We also remember the families of our troops, and ask for Your unique blessings to fill their homes and Your peace, provision and strength to fill their lives. May the members of our armed forces be filled with courage to face each day and may they trust in the Lord's mighty power to accomplish each task. Let our military brothers and sisters feel our love and support. Amen.

The Visitation of the Blessed Mother, May 31: The visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary is the visit of Mary with Elizabeth as recorded in the Gospel of Luke (LK 1:39-56) It is also the name of Christian Feast Day commemorating this visit, celebrated on May 31st in the west and March 30 in the east. Mary visits her relative Elizabeth; they are both pregnant. Mary is pregnant with Jesus and Elizabeth is pregnant with John the Baptist. Mary left Nazareth immediately after the Annunciation and went "into the hill country...into the city of Judah" (Lk 1:39) to attend her cousin Elizabeth. There are several possibilities as to exactly which city this was, including Hebron, south of Jerusalem, and Ein Karem. The journey was about 100 miles, and Elizabeth was in her sixth month before Mary arrived. (Lk 1:36) Mary stayed three months and departed just before John was born. Catholics believe that the purpose of this visit was to bring divine grace to both Elizabeth and her unborn child. Even though he was still in his mother's womb, John became aware of the presence of his Divine Saviour; he leapt for joy as he was cleansed from original sin and filled with divine grace. Elizabeth also responded and recognized the presence of Jesus. Thus Mary, now for the first time, exercised her function as mediatrix between God and



man. Elizabeth remarks to Mary: "And she spoke with a loud voice and said, blessed art thou among women and blessed is the fruit of thy womb. And whence is this to me that the mother of my Lord should come to me? For, lo, as soon as the voice of thy salutation sounded in mine ears, the babe leaped in my womb for joy. And blessed is she that believed: for there shall be a performance of those things which were told her from the Lord (Luke 1:42-55). It is also at this point, in response to Elizabeth's remark, that Mary proclaims the Magnificat (My soul doth magnify the Lord), (Luke 1:45-55), for which reason this canticle had traditionally been reserved for this feast day. – *from the USCCB.*

Feast of Saint Eugene, June 2: Eugene I was a Roman priest who had held various positions in the Church and was known for his charity and his sanctity. He was consecrated Pope on August 10, 654, while his predecessor, Pope St. Martin I, was still alive (he died on September 6), an exile and prisoner in the Crimea by order of Monothelite Emperor Constans II. Martin is reported to have approved the election, but many believed Eugene was a puppet of Constans. Eugene soon asserted his independence by refusing the Emperor's demands that he acknowledge Peter as Patriarch of Constantinople and allow toleration of the Monothelites. Constans was furious, and only the capture of Rhodes by the Moslems in 654 and their defeat of Constans at the naval battle of Phoenix in 655 saved Eugene from sharing the fate of his predecessor. Nothing more is known of Eugene except that he consecrated twenty-one bishops for different parts of the world, and that he was buried in Basilica. He died in 657 and was acclaimed a saint, his day being the 2nd of June.

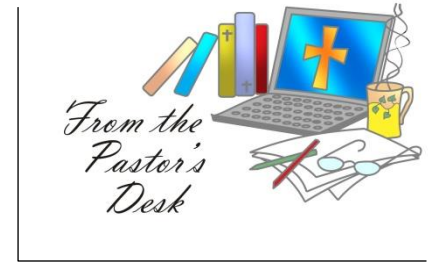

Beloved of God,

Eucharist Heart of Jesus Litany – Part 6C

“Heart of Jesus in the Eucharist, sweet companion of our exile, I adore You.”



In the previous meditation we were able to establish by sources outside the Sacred Scriptures the physical reality of Jesus the Nazarene. The introductory paragraph from the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) then takes the this established fact and initiates for us a conversion in our minds and souls of seeing Jesus as not only human but also divine.

1373 “Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised from the dead, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us,” is present in many ways to His Church... But “He is present . . . most especially in the Eucharistic species.”²⁰⁰

The Church is asking us to *move from fact to faith*. “Hebrews 11:1 gives a simple and elegant definition of faith: “Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.” Saint Thomas Aquinas in the *Summa Theologiae* (II.II.q2.a.9) gave us the classic theological definition of faith: Faith is the act of the intellect when it assents to divine truth under the influence of the will moved by God through grace.” (Catholic Bible Dictionary pp.277-8) This has been the challenge from the beginning. Recall Nicodemus’ visit with Jesus... “*Now there was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a ruler of the Jews. He came to Jesus at night and said to Him, “Rabbi, we know that You are a teacher who has come from God, for no one can do these signs that You are doing unless God is with Him.” Jesus answered and said to him, “Amen, amen, I say to you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above.” Nicodemus said to Him, “How can a person once grown old be born again? Surely he cannot reenter his mother’s womb and be born again, can he?”* (John 3:1-4) Recall as well the *Bread of Life Discourse*... “*The Jews murmured about Him because He said, “I am the bread that came down from heaven... The Jews quarreled among themselves, saying, “How can this man give us His flesh to eat?”* (John 6:41-43, 52)

The challenge the Church is offering to us is to move from the practical to the fantastic as well as going beyond the skepticism that normally accompanies the unusual or the different. The challenge is to have faith, a faith that moves us from being individuals living lives of self-interests to becoming and being a community that gathers because of a belief or “conviction of things not seen...;” a community that not only believes in a god but believes in the One True God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit; a community that not only believes in the One True God, but also believes in the Son of God, “*who, though He was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, He emptied Himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness; and found human in appearance, He humbled Himself, becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross...;*” (Philippians 2:6-8) a community that not only believes in the Human and Divine Nature of Our Savior, Jesus of Nazareth, but one that believes that same Jesus, who “*while they were eating (Jesus) took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and giving it to His disciples said, “Take and eat; this is My body...”* (Matthew 26:26) “is present... most especially in the Eucharistic Species.”

Jesus is most truly present under the form of bread and wine.

What an awesome gift is our faith.
