Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time (C)

From the Desk of Rev. Msgr. Hugh J. Corrigan:

Two police officers are sitting in their car in a crowded Time Square in New York City. A package is thrown in the back seat of their car. It looks like a bomb. Thinking that they are going to die but not wanting the bomb to kill anyone else, they drive to a deserted street and then run out of the car. The bomb is a fake. They live. This is an act of pure heroism—two young men willing to face certain death to save others. One of the officers is an immigrant from Afghanistan. He is also a Muslim. It sounds like fictional story in a movie. It is not. It really happened last week. Amidst all the detailed media accounts of the killings (including a Catholic priest in France) and the reactions of anger and rage against immigrants, this true story of heroism should shine a light into the darkness to show the basic goodness of the human spirit.




