

- d) Resolve in this year of national challenge to strive to elect the best person that represents all of the above and more by exercising our mind, voice and ballot in Novembe4r 2016.

If we can achieve a beginning to this process in January 2016 we will certainly celebrate in 2017 movement forward, however miniscule, to a nation of renewed compassion, justice and freedom.

The following article by Archbishop William E. Lori of Baltimore and Supreme Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus in <u>Columbia</u> magazine entitled "A Renewed Vision of Religious Freedom" reflects the wisdom of Pope Francis and his care and concern for us the people of God in our Beloved United States of America.

Years ago, when I was serving as Cardinal James Hickey's priest-secretary in the Archdiocese of Washington, an old friend came to visit. As we walked around the chancery office, he stopped and said, "You don't know how good you have it!" It took someone with fresh eyes to show me the many blessings God had given me. In essence, he said, "Don't take your blessings for granted."

I thought of my friend when the Holy Father visited the Unit4d States for the first time in September. It was obvious to everyone that Pope Francis had prepared carefully for the visit by studying our culture and pastoral challenges. The pope didn't merely read prepared speeches; looking at us with fresh eyes, he engaged us and reminded us of the many blessings that God has bestowed upon us. He told us not to take these blessings for granted, but rather to cherish them and use them in service to others, especially the poor ant he vulnerable.

One blessing that Pope Francis discussed frequently is religious freedom. In his first address, on the South Lawn of the White House, he said that American Catholics seek to build a just, tolerant and inclusive society based upon respect for others, including those with whom we sincerely differ. Catholics in the United States are also concerned that society respect their religious liberty, which the pope described as "one of America's most precious possessions."

Pope Francis expressed his support for the U. S. Bishops' efforts to preserve and defend religious freedom and encouraged Americans to be good citizens who are vigilant and ready "to preserve and defend that freedom from everything that would threaten or compromise it."

In these remarks at the White House, the pope did not mention any specific issues, such as the Health and Human Services mandate that would require many church-sponsored ministries and institutions to facilitate abortifacients, sterilizations and contraceptives for their employees and family members. But later that day, he made a surprise visit to the Little Sisters of the Poor, who are prominently resisting that mandate. This gesture of support should prompt us to take a second look at the sisters' courageous defense of our most fundamental liberty.

The following day, Pope Francis returned to the importance of religious freedom during his address to the U. S. Congress. Once again, he helped us see ourselves anew. He began by pointing the marble relief of Moses in the chamber of the House of Representatives, recognizing that it was through Moses that we received the Ten Commandments, a privileged expression of the law of God written on the human heart. Just legislation, which reflects God's law, unifies peoples and nations and respects transcendent human dignity.

The Holy Father then directed our attention to iconic figures in American culture. He called Abraham Lincoln "the guardian of liberty, who labored tirelessly, that "this nation, under God, [might] have a new birth of freedom." The pope reminded us that this new birth of freedom requires us to serve the common good with strong conviction about our shared human dignity. Such conviction leads us to engage in the struggle to preserve our fundamental, universal and God-given freedoms while resisting efforts to use religion for unjust and violent purposes. Indeed, we should use our freedom to build bridges of understanding and cooperation whenever possible.

In that spirit, the Holy Father also referred to Martin Luther King Jr., whose leadership in attaining "full civil and political rights for African Americans" should inspire us to welcome immigrants who are seeking the blessings of liberty for themselves and for their families.
