## LENT

**Ash Wednesday is March 1<sup>st</sup>** Ashes will be distributed at 6:45AM & 9AM Holy Masses as well as at the 4:00PM & 7:00PM Services.

**Stations of the Cross:** Friday's immediately following 9:00AM Mass (unless a funeral is scheduled at 10AM) and Friday's at 7:00PM.

**Lenten Fast and Abstinence** - During the season of Lent, the Church urges the faithful to reflect a spirit of penance in their daily lives through performing acts of faith and abstinence.

**Fasting** requires that only one full meal be taken per day. Two other smaller meals may be taken during the day to maintain physical strength, but these two meals together should not equal a full meal in quantity nor is there eating between meals. Fasting obliges all those who have reached the age of 18 and continues to oblige through age 59. Those who are not specifically obliged to fast are encouraged to join in the discipline of fasting to the extent that they are able.

**Abstinence** prohibits individuals from eating meat on a particular day. Abstinence obliges all those who have reached the age of 14 and continues to oblige throughout their lives. Those who are not specifically obliged to abstain from eating meat are encouraged to join in the discipline of abstaining to the extent that they are able.

**Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of Fast and Abstinence. Fridays in Lent are days of Abstinence.**

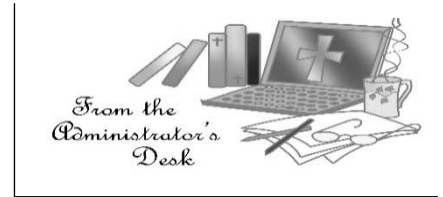

Dear Parishioners;

Ash Wednesday, March 1<sup>st</sup>: Many have asked: what is Ash Wednesday, why do we have ashes on our foreheads, and do we have to receive? The official name is ***The Day of Ashes***. It is called Ash Wednesday because, being forty days before Good Friday, it always falls on a Wednesday and because on that day at Church the faithful have

their foreheads marked with the sign of the cross with ashes. The symbol of ashes or cross is because in the Bible a mark on the forehead such as this is a symbol of a person's ownership. By having our foreheads marked with the sign of the cross, it symbolizes that we belong to Jesus Christ, who died on the cross. This is in imitation of the spiritual mark or seal that is put on us in Baptism, Confirmation and Last Rites; "when he is delivered from slavery to sin and the devil and made a slave of righteousness and Christ". (Rom.6:3-18). **Receiving Ashes is not required.** However, it

is to be strongly encouraged as it is a fitting and visible spiritual reminder that encourages one to adopt an attitude of prayer, repentance, and humility. As Saint James has said, "*Humble yourselves before the Lord, and He will lift you up.*" (James 4:10) Let us remember that if we want to receive all that our Lord has for us we must participate, and we must open our hearts and minds to Him.

***Ashes will be distributed at the 6:45AM & 9AM Holy Masses as well as at 4:00PM & 7:00PM Services.***

***Altar Server Practice:*** The next Altar Server Practice will be held on Thursday, March 2<sup>nd</sup> at 4:00 in the church.

***Renew & Rebuild:*** The *Renew & Rebuild Campaign* has begun in our Parish. This weekend is our in-pew appeal. Our Parish goal is 1,200,000.00. As of today we have \$550,000.00 in pledges. Please pray and join us in the very important parish initiative. We will have a meeting this Thursday, March 2 at 7:00pm in the church to explain the campaign and the needs of our church.

***Sacrament of Reconciliation:*** Next, Saturday, March 4th our second grade children and older children in our religious education program as well as the children from our school will be receiving the sacrament of Reconciliation. ***Religious Education Lenten Project:*** Lent is the season of preparation for Easter. It starts on Ash Wednesday and ends on Spy Wednesday, lasting for 40 days. We prepare for Easter by fasting and practicing spiritual discipline during this time, to reflect on his sacrifices. Basically, Lent is a time for "Spring Cleaning" our lives while giving thanks to God and strengthening our relationship with him. 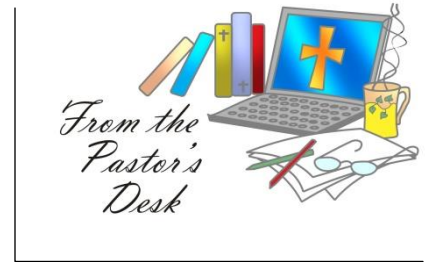

*Remember the saying... If the Priest is a saint, his people will be holy. If the Priest is holy, his people will be good. If the Priest is good, his people will be fair. If the Priest is fair, his people will be mediocre. If the Priest is mediocre, his people will be bad.*

Beloved of God,

Lent is upon us. Ash Wednesday is in a few days.

Our Parish Administrator, Gina Mastrangelo, has the following in her column today.



*If the Priest is a saint, his people will be holy.  
If the Priest is holy, his people will be good.  
If the Priest is good, his people will be fair.  
If the Priest is fair, his people will be mediocre.  
If the Priest is mediocre, his people will be bad.*

What is a saint? “**1A.** A person officially recognized as being entitled to public veneration and capable of interceding for people on earth. **B.** A person who has died and gone to heaven. **2.** An extraordinarily religious person enjoying a special relationship with God. **3.** An extremely virtuous person.”

What is holy? “**1.** Of, derived from, or associated with a divine power; sacred. **2.** Regarded with or worthy of worship or veneration; revered. **3.** Living according to a strict or highly moral religious or spiritual system; saintly.”

What is good? “**1.** Being positive or desirable in nature; not bad or poor. **2.A.** Having the qualities that are desirable or distinguishing in a particular thing. **B.** Serving the desired purpose or end; suitable. **3. A.** Not spoiled or rotten.”

What is fair? “**9.** Moderately good; mildly satisfying. **10.** Superficially true or appealing; specious.”

What is mediocre? “Moderate to inferior in quality; ordinary.”

All the definitions above are supplied by *The American Heritage College Dictionary*, 3<sup>rd</sup> edition, which its preface states the following, “*The American Heritage dictionaries are attentive to the heritage of the English language and of the English dictionaries... the ideal dictionary takes full advantage of the resources of the present while at the same time carrying on the traditions of the past, reflecting the very pattern we see in language itself.*”

Don't the above definitions seem, in the sense of the God, the Church, the faith and the priesthood, seem lacking. Living and growing up in the faith, we all have a sense of what it means for a priest to be saintly & holy and then from good to mediocre. In the last ten years we have sadly seen when the priest has even been bad and malicious. (For this I again apologize for all those who were abused and are still suffering.)

There are two things that we must take from the above: (1) the relationship between the increasing or decreasing holiness of the priest and the increasing or decreasing holiness of the people he was called to serve, and (2) the lack of terminology that society uses to judge and effective leader. Number two first... “*Jesus summoned them (the Apostles) and said to them, "You know that those who are recognized as rulers over the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones make their authority over them felt. But it shall not be so among you. Rather, whoever wishes to be great among you will be your servant; whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all..."* (Mark 10:42-44) The priest has not been called to be a great administrator, general contractor, financial officer, singer, orator, plant manager, entertainer or social life director. The priest is called to “*be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect.*” (Matthew 5:48) Knowing the commission given me by the Almighty and my responsibility to all of you... especially as the Season of Lent, the season of renewal and rededication, is upon us, I will strive each and every day to become a *saint* so that you, the holy people of God entrusted to me as your pastor *will be holy.*
