a zealot's hatred of all Jesus stood for, as he began to harass the Church: "...entering house after house and dragging out men and women, he handed them over for imprisonment" (Acts 8:3b). Now he himself was "entered," possessed, all his energy harnessed to one goal being a slave of Christ in the ministry of reconciliation, an instrument to help others experience the one Savior. One sentence determined his theology: "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting" (Acts 9:5b). Jesus was mysteriously identified with the loving group of people Saul had been running down like criminals. Jesus, he saw, was the mysterious fulfillment of all he had been blindly pursuing. From then on, his only work was to "present everyone perfect in Christ. For this I labor and struggle, in accord with the exercise of his power working within me" (Colossians 1:28b-29). "For our gospel did not come to you in word alone, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with much conviction" (1 Thessalonians 1:5a). Paul's life became tireless proclaiming and living out of the message of the cross: Christians die baptismally to sin and are buried with Christ; they are dead to all that is sinful and unredeemed in the world. They are made into a new creation, already sharing Christ's victory and someday to rise from the dead like him. Through this risen Christ the Father pours out the Spirit on them, making them completely new.



So Paul's great message to the world was: You are saved entirely by God, not by anything you can do. Saving faith is the gift of total, free, personal and loving commitment to Christ, a commitment that then bears fruit in more "works" than the Law could ever contemplate. - from the USCCB

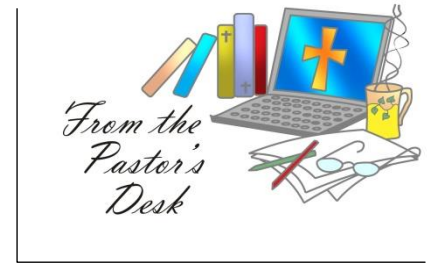

Eucharist Heart of Jesus Litany – Part 4

“Heart of Jesus in the Eucharist, sweet companion of our exile, I adore You.”

In our previous meditation we were endeavoring to understand the Heart of the Divine, The Divine Heart of Jesus. We saw that Sacred Scripture does not specifically reference “the heart of God” or God’s heart,” but through the teaching of the Hypostatic Union, “everything in Christ’s human nature is to be attributed to His divine person,” we should look more closely at the words of the Savior in order to understand the Heart of the Divine.



“Jesus summoned His disciples and said, **“My heart is moved with pity for the crowd, for they have been with Me now for three days and have nothing to eat. I do not want to send them away hungry, for fear they may collapse on the way.”** (Matthew 15:32, Mark 8:2) When Christ is speaking, He refers to His own heart feeling “pity” towards the people following Him. This is not the only time Jesus reveals the His heart in this way...

- “At the sight of the crowds, His heart was **moved with pity** for them because they were troubled and abandoned, like sheep without a shepherd.” (Matthew 9:27)
- “When He disembarked and saw the vast crowd, His heart was **moved with pity** for them, and He cured their sick.” (14:14)
- “**Moved with pity**, Jesus touched their eyes. Immediately they received their sight, and followed Him.” (20:24)
- “**Moved with pity**, He stretched out His hand, touched him, and said to him, “I do will it. Be made clean.” (Mark 1:41)
- “When He disembarked and saw the vast crowd, **His heart was moved with pity** for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd; and He began to teach them many things.” (Mark 6:34)
- “When the Lord saw her, **He was moved with pity** for her and said to her, “Do not weep.” (Luke 7:13)

Pity, as defined by Harper’s Bible Dictionary, is “a quality due to which a person does some significant kindness to another in need, notably when that other has no right to the kindness and cannot repay it. The quality inheres in a person’s eyes and/or heart and is revealed by what a person does in behalf of others in need. One who acts out of pity is said to be compassionate or gracious. Such pity is a quality of God.” In the quotes above we see that Jesus exercised this divine notion of pity. There are also many moments in Sacred Scripture in which the Holy People of God look to Jesus seeking Divine Pity...

- “And as Jesus passed on from there, two blind men followed Him, crying out, “Son of David, **have pity on us.**” (Matthew 9:27)
- “And behold, a Canaanite woman of that district came and called out, “**Have pity on me, Lord, Son of David! My daughter is tormented by a demon.**” (Matthew 15:22)
- A man... “said, “Lord, **have pity on my son**, for he is a lunatic and suffers severely; often he falls into fire, and often into water.” (Matthew 17:15)
- “On hearing that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to cry out and say, “Jesus, son of David, **have pity on me.**” And many rebuked him, telling him to be silent. But he kept calling out all the more, “Son of David, **have pity on me.**” (Mark 10:47-8)

Through this well established relationship, founded in the Old Testament (Deuteronomy 7:16, 19:13, 21, Psalm 17:10, Psalm 111:4-9, Exodus 34:19, Psalm 103:8, 13), of the Holy People of God calling upon the Divine, we see a “heartfelt” conversation between Creator and created which reveals both. The Holy People of God, even though undeserving and unable to repay, are confident in the love of God. The Divine One, the Almighty, the Creator, has not abandoned His creations but constantly actively seeks out His lost Sheep... “What man among you having a hundred sheep and losing one of them would not leave the ninety-nine in the desert and go after the lost one until he finds it? And when he does find it, he sets it on his shoulders with great joy and, upon his arrival home, he calls together his friends and neighbors and says to them, ‘Rejoice with me because I have found my lost sheep.’” (Luke 15:4-6)
